My dear Mr. Deaver:

I have a suggestion to make which may prove to be of real value in the re-election of President Reagan!

Here it is: I work at the polls in D.C. in a precinct that should attract more voters than it does. I have noticed that there are ~~a~~ very very few YOUNG citizens responding at election times. Why?

It seems to me that an effective plan must be developed to make young citizens, who become of voting age, that to register and vote to participate in their community life by this special privilege we have, is important!

It would be a good idea if the Republican Party (or President Reagan himself on the campaign trail) would strongly advocate that High School and College registration should be encouraged. Lectures in an "assembly situation" on CITIZENSHIP should be given for those who will become eligible to vote, and at the end of the "lecture" registration cards should be issued, so the students can register right then and there.

It is shocking to me that so much attention is given that blacks encourage blacks to register, that Hispanics encourage Hispanics, etc. etc. Voting is a privilege that is passed over too lightly, as the strength of participating in elections becomes a partisan tool. I think it would be a real plus if The Republican Party made it known through the print and visual media at its disposal, and through School Systems, that to be a good citizen, worthy of the name, it would behoove Americans to register and vote, upon eligibility. This is meant for ALL Americans, whatever the color or creed, or party affiliation.

I hope you consider this a worthy suggestion.

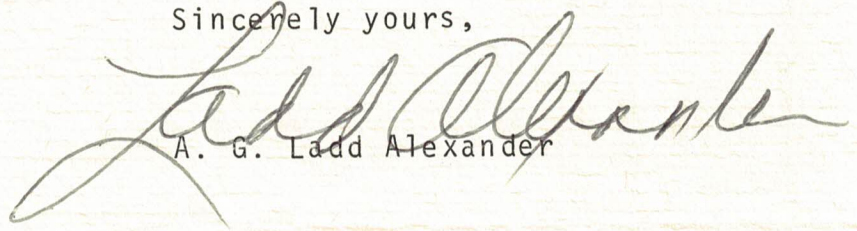

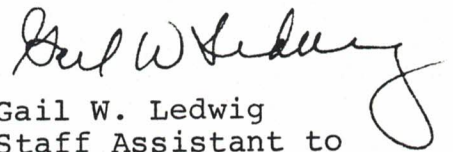

I imagine you are even busier than usual now that one convention is over and the other approaches. One of these days I hope we can get together for a relaxed conversation but I guess that won't happen for at least a few months.

I'm writing to ask you to pass on to Jim Baker the enclosed offer from the Sacramento Bee to sponsor a vice presidential debate here in Sacramento.

I realize that you and your colleagues are not bubbling over with enthusiasm for a lot of debates, but I would argue that having a vice presidential debate in Sacramento offers an advantage for you. It focuses attention on California, the President's home base and an area of strength.

I do think it would be a public service to hold the debate here, but obviously we do have the additional selfish interest of welcoming the national attention it would give to Sacramento and the Bee.

As I say in the letter to Baker, we would be entirely open to who is on the panel and the format of the debate. I would hope that Marty Smith could be selected as one of the participants.

I gather that any real decision on debates may be held off until after the convention, but I do want to get this offer before Baker. Any good word you might be able to put in for us would be much appreciated. I know we could work together to set it up in a way that would work well and also have a little fun doing it.

On another subject, I guess you heard that Polly had a second operation. I talked with Clayton last week and he seemed optimistic, but I know it has taken a lot out of him. I was going to visit them at Fishers Island in August, but that plan is on the shelf for now.

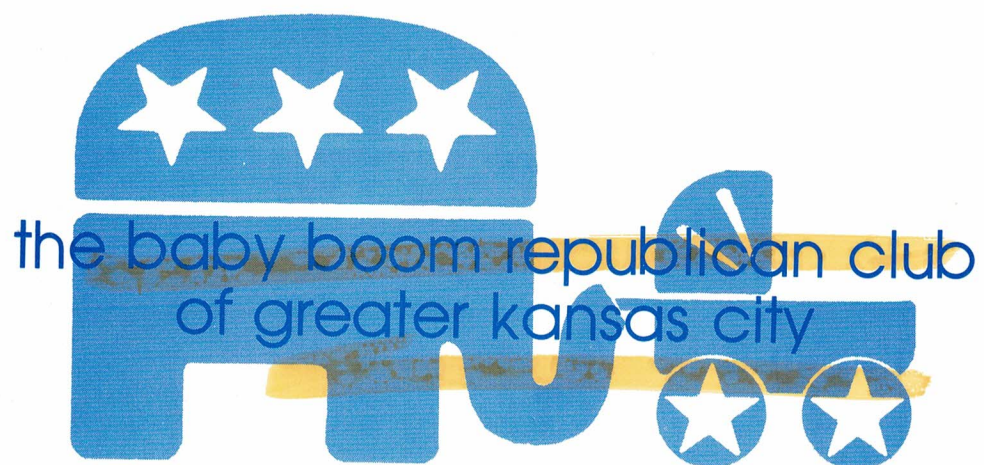

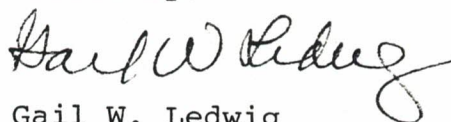

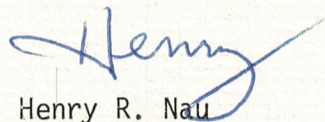
Dear Mike,

I would like to bring to your attention an excellent women's program created by the Office of Personnel Management and HHS's own version of the initiative. I feel it could be very useful in other Departments or Agencies.

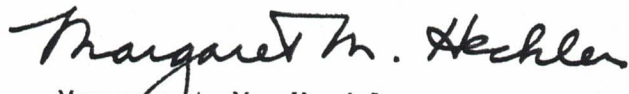
The Women's Executive Leadership Program is a pilot management training program for 50 women Federal employees nationwide in the GS 9-12 grade range. Participants will receive individualized supervisory and management training and participate in a minimum of two rotational job assignments over a 12-15 month period. HHS recommended five nominees and I understand our participants will be announced by OPM imminently. The program begins in August.

In March of 1984 an HHS "Task Force on Women's Employment" was established to review personnel policies as they relate to women. Interestingly, unlike any other Federal Department or Agency, women comprise 65% of the total HHS workforce, the best record in any executive department. However, women comprise only 23% of HHS employees in grades 13-15, the management level positions. Therefore, in early June I announced the Women's Management Training Initiative (WMTI), an HHS demonstration project initially designed for 100 high potential non-supervisors seeking management training and experience. The initiative is designed to help participants prepare themselves to compete for advancement. The training program will be held in FY 1985 and will guarantee participants a minimum of 80 hours supervisory and managerial training and at least one developmental assignment to a supervisory or managerial position. Our participants were announced July 31. Incidentally, any HHS nominees to the OPM program, who are not selected for the government-wide program will automatically participate in HHS's WMTI.

As head of the White House "Working Group" relating to women's issues, I suggest to you that each Department and Agency be encouraged to take a careful look at their workforce as HHS has done. We found that our workforce was predominately female, yet women were concentrated in the lower grades. Thus, we took the initiative to create a program which addresses our workforce. Other Departments with a different workforce composition might well create a training initiative specifically geared toward their needs.

The response has been overwhelming. Nearly 1800 women in HHS offices nationwide have applied. In fact, the demand lead us to increase the number of participants from the earlier announced 100 to 122. And, of those, 68 are located in the Washington/Baltimore area and the remaining 54 are in the Regional or field offices.

In addition to being a real morale booster and taking the initiative on an issue of importance to women, namely career mobility, the program will provide long-term benefits to both the Department and those individuals selected for participation. I might add that all of this is being done at no additional cost to our Office of Personnel Administration.
