Dear Mr. Hardison:

On behalf of the President, I am responding to your letter concerning the ceremony in Statuary Hall at the U.S. Capitol commemorating the birth of General Robert E. Lee. I appreciate this opportunity to correct the inaccurate stories which have circulated since then and trust you will agree, after reading this, that no slur to the memory of General Lee was intended, or committed.

First, I would like to set the record straight by saying that a Presidential wreath has never been provided on this occasion, claims to the contrary notwithstanding. Our "wreath" files go back to 1933 and, after thoroughly reviewing them, I assure you that there is no reference whatsoever to this event therein, until last year when the issue was first raised. Thus, statements that the President, or I -- or anyone at the White House, suddenly curtailed something that has been "traditional" since 1928 are without basis in fact and completely false.

Second, although a wreath is a costly item, expense ("economy") was not a factor in the decision. Rather, it was based on the historical and long-standing policy of many administrations; one which has been continued by President Reagan.

With the sole exception of Benjamin Franklin, the only individuals honored with commemorative Presidential wreaths are deceased former presidents. Otherwise, such wreaths are provided only on six special occasions of national significance at various sites in Arlington National Cemetery. One of them is the Confederate Monument. That monument was dedicated by President Woodrow Wilson; and, according to our records, every president since that time has had a wreath placed on Confederate Memorial Day as a gesture befitting a reunited Nation. (Those ceremonies, incidentally, are sponsored by the national office of the same organization whose D.C. chapter hosts the ceremony for General Lee at the Capitol.) Similarly, another wreath is placed at the Tomb of the Unknown (Union) Soldier from the Civil War on Memorial Day. Together these two wreaths represent the President's tribute on behalf of all Americans to all the war dead of the Civil War.

This Nation has been blessed in the numbers of its sons and daughters who lived, fought -- and often died -- for the ideals which have made it great. History rightfully calls many of

them "patriots" and "heroes," and no one disputes that General Lee ranks among the greatest of these Americans. Nevertheless, just as it is impossible to honor them all, it would be inappropriate to single out one, or several, for a unique tribute not rendered to all.

Proliferation of any item connected with the Office of the Presidency rapidly dilutes its purpose and special significance. Hence, wreaths bearing the name "Presidential" must be reserved exclusively for those occasions where such usage is most meaningful to the entire nation.

This office is not in a position to comment concerning your reference to the inauguration guide book; therefore, I have referred a copy of your letter to another office for appropriate action.

Dear Mr. President:

I wish to express my dissatisfaction with the Reagan Administration's refusal to participate in the January 19, 1985 celebration of the birthday of Robert E. Lee in Statuary Hall. The Administration's failure to provide a wreath for the occasion breaks a tradition of presidential involvement in the ceremony dating back to 1928. While presidential assistant Edward V. Hickey Jr. blamed "budgetary reasons" for the absence of the wreath, he refused to allow a donated wreath to be presented on behalf of the President. Efforts by Southern Republicans to have this decision reversed proved futile.

Given your personal fondness for heroes, the refusal of this Administration to honor General Lee, one of America's greatest heroes, is a rather conspicuous affront to Americans of Southern heritage. This insult was compounded by the subsequent decisions of the Inaugural Committee to eliminate the Confederate Memorial Hall Museum from their official guidebook and to ban Confederate uniforms from the Inaugural Parade.

While such anti-Southern measures may not be endorsed by you, they nevertheless reflect poorly upon this Administration, particularly among Southern voters. I urge you to condemn these actions and to take whatever steps are necessary to insure that such affronts to the South and its heritage are not repeated.

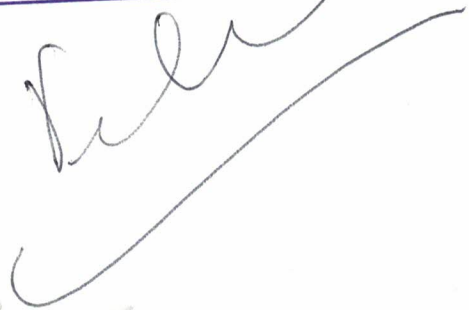

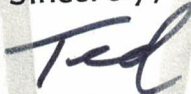

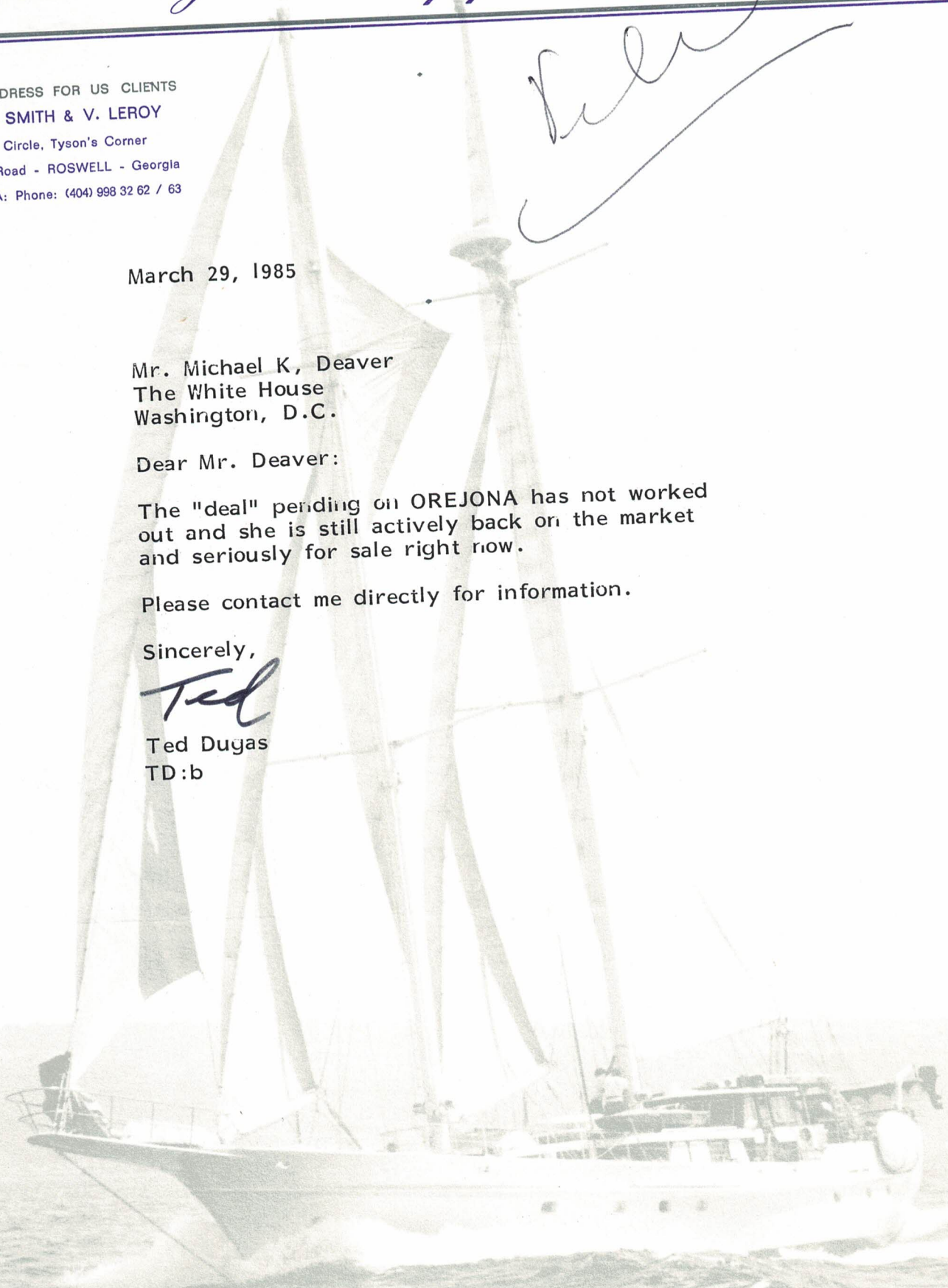

Dear Congressman Hyde,

I am writing you concerning a problem I've encountered. In speaking with your Des Plaines office, they suggested I express my concerns in a letter.

I am a teacher at Lively Jr. High in Elk Grove Village where I am a chaperone on the annual trip to Washington, D.C. In September I wrote a letter to President Reagan telling him about our school visiting the capital from March 30 through April 2. Lively is closing at the end of this school year, and it is our final trip. We wanted to make it the most special.

We received a response by phone to this letter from the White House about two weeks later. (Unfortunately, I did not get the woman's name to whom I spoke.)

The first conversation consisted of this person confirming the exact number of student's and the date which would be best for us. I said at that time it was 60 students and 5 adults. (It is now 50 students.) The next day she called again saying that we should tell Lakeland Tours to plan on us going to the White House the morning of April 2. The woman told me that we would get a confirmation about one month prior to our visit.

We were very excited, and we told our students about how the people at the White House had taken special interest in us and would be planning a special tour for us.

Last week I received a letter from Carol McCain at the White House Visitors Office. Her letter informed us that we had not been selected to go on the tour.

I was a bit confused after the two calls I had received earlier in the school year, so I called this office. I spoke with two different people who said there was nothing they could do, it was out of their hands, nobody should have called us in the first place, and that I should call back later and speak directly to Carol McCain; she makes the decisions.

I phoned later that day, and she told me that she decides who goes on the tours and who doesn't. And we weren't selected by her to be on the tour. As a matter of fact, no school groups are ever selected. I explained to her about how easy it is for a teacher to give children a little extra surprise, but it is very hard and even cruel to take away something that has been promised to them. She said we should feel free to wait in the line like everyone else to see the White House. She also curtly told me that she gets thousands of requests for group tours, and she can't pick them all. Needless to say, I was aware of that fact.

I can understand that probably hundreds of eager teachers nag this office to get their children to go on a special White House tour. But, I also realize that the office under Ms. McCain should learn to deal with these calls. After all, as one of the former residents of the White House once said, "If you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen." When you deal in public relations and deal with people (in this case a nation full of tax paying citizens) you have an obligation to handle matters with efficiency. You must also treat each person with the same consideration that should be accorded to each American citizen.

Obviously there has been a mix-up in this office. Sadly, my students have been very hurt by this incident.

Last year we were given a special letter (as were many other schools there that day). This letter at least allowed us to go to the head of the line on the tour. This tour was nothing out of the ordinary, but at least it kept us from waiting two hours in line with 50 tired fourteen year olds.

I hope that you and your office can look into this matter. We are unhappy that this incident has marred our tour which we hoped would end Lively's final Eighth Grade trip with a flourish.

Dear Mr. Regan:

In fairness, I think I should bring the following incident to your attention before, or in lieu of reporting it publicly.

On Tuesday, March 26th, a clerk in our congressional office called the White House Tour Office and requested a pass.

Instead of saying yes or no, the person in the Tour Office responded by asking how I intended to vote that day on the MX. Our clerk reported that she asked if the Tour Office person was serious and received an affirmative reply. Our clerk then said she would hang up, and did.

Naturally I was offended by the suggestion that the vote I would cast had something to do with a constituent's right to tour the White House. And I headed for the House floor to report the incident publicly in the debate, which was in progress. But on reflection, I thought it better to speak directly to the White House tour official to

determine whether there might have been a misunderstanding.

From the Capitol I called the Tour Office and spoke to Carol McCain and explained that it seemed only fair to get a better understanding of the incident before speaking publicly. I was somewhat disappointed to encounter a disputatious tone when Ms. McCain said, "we only asked how you are going to vote. It's not like asking your innermost thoughts."

I asked directly whether the White House pass was conditioned on how I would cast my District's vote on the MX. Ms. McCain said, "No," and I said, "Well then may we have the pass."

Her reply was, "We're all booked up."

Obviously that answer could have been given in the first instance and the response which was given was unfortunate.

Still, knowing you slightly and respecting you much and recalling the White House Easter egg incident last year, I find it difficult to believe that the Administration would approve of this conduct on the part of the Tour Office official. If I am right, I shall let the matter drop without public comment. I am not interested in grandstanding.

I have agreed and voted with your Administration--being the principle House advocate of at least one successful Administration measure--and I have disagreed with and voted apart from your Administration. But I have never cast a vote

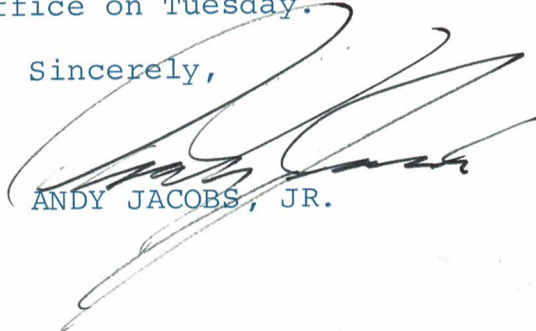
