Long way from Houston to White

Temporary job has stretched to full term for presidential press aide

Looking back, it seems little in Peter Rousssel's career has gone according to plan. Not that the native Houstonian is complaining, but he didn't get to be mind you, but he didn't get to be deputy press secretary to President Reagan exactly by design.

Even his first job out of college wasn't what he had thought it would be.

"When I started at the University of Houston in communication arts," the affable 42-year-old said, "I really thought I would be right where you are (as a reporter)."

Worked for Bush

Instead, the 1965 UH graduate signed on with an advertising agency that was running political campaigns for U.S. Sen. John Tower and George Bush, who was running for the House of Representatives at the time.

Two years later, Rousssel was in Washington to start a long association with the man who would later become vice president under Reagan.

Back in Houston after Jimmy Carter had replaced Gerald Ford as president, Rousssel was working for the Chamber of Commerce and thinking about running for office himself when he was pressed into what he thought was temporary service at the White House.

An assassination attempt on Reagan had left White House press secretary Jim Brady critically injured, and there was a gap that

needed filling. Rousssel said he would help out for two months.

Three years later, reflecting on the "temporary" assignment, Rousssel said, "Brady had gone down in the line of duty. I didn't feel like I had a choice."

Since returning to Washington, Rousssel has hardly had a minute to spare as one of the president's chief spokesmen. As press secretary to the chief executive, he has to be ready to travel at a moment's notice.

"My first Monday on the job,"

chine and he routinely puts in dawn-to-dusk days while making sure that each of the 150 regular White House reporters gets the information he or she wants — and gets it right.

"If you like long hours and interesting work," he said during a recent rest stop at his mother's quiet home in West University Place, "I would highly recommend the job."

Rousssel comes by his affinity for the working press naturally.

His mother, now 86, worked for The Houston Post on the universal desk (where stories are edited) in the 1920s and his father, Hubert Rousssel, was The Post's drama and music critic for more than 30 years.

Growing up in West University, Rousssel got to know many newspaper personalities, including former television critic David Westheimer, who later wrote books and screenplays and recently has begun a thrice-weekly column in The Post.

Rousssel said Westheimer frequently visited his parents' home. "I was just a boy then," Rousssel recalled with affection, "and I wore pajamas with feet in them. David was always tying my pajamas together. He drove me crazy."

Respect for press

Rousssel said his respect for the press was enhanced the day he was ordered to fly to Phoenix to help handle the Supreme Court appointment. He said most of the press corps had gone for the day,

but veteran UPI correspondent Helen Thomas came around office to say she thought thing was going on.

"She said her bones jugged her something was happening," Rousssel said. "I just ducked head down and got out of office. But that just shows good reporter's instinct a caliber of the press corps White House."

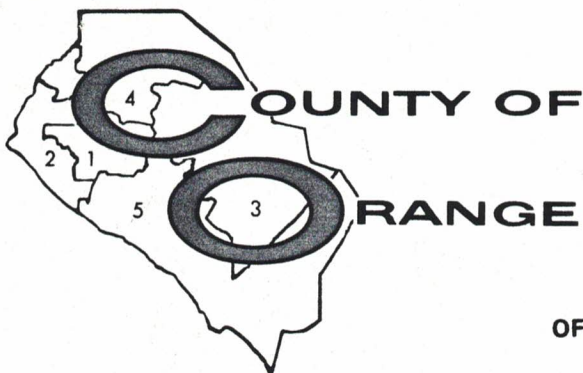

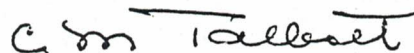

EL PASO, TEXAS -- 20-21 JANUARY 1984

RESOLUTION #1

WHEREAS, the Republic of China on Taiwan is the strongest ally of the United States in the Northern Pacific; and

WHEREAS, the twenty-two million people of the Republic of China are dedicated to freedom, civilized, literate and the only true guardians of the cultural and intellectual heritage of China; and

WHEREAS, the Red Chinese have demonstrated by mass murder and total repression their contempt for freedom and human dignity;

Dear Motley:

Two months ago I sent you a letter asking for some confirmation or refutation of certain allegations made by the Left with respect to the elections in El Salvador. To date I have had no reply.

I am under the impression - possibly erroneous - that the President put you down there to defend and advance his policies in Latin America. In that dense fog that covers the area where your office is located, most of it generated by the inhabitants, you may not notice that this country is absolutely crawling with red hot left wingers who are blasting our President's policies in Latin America. There are regrettably damned few people like me around who are willing to go out and do battle in his cause. In my case, I have been doing battle in his cause since 1965, two years of it in his 1980 campaign and White House.

Thus when I ask you for some information with which I can rebut the President's critics, I expect some attention. Two months go by, and I get nothing. Is it possible that those career wimps who you inherited down there casually tossed my letter in the round file? Dear Mr. McClaughry:

Upon my return yesterday from a trip overseas I received the copy of your May 14th letter and your July 18th letter. The answer to the May 14th letter is being prepared in some detail. My initial impression is that we can provide much grist for your mill.

Now to your July 18th letter.

The less than perfect mail system in the Department of State could lead to the impression that someone "roundfiled" your letter. I myself have had personal mail delayed or lost, so I attribute the non-receipt of your letter to pure inefficiency and not a conscious act on the part of any person.

I found your characterization of Foreign Service Officers as "career wimps" inaccurate and unfortunate. I have found the vast majority of FSO's to be intelligent and disciplined enough to follow orders. The impression to the contrary is unfortunate.

I might remind you that "career wimps" in large numbers lost their lives in the bombing of our Embassy in Beirut; that, in fact, proportionately more Foreign Service Officers have lost their lives through bombings, assassinations and other terrorist attacks since WWII than members of the Armed Forces lost in action. A "career wimp" that works for me went ashore with the first wave in the Grenada operation and was decorated for valor.

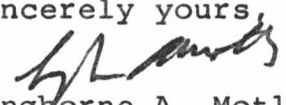

I am pleased to enclose a copy of TOWARD POPULATION STABILIZATION: FINDINGS FROM PROJECT 1990, the results of a two year effort by the Population Institute to estimate the cost of extending family planning to essentially all couples in 12 developing countries over the next 10 to 15 years. The 12 countries contain a third of world population and account for half its growth.

Surveys in 50 countries document that third-world couples want substantially fewer children than they are having. One-third had not wanted their last child, half did not want a future birth, and half of those who did want a future birth wanted to wait before having it. Yet, these same surveys found that most third-world couples lacked access to contraceptives.

A third of the couples in PROJECT 1990 countries use family planning, but there are wide variations among countries: in Nigeria, Zaire, and Pakistan, fewer than 10 percent are users, compared with 60 percent or more in Thailand, Indonesia, and Brazil. While differences among the 12 countries are many, one unmistakable difference is the level of family planning availability.

During the 15 years remaining in this century, the 12 countries will need \$22.5 billion in current (1984) dollars for family planning services to be shared among individual couples, governments, private organizations, and international donors.

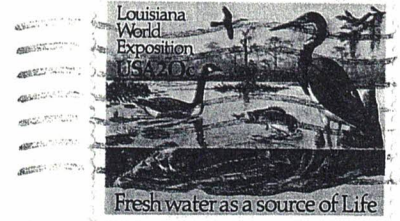
