Dear Mr. Deaver:

I attended an October 15, 1984 meeting of the GSA Advisory Board's Public Building Committee. As you know, GSA has been without a Commissioner for many months.

As a representative of the private sector on this committee, with the recommendation of the Presidential Personnel office, I want to share a concern from that meeting with the Executive Branch. (I am enclosing a copy of my letter to Mr. Tom Simon at GSA.)

Although the GSA personnel appear to be doing a good job of cooperating with the Administration's goal of reducing costs in government, there is a specific problem in carrying out the Work Space Reduction directive signed by the President. Some of the problems are logistical. The other problems revolve around the traditional passive resistance of federal agencies to reforms. I feel this can be dealt with more strongly than is being done at present. Stronger initiatives from GSA in this area, however, would require equally strong backing from the Executive Branch when federal agencies attempt to circumvent channels.

Because of these problems, the former GSA Commissioner Jerry Carmen's goal of reducing federal work space by ten percent in one year has been reduced to two percent. I was told at the meeting that the ten percent figure is unrealistic, but I am not convinced, particularly since Commissioner Carm^h presumably had hard data to make that projection. If the President's directive has broken down along the way, I want to see it revived under the new Commissioner.

I hope this information from a representative of the private sector is helpful to the Administration when a new Commissioner is appointed to the General Services Administration. Please let me know if I can be of further assistance.

Please convey to the GSA staff who participated in the October 15, 1984 Building Facilities meeting that I am very favorably impressed by the amount of preparation that went into the meeting, as well as the general direction and commitment to economic government that the work reflected.

After thinking over the discussions on work space reductions, my strong feeling is that you have an unidentified political problem as well as the identified logistical problems in having federal agencies comply with the work space reduction directive from this Administration. Realizing that your staff has diligently pursued persuasion, I believe that agencies dragging their feet need to face unpleasant consequences for non-compliance. The situation your staff described of agencies making appeals for waivers to the Executive Branch could be improved with the proper political liason work between GSA and the Executive Branch. I believe agencies who do not cooperate with the President's work space reduction program should be told that the GSA will actively and publically oppose any increased appropriation requests before the appropriate House committee when budget time comes. I am not speaking of the "One-half of one percent" provision, but of the GSA pointing out to the House committee that an agency refusing to economize in work space is probably not economizing in other areas. I believe this is only one out of a field of possibilities in using a bigger stick.

It should only take one or two instances for federal agencies to know that the work space reduction directive from the President has teeth in it. It is GSA's responsibility, as was pointed out at the meeting, to see that this initiative does not fail due to the traditional passive resistance of the cogs of government.

I realize that being without a Commissioner for so many months affects this problem, as well as the problem of agencies appealing to the Executive Branch without GSA's knowledge.

The Commissioner or some person working with him needs to have the

political knowledge and expertise to see that reforms in government initiated by elected representatives of the people are not circumvented. The thoughts I have offered are suggestions and could certainly be refined, added to, etc. But the point is that the political aspect of this problem must be identified as such before solutions can be found.

I would like to come back to D. C. after the first of the year to meet with you and other GSA personnel, offering any assistance I can in meeting the President's goal of reducing government costs. There are some ideas I have in other areas besides the work space program, and I look forward to working with you and others at GSA who share and have been making accomplishments in reducing the cost of government.

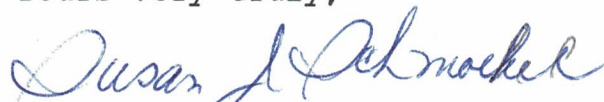

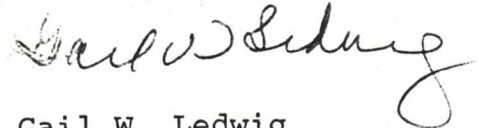

CLOISONNE WARE

Cloisonne, also called "Copper-body and Wire-inlaid Enamel", has a long-standing history of several hundred years. It was very popular as far back as in the years of the reign of Emperor Chingtai of the Ming dynasty. Because the technique was already well developed plus the fact that blue enamel was chiefly used, it was termed in Chinese "Chingtai Blue".

The manufacture of cloisonne ware requires for rather elaborate and complicated processes in nature, namely: body making, wiring, soldering, colouring, firing, polishing, gliding, etc. The pride and finesse of cloisonne betokens the crystallization of the wisdom and labour of Chinese working people.

Beautiful and elegant in moulding, splendid and grace in design and dazzling and brilliant in colours, cloisonne ware has enjoyed a high reputation at home and abroad and has been sold to the five continents the world over.
