Burford Gives Vent to Her Dim View Of D.C. and the Panel She Is to Lead

Anne M. Burford, the controversial former chief of the Environmental Protection Agency, described her appointment to head a national advisory committee on marine and atmospheric issues as "a nothingburger," with virtually no functions or serious tasks.

"They meet three times a year. They don't do anything. It's a joke," she told a Colorado state convention of wool growers in Vail Friday night.

President Reagan, "said he wanted to appoint me to something and he did," Burford said.

Her appointment triggered a fusillade of criticism, derailed a White House attempt at rapprochement with environmentalists, forced the president to defend her, and led to a 74-to-19 vote in the Republican-

controlled Senate calling for the withdrawal of her nomination.

Burford, in remarks reported in The Denver Post, also said that the District of Columbia is "too small to be a state but too large to be an asylum for the mentally deranged."

And she said of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy (D-Mass.), who sponsored the Senate anti-Burford resolution, "To hear that kind of morality from him—I mean, doesn't that make you just die?"

Burford was unavailable last night for comment on her remarks to the wool growers.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes declined to comment on Burford's remarks, but aides said her statements, as reported in the press, "do not reflect the president's views."

However, Sen. Nancy Landon Kassebaum (R-Kan.), a member of

[make the new appointment] at this time... If she doesn't particularly care, I wonder why she let the president go ahead and make the appointment. It's too bad."

Several of the 25 members of the National Advisory Committee on Oceans and the Atmosphere had similar reactions.

"My own attitude has been that the law gives us what looks like a pretty important assignment. If the president of the United States asks you to serve on something like this," you "ought to take it seriously," committee member FitzGerald Bemiss of Richmond, Va., told the Associated Press.

John A. Knauss, vice president of the University of Rhode Island for marine resources, said the panel has met eight to 10 times a year in the six years he's been a member.

He said that because Burford is scheduled to be sworn in Wednesday, he did not wish to comment on her remarks.

Burford, a former Colorado state legislator, was named to head the EPA by Reagan at the outset of his administration. She resigned in March, 1983, after a controversy over EPA handling of the \$1.6 billion toxic waste clean-up program.

In her remarks, according to The Denver Post and wire reports, Burford outlined what she called "10 commandments" that are followed in Washington, preceding them with the comment, "The only difference between an anthill and Washington is that in Washington, the ants carry briefcases, drink scotch and make \$65,000 a year."

The commandments outlined by Burford:

- "You have to be demented to want a job in Washington in the first place."

- "Thou shalt be hung out to dry." Burford said she formulated that commandment after noting in 1981 that unconfirmed appointees cannot speak out or perform their duties until confirmation, while critics can fire at will.

- "Thou shalt not covet thy

neighbor's block of delegates at the Democratic National Convention."

- "Thou shalt give thy neighbor a job." She accused former President Jimmy Carter of boosting the EPA budget by up to 30 percent merely to give more jobs to environmentalists. The environmental lobby, she said, is not interested in the environment.

- "Thou shalt spend the taxpayers' money like there is no tomorrow."

- "Thou shalt get your face on the evening news if Anne Burford investigates your subcommittee."

- "Thou shalt live your life on the front page."

- "Thou shalt not expect good news to get into the paper."

- "Reporters shall put no gods before their editors."

Burford repeated charges that reporters had peered in her windows while she was trying to dress.

- The 10th and "most sobering fact of life in Washington," according to Burford, is "Thou shalt not come to Washington without a criminal lawyer at your elbow."

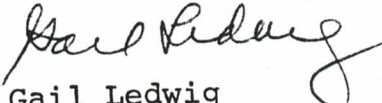

Now I am late in writing you, because I have been taking a cure at the Homestead for the last three weeks. At any rate, thank you for your letter.

As a reply, I can only say that the French have a proverb, which adds up to the rule that the worst enemy of the good is the insistence on the perfect. Of course, the Jersey barriers are more effective than anything else. The trouble is that they are also hideous beyond conception and put the President and the White House in the worst possible light. In ~~other words~~, besides making the White House look like a fortified cave, they make the President and his staff seem downright cowardly.

The Secret Service, in my experience, is full of the kind of people who do not understand that the perfect is the enemy of the good, and the only way to deal with them is to order tests and to do research. When the tests are made, I think you will find that even the concrete tubs provide an adequate barrier to any kind of imaginable assault except by a tank, which is after all too luridly unlikely to be worth considering. Undoubtedly, the tubs would shatter under the impact of a very heavy truck, but I think that the impact, plus the earth in the tubs, would also stop the truck. Moreover, if this proves to be untrue, you can then consider such alternatives as providing tough steel linings for the tubs.

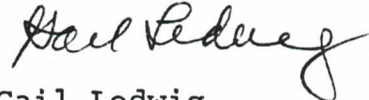

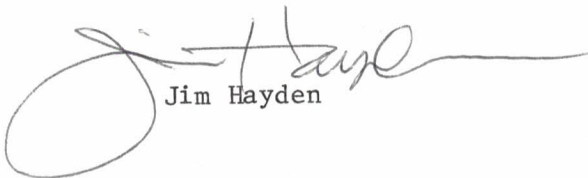
On behalf of our 28 station network, I would like to thank you for your cooperation in bringing the President to local television.
