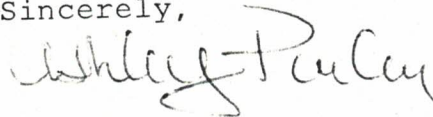
Dear Mr. Sittman:

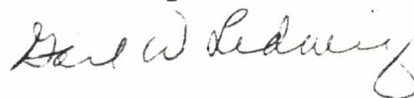

I decided to be direct. Across the hall from my office in Los Angeles was a public relations firm that was very active in political public relations. The firm's major client was Ronald Reagan. Michael Deaver, a principal in the firm, was one of Reagan's top aides.

I wrote Mike Deaver a note telling him that I was a Democrat who was interested in the Republican Party. It took Mike three months to respond. We ultimately arranged to have lunch.

During our lunch, I told him about myself and some Democratic friends who would like to become active in the Republican Party. To my delight, he suggested I arrange a luncheon in my office and invite some of those friends. He would invite Ronald Reagan to talk to us about the party and party politics.

Three weeks later we were sitting in my conference room, nine Democrats eating cold cuts from paper plates with the ex-Governor of California and the future President of the United States. We were in awe.

The meeting was a failure as far as getting involved in the party. Mike Deaver and Ronald Reagan were far too busy to help nine struggling Democrats become Republicans.

I had been dealing with small businesses for many years, and I had some ideas that I felt must be heard. So I decided to move onto the cocktail party circuit to "press the flesh" as they say.

While attending a cocktail party in honor of Ronald Reagan in 1979, I ran into a member of the Los Angeles School Board who was running for Congress. While talking to Representative Bobbi Fiedler (Republican-CA) about her plans, I mentioned I would be more than happy to attempt to raise a few dollars for her campaign. I was sure I had bitten off more than I could chew, because I had never raised money for a candidate at any time in my life. But I thought I'd give it a shot.

I managed to twist some arms, make some promises, and raise a few thousand dollars for the campaign. Fiedler eventually won the race by a slim margin and now I had a friend in Congress.

Kathy and I had a few more minutes of discussion while I managed to hold back my anger at her damn attitude. I left her office and headed for my next appointment in the building next door. I stepped into the cold afternoon air looking for the ledge where I had placed my cigar. I chuckled to myself. One frustration after the other, I thought. There was my cigar lying in a puddle of water, soaked clear through.

I started to walk toward the next building and began to think about why I was here. Three-thousand miles from home, cold and frustrated. It was amazing, I thought, a dramatic change had occurred in my life as a result of one rather insignificant event.

It was in 1979, when I had written an article for the *Los Angeles Business Journal*, "CPA Says Present Tax Laws Undermine Small Business." In the article I discussed the major problem small companies have—raising capital. I had suggested a tax incentive for a direct investment in a productive small business.

Presently, our tax laws allow valuable capital to chase unproductive tax shelters that create little real value for society. I felt that tax legislation must be adopted to provide capital to small productive businesses, where it belongs. However, I sat on the idea for two years after the article first appeared.

Mike Deaver once gave some advice about politics. He said, "Persistence pays off, so be persistent." Through my persistent efforts, Mike recommended my membership on the President's National Productivity Advisory Committee and, in 1981, President Reagan appointed me to this Committee. Our first meeting was held in January of 1982.

While in Washington, I decided to get some sense of what people thought of my idea for capital for small business. I presented the idea to representative Fiedler and staff members of other representatives. At the time, budgets and deficits were paramount on everybody's mind. They appeared to like the idea for a tax incentive for investment in a small business but "now is not the time."

Being persistent again, I persuaded Representative Fiedler (R-Utah) to introduce the bill for the Small Business Investment Tax Incentive to raise up to \$250,000 by giving a tax credit for direct investment in a small business.

After the bill had been introduced, I had many meetings in Washington.

THE BILL—HELP, WE NEED IT

The Small Business Investment Tax Incentive would allow a business to raise up to \$250,000 through the sale of its stock. The deduction of up to \$15,000 per year for stock purchased in a small business would create new jobs will be created and would flow into small business if it were not for the tax.

The Small Business Investment Tax Incentive House Ways and Means Committee has taken action. Please write to the Small Business Committee and your Representative to support this needed legislation.

I have just been informed that the Entrepreneurial Assistance Act of 1982 is now law.

I wish to strongly urge your consideration of a U.S. Observer Mission chief who more closely adheres to the Administration's policy on UNESCO than does the current nominee, Leonard Marks.

As we discussed today, the leading candidate for this position, Leonard Marks, had demonstrated that he does not embrace the foreign policy objectives of President Reagan. He has, in fact, already expressed his support for UNESCO Director General M'Bow, thereby seriously reducing any hope of removing M'Bow and bringing about real changes in UNESCO's policies.

I have also received a copy of the attached letter from Mr. Marks on behalf of the New York Lawyers Alliance for Nuclear Arms Control. As you can see, Mr. Marks and his group are questioning the wisdom and safety of the Navy's plans to homeport a nuclear surface group at Staten Island. This group, by the way, targeted for opposition nearly every New York Republican during the last election, in an effort to further the disarmament agenda.

I firmly believe that these actions indicate that Leonard Marks does not firmly share the foreign policy views of this administration or its supporters, and that he is therefore the wrong choice for leading the U.S. Observer Mission to UNESCO. With Leonard Marks at the helm, I am sure that the U.S. can look forward to continued problems at UNESCO and no return by that organization to its original purpose.

I hope that you will delete Leonard Marks' name from your list of possible appointees for this important position, and that you will consider other individuals whose views are more consonant with those of President Reagan.

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

The New York Lawyers Alliance for Nuclear Arms Control ("NYLANAC"), a non-profit, non-partisan educational association, welcomes this opportunity to comment on the Navy's draft environmental impact statement concerning the proposed surface action group homeporting facility to be located at the Stapleton-Fort Wadsworth Complex at Stapleton, Staten Island.

It is NYLANAC's considered opinion that the draft environmental impact statement fails to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, 42 U.S.C. §4321 et seq., as amended, because it fails to discuss: a) the environmental impacts of a possible nuclear weapons accident involving the Tomahawk sea-launched cruise missiles which will be deployed on the USS Iowa and other vessels homeported at Stapleton and b) the safety precautions and procedures which will be employed in order to prevent such an accident. While the draft addresses some potential impacts of the proposed homeporting facility, it completely ignores the impact of what is perhaps the most environmentally threatening aspect of the proposed action, i.e., the deployment of strategic nuclear weapons in the largest and most densely populated city in the United States.
