Dear Bill:

I am enclosing the color photographs of the splendid silver and wood reproduction of the world globe with inkstands in our antique collection. As I suggested on the telephone, we think it would make a splendid gift to the President by some organizations such as the Republican Party.

Briefly, the globe itself measures five inches across. The entire item, including the rosewood holder, measures seven and one-half inches across and stands nine inches tall. The globe does not show the longitude and latitude lines which would be added. An inscription could be placed as shown on the silver plate on the wood holder.

Only two of these have been made. The first, as shown in the photograph, was made for the president of an international business firm. The second we will complete (minus any special inscription) in about two weeks. The cost is \$8,000 and represents our materials and labor only.

As you know, our craftsmen continue to make a number of objects for use as gifts to foreign leaders from members of the Reagan Administration. They also made the official gifts of the 1983 Summit. This object, however, is really in a class of its own. I hope you and others agree.
