Dear Mr. Deaver:

In reply to your kind and flattering invitation to participate in the fall activities of the "Inner Circle" let me say this:

Although I have financially supported the candidates and Presidents who espouse your objectives, it (sadly) has not gained me a hearing on a more important type contribution.

America is losing the world ideological contest because we do not fully understand our true origins, why we were set-up as an experimental democracy meant to be world-wide in influence at our maturity and not strictly national. We should be playing a much more dynamic role in world affairs.

To that end I authored and lobbied in a very amateur way, two bills of draft legislation before congressional offices in Washington D.C. This was many years ago but the issues are not dead, on the contrary are more vital than ever. They went to Senatorial committees as petitions via Vice-President Barkley's office, and created very little comment.

Our organization has developed research that projects Sir Francis Bacon of England as the true, if hidden father of America, the colonization scheme and the carefully guided instituting of representative democracy. Much more planning and involvement has come to light.

This position does not diminish the well established role of Washington and the traditional facts, but gives credit where credit is due and thus forms the substance of justice. More importantly it opens up the vast subject of humankind's destiny and gives effective answers. We must move from trial and error methods to a sure course.

Proof of the role of Bacon and a select group of aids to his vision for America was secured in an underground vault according to our research. As America's time capsule, it was placed in Williamsburg, Virginia in the late 17th century, so that it might be discovered at a time of crisis to assist our unaware future. This Vault was discovered by the head of our organization in 1938, but it was never opened and the healing treasure it contains has been denied and misrepresented.

The idea of the first bill is to by Congressional Act hold this small plot of soil as a major plank in our national heritage and welfare. It is called "The World Peace Act of 1950". Hopefully something like this can still be done. It belongs to the American people first and to the world at large, thereafter through our guardianship, promulgation and duty as a trust.

The second bill sets up a Presidential Commission to study and recommend. It is called "The Leadership Emancipation Act of 1950" and very much in need of an update by some savey and responsible people in power.

The first bill of draft legislation asking for a commission of scholars went to President Truman. The second one asking for the sanctification of the "time capsule" area in Williamsburg, together with a copy of the first, went to Senate committees for possible action. We subsequently tried the National Endowment for the Humanities and NASA during President Johnson's administration, a direct letter to President Nixon and the Interior Department under President Carter.

I realize it is unusual, maybe unprecedented for a private citizen to write and seek sponsorship for a subject this large, especially since I am a person of no status. But it was done in good faith and with the care and deep concern that we all share about the future.

How would I sit at your luncheons and be taken seriously? You can imagine the ridicule one would get.

But can you also imagine the benefits if this mystery proves to be a vital and dynamic set of facts?

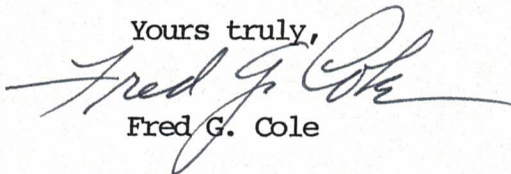
Meanwhile all the best for your worthy objectives.

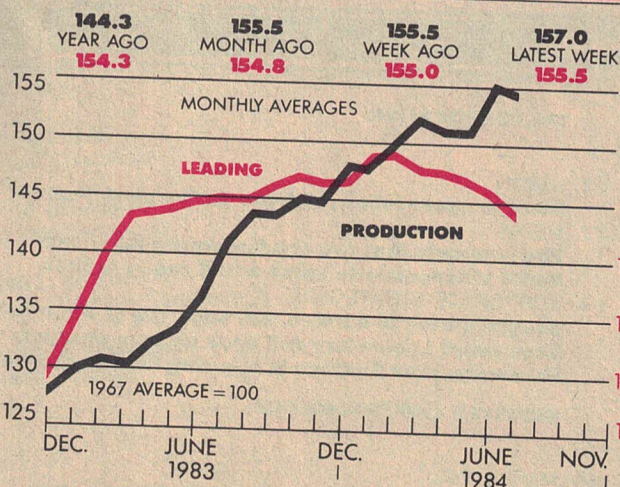

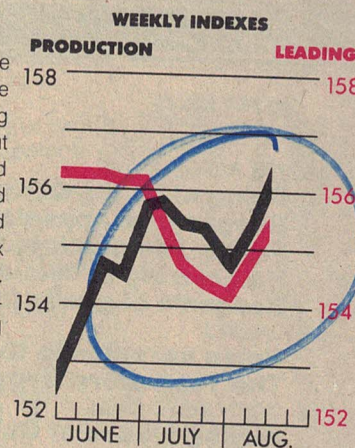

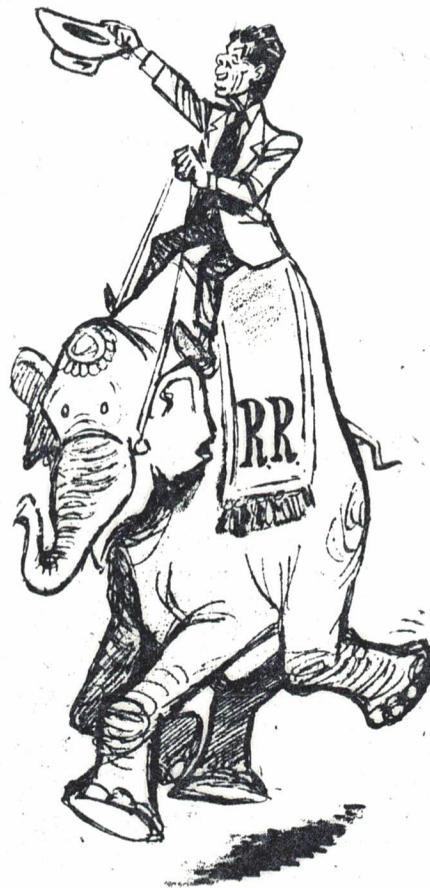
But the following coincidences also jumped out as I looked at different years where there were three Friday the 13ths:

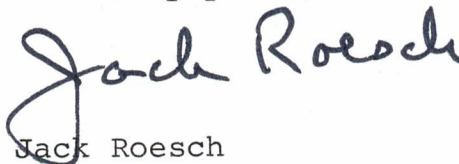

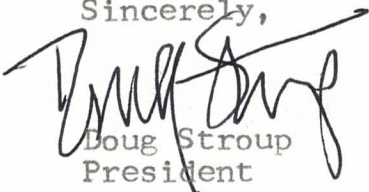

SUBJECT: NBC "Blitz" on US/Soviet Relations

The NBC "TODAY" Show, in separate contacts with Mike Deaver and Larry Speakes, asked for a Presidential interview in connection with a series of programs on US/Soviet relations. The request was declined and referred to the State Department.

John Hughes at State has looked into NBC's overall plans, which turn out to be extensive. He reports that:

- NBC is planning a ten day blitz on US/Soviet relations. They have been negotiating with the Soviets for several months to permit their network television news programs to broadcast live from Moscow during this period.
- "MEET THE PRESS" has requested Andrei Gromyko to appear on their program on September 9. They have not received a response to the invitation. We have been told informally that if Gromyko declines, they will request Secretary Shultz.
- The "TODAY" Show will have Bryant Gumbel appearing from Moscow on the program from September 10 through 14. Jane Pauley will be in New York. On Monday, September 10, "TODAY" has requested an interview with Gromyko. If he declines, they will air a taped segment on Gromyko's career. Following that tape, they will have brief interviews with former Secretaries of State Kissinger, Rusk, and Vance. They would like to interview Secretary Shultz that day also, but State's view is the Secretary should not engage in a public discussion of his Soviet counterpart.
- Throughout the week, the "TODAY" Show will have interviews with former President Ford. They have requested interviews with Carter and Nixon also, but have not received responses from them. Walter Mondale will tape a segment for "TODAY". A date for airing his segment has not been established; however, NBC indicates he will not appear on Monday, September 10.
- The Sakharov stepchildren will be in a segment on the "TODAY" Show and the show will also have an interview with

theatrical producer Joseph Papp, who will be in Moscow that week. An Iowa farmer whose uncle entertained Krushchev on his farm years ago will be featured in a segment.

- NBC Nightly News will have US/Soviet segments throughout the week.
- Perhaps related to this blitz, an NBC Special on "Star Wars", reported by Marvin Kalb, is due to be aired September 8. Secretary Weinberger and former Secretary of Defense McNamara participated in a debate for this show.

We have asked State to take the lead in ensuring a coordinated Administration effort to deal with NBC on the US/Soviet programs.
