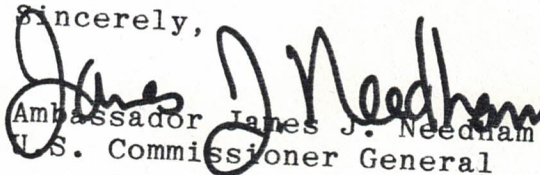

Last July, David Fisher of your Solicitor's staff drafted an opinion concerning the use of Central Valley Project water and power for fish and wildlife purposes. We understand that the draft opinion found that the 1954 act reauthorizing the CVP authorized such use of project water and power. We also understand that the draft opinion also held that under the provisions of the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act, such water and power should be provided to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife at no cost.

Mr. Fisher's draft was circulated to the Bureau of Reclamation for comment, and we understand that the Bureau disagrees with at least the fiscal part of the draft opinion. As a result, we expect that Judge Frank Richardson, representing your office, will be called upon to make a final determination.

For forty years, the California Waterfowl Association has been working to solve waterfowl and wetland problems in California. We learned long ago that, because of the arid nature of most of our state, successful solutions to waterfowl problems frequently hinge upon adequate water supplies. As a result, we are deeply involved in, and thoroughly familiar with, most of California's water issues. As far as waterfowl are concerned, these include:

1. The loss of over 90% of the state's high quality waterfowl habitat due to water developments which made possible land use conversion to irrigated agriculture.
2. The substantial responsibility of the Bureau of Reclamation and the CVP for these losses as documented by the Bureau's Central Valley Fish and Wildlife Study.
3. The lack of firm water and power supplies for the 300,000 remaining acres of high value waterfowl habitat.
4. The responsibility of the Bureau of Reclamation to maintain water quality and fish and wildlife resources in the Sacramento/San Joaquin Delta.
5. The responsibility of the Bureau of Reclamation to resolve the toxic contamination problem at the Kesterson National Wildlife Refuge and the much larger and more significant related problem in the neighboring 75,000 acres of wetland habitat known as the Grasslands.

A Solicitor's opinion along the lines of Mr. Fisher's draft opinion would dramatically improve the ability of the Bureau of Reclamation and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to respond to these issues and would also be a major step toward dealing with CVP

related impacts on fish and wildlife resources throughout California. Accordingly, we urge that your office make the Judge Richardson aware of the multiple benefits which would result from adoption of Mr. Fisher's draft opinion.

My dear Mr. Deaver:

When results of the enclosed national survey, "Americans and Their Money," were announced in October, they held a hidden key to the approaching Presidential election. In response to the question, "How is your personal financial situation now compared with four years ago?", 59% of the survey's national sample said they were better off, while 41% said their situation was the same or not as good. As we now know, that split mirrored the popular vote for the Republican and Democratic national tickets some three weeks later.

In fact, in Chicago on November 7, a local NBC-TV consumer reporter credited "Americans and Their Money" with providing "as clear an explanation of yesterday's election results as is possible."

We can't promise that this annual survey sponsored by MONEY magazine will always be so prophetic. However, we do think it will continue to be significant. We began the survey in 1983 to provide a regular profile of Americans' attitudes and behavior concerning their personal finances. Because the data are analyzed by age, sex, income, occupation and education, we end up with a detailed look at the American public along different points of the socioeconomic spectrum. Among our other findings for 1984:

- Eight out of ten American adults admit they think about money often, and 54% worry about it often. Young adults worry more than older people.
- Half of Americans feel that 1985 will be better for them financially than 1984.
- The number of people who consider their standard of living comfortable declined from 68% in 1983 to 66% in 1984. 71% of Republicans said they are "comfortable" compared with 63% for both Democrats and Independents.

- 70% of Americans are in debt, down from 74% in 1983. Average personal indebtedness also declined from \$32,500 in 1983 to \$30,000 in 1984.
- Americans' median level of investments fell from \$5,700 in 1983 to \$4,600 in 1984. That portion of Americans who have no savings or investments at all rose to 13% in 1984 from 11% in 1983.

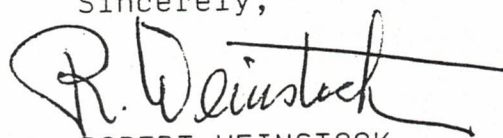
