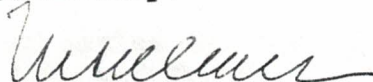

Beyond that, the expense and logistics would be prohibitive. The cost of re-erecting the reviewing stand, which would be absolutely necessary to meet the requirements of security, press coverage, etc. The marching units would have to raise funds a second time to cover their own costs, and we would probably find that most high schools are out by Memorial Day, or in the midst of final exams.

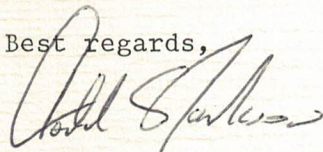
Being familiar with the charitable distribution of the money made over expenses at Presidential Inaugurations, we would like to propose the following:

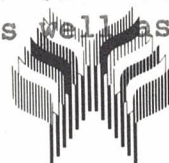
Event to Showcase Cultures of the Globe

KINGSTON, Jamaica, W.I., (December 6, 1984) -- Jamaica's World Youth Festival of Arts, to be held here April 1 - 9, 1985, will feature a wide variety of "celebration arts" in a unique gathering of artists and performers from around the world. The Festival has been planned as Jamaica's salute to the United Nations-designated International Youth Year, 1985.

Senator Olivia Grange, executive producer of the World Youth Festival of Arts, stated that the event will, "provide thousands of visitors with the opportunity to experience a broad spectrum of outstanding youth-oriented works." She added, "the event is designed to highlight not only the creativity of youth, but also of those artists who have demonstrated an ongoing understanding of the concerns of youth throughout the world."

Other Festival activities include:

- o an International Pop Music Festival at the National Stadium with world-famous pop artists headlining the three days of concerts.
- o an International Film Festival which will feature documentaries, children's films and video features from around the world. Presentations will be screened at theatres in Kingston and an international panel of film experts will give awards to films in a variety of categories.
- o the Festival of Praise and a Gospel Music Festival held at the National Stadium on Good Friday. Proponents of other religions are being encouraged to host celebrations as well. All of these activities will be open to members

of all faiths in an effort to create better understanding between the different religions of the world.

- o the Jamaican National Festival of Arts will showcase the best of Jamaica's singers, dancers, musicians, actors and visual artists, as well as feature guest international performers.

The first International Conference of Youth will take place in Kingston at the same time as the Festival. The Conference is designed to provide a serious and productive forum for the youth of the free world to work together to promote democratic values. Over 800 delegates representing democratic youth organisations from around the world will be invited to participate in the International Youth Conference, which will be held in Kingston from April 6th through 9th.

Visitors from countries worldwide are expected to travel to Jamaica to enjoy this unique presentation of the arts and cultures of the world.
