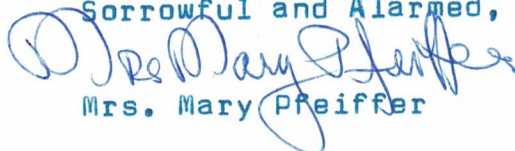

I'd like to see President Reagan deal head on with the ERA business. I don't know why he can't say that he is the servant of the people, that in 14 years, despite the fevered efforts of his two predecessors, the states rejected the ERA as it was written. His support of a vague and undefined ERA is meaningless.

I'd like him to deal with the future by saying flatout, "More of the same. Look at my record as governor of California--good work in the first term, more and stronger in the second, both terms used in rescuing the state from the profligacy of the opponents."

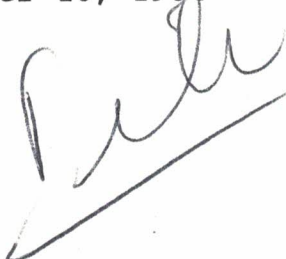

Dear Mr. Deaver:

I believe the time is ripe for you to drastically alter your campaign strategy in the wake of the debate debacle of Sunday night. Virtually every Reagan supporter I have spoken with here in San Antonio agrees that the President took one giant step toward losing the election by his poor showing on Sunday.

I cannot imagine how the President's support staff could allow him to go into the debate so obviously unprepared for questions that anyone with a bit of sense would have known would be asked, such as questions on balancing the budget, abortion, social security, separation of church and state, etc. Surely no one can contend that the President could not foresee that those would be areas of interest to the panel. However, judging from the President's performance, it appeared that he had never given any thought to those issues until the moment the questions were posed to him.

The public is growing tired very quickly of all of this bunk about wrapping the President in the flag and talking about the greatness of the country. The public is beginning to resent the fact that the Republicans are attempting to portray themselves as the only patriotic party. You have no monopoly on patriotism, just as the Democrats have none on compassion.

I believe you should trot out some of the television commercials which were run in 1980, and take a look at the hard hitting factual style of them. Why not simply have commercials with the President - or Vice President - reminding the viewer of what things were like under Carter-Mondale in terms of interest rates and inflation, and then ask the voter whether he wants to go back to those days. Until the debate, it seemed that the President was afraid to ask the voters whether they were better off now than they were four

years ago; however, if he would do so, I believe that most voters would concede that they are better off, and that the country is better off. Even Walter Mondale on Sunday night stated that the question was not whether America was better off now than it was four years ago, but was instead whether America would be better off four years from now after another Reagan term. This is clearly a concession on Mondale's part that - yes - the country is better off now than it was four years ago. However, in the wake of the debate, I have heard no one pointing out this concession.

I think the President should hit very hard - and try to get back on the offensive - by attacking the demagoguery of the Democrats in basing their campaign on fears of what another Reagan term would bring. Mondale is trying to scare the elderly to death by telling them that Ronald Reagan is going to do away with Social Security; on the other hand, he is trying to scare the young to death by convincing them that Ronald Reagan will start a nuclear war and that we will all be dead before 1988. The Democrats should be attacked vigorously for such negativism, the likes of which I do not recall in my lifetime during a presidential campaign.

Why not make more of Mondale's ultra-liberal voting record in the Senate? How many times did he vote for tax increases? How many times did he vote in favor of slashing the defense budget? How many times did he vote in favor of increasing the authority of the Federal Government?

On two occasions during the debate, Mondale criticized "local officials" and "local judges". The President said nothing, when he should have stated that Mondale's criticism of local officials is actually a criticism of local voters, and that it demonstrates Mondale's lack of trust in the ability of the ordinary man and woman in this country to control their own affairs. The President should have jumped on this with both feet and stated that this proves that Mondale is a professional politician and that he wants as much control as possible taken away from state and local governments and centralized in Washington, D.C. The anti-Washington mood is still present in the country just as it was in 1980, but nary a word has been spoken about it by the President.

Lastly, with the sole exception of the article by William F. Buckley, there has been virtually no mention of the fact that Mondale's chief counsel of his re-election campaign - Mr. Ifshin - went to North Vietnam during the Vietnam war and appeared on Radio Hanoi and broadcast anti-American messages to our troops. In essence, he was the Vietnam war's Tokyo Rose, and now he is the chief lawyer for Walter Mondale's campaign. Why not inform the public of this? Would this man become Walter Mondale's Attorney General? Again, it is absolutely incredible to me that the President's re-election campaign would fail to make note of these types of facts.

Gentlemen, you may well go down as orchestrating the worst re-election campaign in history. Your effort pales beside that of Carter's in 1980. You had better get to work, because you are about to lose this election.

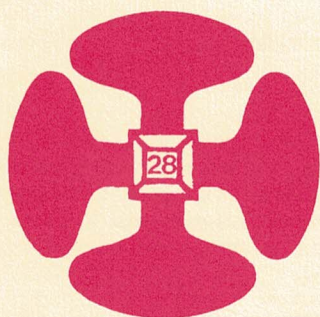

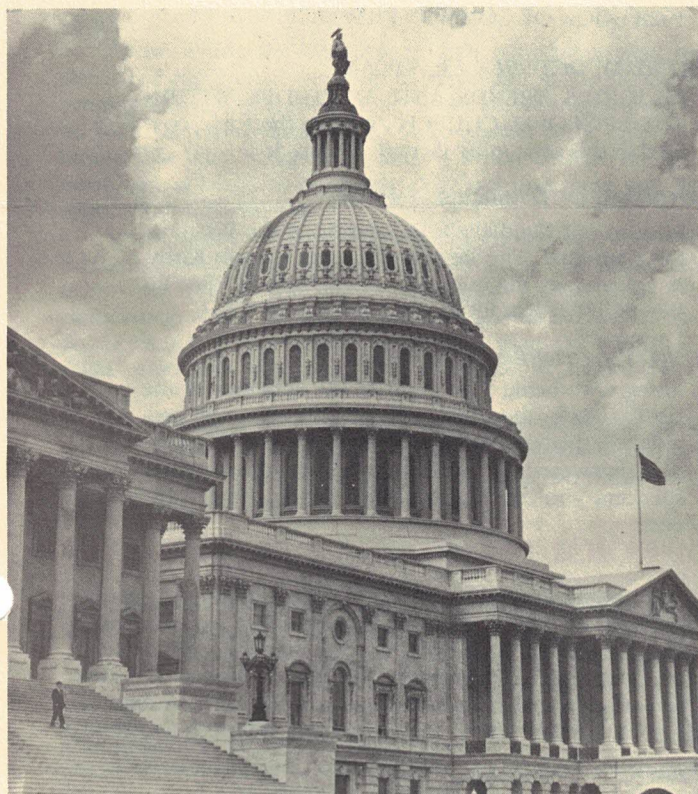

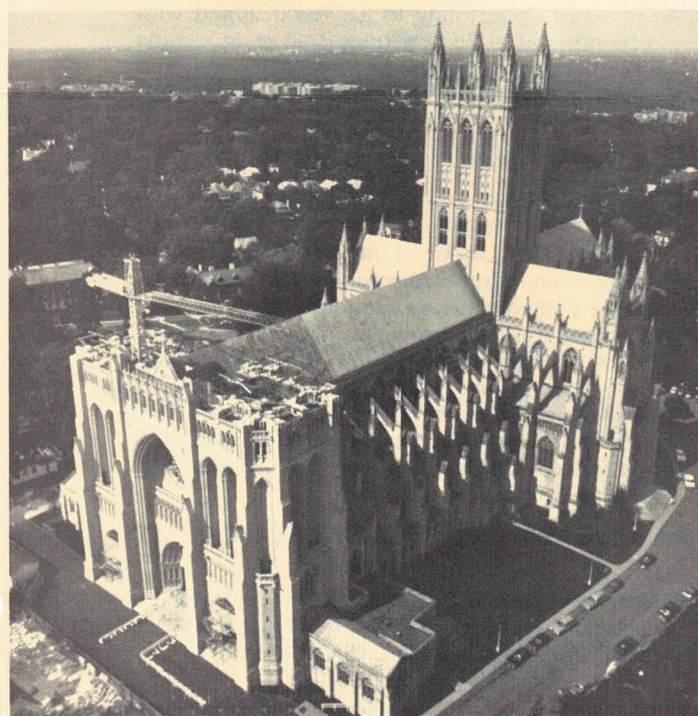

This session will review the importance, goals and activities of the local PBS chapter along with the potential problems likely to be encountered. The mechanics of organizing a chapter and the practical assistance the PBS national office can furnish will be outlined. Case studies of successful local chapters will also be presented.

WORKSHOP #2: "PBS CHAPTERS—HOW TO COMMUNICATE OUR MESSAGE"

This workshop will cover the various means which can be utilized to carry the PBS message to all Episcopalians, from chapter newsletters to the use of your local media. Views of the younger members of the Church regarding the Prayer Book issue will also be heard. Again, this session goes hand-in-hand with Workshop #1 and we recommend you attend both.

WORKSHOP #3: "RIGHTS OF THE LAITY"

As we prepare for the 1985 General Convention, it is important that we know how to work as effectively as possible. This session will focus on ensuring that the voice of the traditionalist layman is heard in the Vestry, at the Diocesan Convention and at the General Convention.

WORKSHOP #4: "THE CRISIS IN THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH AND WHY WE MUST HAVE A TRADITIONAL PRAYER BOOK"

This workshop will explore some of the motivations and reasons behind the restructuring of the Episcopal Church by means of Prayer Book revision. It will also go into great detail to outline the theological importance of the 1928 Book of Common Prayer and the necessity to preserve the traditional Episcopal Liturgy and Doctrine.

Four general sessions will take place during the PBS Conference. Distinguished speakers from both the clergy and the laity will offer their views on issues near to us and discuss the effect of future trends on these issues.

Prior to our Candlelight Procession at the Washington Cathedral, The Reverend Canon Darwin Kirby, Jr. will answer the question, "IS THE 1928 PRAYER BOOK THE PRAYER BOOK OF THE SAINTS?"

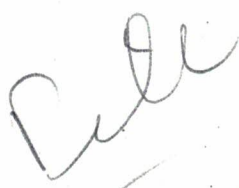

Dear Mr. Deaver,

I hope this letter reaches you before the next debate. I watched the debate Sunday evening, and while I thought Mr. Mondale did a superb impersonation of the President, his message of higher taxes, lower defense spending, and his plan to inflate the money supply seems too much like Jimmy Carter for me.

The President delivered the message I wanted to hear. It's too bad the press became carried away with Mondale's new image, and failed to explain the differences between the two candidates, and what their programs will do to this nation.

The one point I feel will work in the President's favor, Mondale will have to give another stellar performance, or risk the momentum he achieved in the first debate. The President has to force Mondale on the defensive.

These are the points of differences I believe the American public wishes to know:

How can Mr. Mondale be for a strong defense, when he is willing to put our survivability in thirty year old bombers. He claims the B-1 will be obsolete before the end of the decade, making this plane useless against future Soviet air defenses. He claims the Stealth bomber provides the guarantees needed in a manned bomber. While the concept is intriguing, how do we know for sure, as to whether or not this plane will be realized and bear fruit. While President Reagan believes in the concept, and is willing to provide funds for research, he knows it may not be the weapon down the road. Maybe the Soviets will develop programs to counter this plane before it could even be produced. So, will be back to the same old problem. No new manned bomber, and aging B-52's continuing to deplete through age, and part of our deterrent in a time of need will be lost. Can we be sure beyond a doubt, that the Stealth bomber is a practical and viable program. This is why Mr. Reagan is for the B-1, because he doesn't believe in gambling our future away on untested weapons programs, which may not even work.

The Jerusalem problem created by the Democratic candidates Mondale and Hart. In the heat of debate during the New York primary, they promised if elected President, "I promise as President to move our embassy to the city of Jerusalem". Since Mr. Mondale has blamed the President for the collapse of the Camp David peace accords, his first priority would be to renew the peace plan and bring the two parties together. Since both Arabs and Jews are needed to make the peace plan work,

how can he expect the Arabs to accept an American president legitimizing Israeli control over their holiest shrines in Jerusalem. Will American installations be attacked in even stronger terms. Not one American embassy will be safe, the few legitimate Arab friends we have in the Middle East will desert us, our position as mediator in future Arab- Israeli issues will be null and void. Possible oil boycotts may occur wrecking our own recovery and the world economy, as well. Is that the type of future leadership we want or deserve?

Of course, Mr. Mondale will be praising the policy of human rights under the Carter years, and his years in the Senate. However, there was a problem in the Carter human right policy, which attacked our allies human rights, while ignoring the Soviet Union and Cuba. That policy which Mondale strongly advocated, gave us the likes of Daniel Ortega and fellow cutthroats, and most of all the one and only Ayatollah Khomeini. Ask their countrymen, if their lives are more secure and free, because we turned the other way. A real leader would have provided assistance, and hope to bring about the needed reforms, in order to keep future Khomeini's of the world out of control. How about the human rights of 12 year old kids, forced to be human mine detectors, because the Shah was so evil. How can Mr. Mondale look into the mirror, and say those policies work.

When the Nicaragua situation escalated, the same problem existed, which happened in Iran. We turned our back on a country, because their human rights situation didn't meet their criteria. So, the Sandanista's came into power destroying the freedom of press and assembly, abusing priests and bishops of the Catholic Church, taunting the Pope on his visit to that country, and trying to destabilize the peace in the region. If Mr. Reagan had not stood up to the communist rebels in El Salvador, they would have fallen, as well.

Also, emphasize how you helped mediate the situation in South Africa through quiet diplomacy. By these means you can be more effective in prodding South Africans on apartheid, which you vigorously denounced. If Mr. Mondale follows through on Mr. Jackson's idea of forcing American businesses to leave the country, and boycott their country they will only resist even more. A real leader never does the politically popular move, as Mr. Mondale tends to follow.

I hope the subject of trade comes up in the course of debate, since it comes up under the heading of foreign affairs. Ask Mr. Mondale, why he supports the steel trade import reduction issue, when countries have stated they would boycott American grain and other goods. The public should know that as President, you are worried about the future of American interest in trade, and while it may help get me re-elected, it is flawed policy, and a real leader would never place his interests, above those of his country.

Tell the public, the American worker loves to compete, he never backs down from a fight, but to say to the rest

of the world, "I'm a beaten country, I can't compete with the smaller nations of this world, give me a break." Your policy of voluntary restraints while manufacturing plants in steel and automobiles retool, not only leads to more balanced relations with other countries, but provides some form of competition to make us work harder and keeps competitive costs to guard against inflation, which wrecked the morale of this country.

Also, the President should emphasize the bold leadership he took in saving American lives on the island of Grenada, before another hostage fiasco took place. If Mr. Mondale says he agrees with the President's move in Grenada, ask him why he waited so long to agree with the President and the American public.

In point, let the President take the attack on failed Carter* Mondale policies, and ask him why his own party would not approve of the Salt II treaty, because it was so flawed and one sided. In order to placate party leadership and the nuclear freeze movement, Mr. Mondale may give the security of this country away, because of his unrealistic goals he accepts.

Of course, the issue of military spending will come up, and Mr. Mondale will talk about the bloated military budget. I hope the President counters with the poor conditions of military equipment under the Carter years, and would part of the cuts in the military that Mondale wants, include the shuttle, which I believed he voted against in the Senate. If he did vote against the Shuttle, I find that hard to believe, since he considers himself a man of the future.

I'm sure these points are being studied for the next debate, because I think these issues need to be addressed before the election. You have my vote and support, but most of all you have the American people behing you.
