Dear Mr. Deaver:

Although I anticipate that my local metropolitan newspaper will publish the letter of which a copy is enclosed herewith, the matter with which the letter deals is of such immediacy that I am forwarding a copy to you prior to publication.

As for the matter of a proposed visit by the President to a "death-camp" since all historians of all political shades (except, perhaps, Russophile Marxists) have agreed for twenty years--generally unbeknownst to the public at large-- that there never were any "death camps" or "extermination centers" in Germany and that they only existed in Poland in the Auschwitz-Birkenau-Sobibor complex, it is difficult to see how Mr. Reagan could visit a soi-disant "death camp" unless his visit includes Poland. In that case, of course, he could have conducted a tour of all the new facilities constructed by the Polish authorities since the war--including the non-operable crematoria.

Or perhaps there is a memorial somewhere in Germany to the upwards of 10,000,000 German refugees who lost their lives from murder and privation as they were expelled from the former eastern provinces and the Sudetenland or the several hundred thousand German P.O.W. who died in Russian slave-labor in the ten years between the end of the war and the final release of a pitiful 5000 human wrecks.

Please find enclosed a copy of a letter I sent President Reagan a week ago, and let me assure you that I am convinced that in planning the trip to Germany under the motto of reconciliation, your motivation was a noble one. Human history has not known a greater self-sacrifice than giving one's life, and I am quite amazed about the opposition to a visit to a military cemetery with German war dead.

Perhaps it ought to be emphasized that this year marks the 400th anniversary of the birth of Heinrich Schütz and the 300th anniversary of the births of Bach and Händel, composers who demonstrate that Germany has brought forth great humanists, brought joy to the world and not just suffered under Hitler who became a German citizen only a year or so before he usurped dictatorial powers. According to the front page of the Washington Post of Sunday, April 21, "before the Nazis came to power, about 600,000 Jews called Germany home. Many were leading figures in business, banking, music and literature, assimilated into German culture and society in ways matched in few other European countries at the time." Anti-semitism was imported by Hitler, after he moved from Vienna to Munich.

Dear Mr. President:

Your plan not to visit the site of a former concentration camp in Germany and to honor German war dead is fair and wise.

DeTocqueville stated that Americans, while critical of themselves, do not like being criticized by foreigners. The same applies to Germans. The most cruel regime they ever experienced has been denounced so much during the past forty years that German can be said to suffer from a Hitler complex. They have not forgotten what happened and they never will. Therefore, there is no need for foreign visitors to remind them of that unfortunate episode, especially in view of the fact that it constitutes less than 1% of German history and the German voters never gave Hitler a majority as long as there were free and unfalsified elections.

It is chivalrous international custom to honor the war dead of former enemies. The argument that the German war dead fought for a cruel regime overlooks, among other things, the cruelty of that regime. Soldiers refusing to fight were hanged or shot, just as all those who listened to enemy radio news or criticized the government were put to death. Without doubt there were among those killed in action many who believed in Hitler, brainwashing as his propaganda was. But there were also those who considered it their patriotic duty to prevent a foreign army to invade their country and who died in tune with the Latin words, dulce et decorum est pro patria mori. There were also those who merely went along fighting, although they did not really know for what. These attitudes can be found among fighting men of all armies.

The German people will appreciate your plan and would be disappointed if it were changed. Your conciliation visit could give them self-confidence the way that of de Gaulle did years ago.

Please excuse my presumptuousness to offer yet another suggestion to the many you must be getting considering the "balance" of President Reagan's forthcoming visit to Germany — but, I could not avoid recalling a factor I observed when I was assigned to USEUCOM staff near Stuttgart ten years ago.

We were obliged to take a number of our personal visitors to Dachau near Munich and it was very obvious what a painful remembrance that camp placed on the local citizenry. The village itself took much pride in the fact that it had been a cultural center with all the attendant features of a castle and ties to earlier Bavarian royalty so opposite from what the Nazis had introduced into their neighborhood in the 1930s. A large number of Germans were just as helpless to stop Nazism as we in America have been to rid ourselves of racial prejudices and the problems associated there with.

Perhaps something could be made of a visit to the sites of Bavarian culture, blemished by the camp and the absurdity of Nazism, but overcome through liberation by U.S. forces and the

- the subsequent development of bonds between Germans and Americans living in the area and throughout Germany. There are numerous U.S. and German military facilities in the vicinity to foster President Reagan's demonstration of solid partnership with NATO Germany in the 1980's.

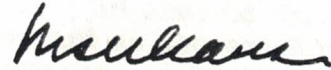

Re: Presidential Trip to West Germany in May 1985.

Dear Mr. Deaver:

I am in complete agreement with President Reagan's decision and purpose regarding his upcoming visit to West Germany in May 1985. Unfortunately, emotionalism, to some degree, has unknowingly diminished the importance of the trip which concerns ties with one of our strongest NATO Allies.

The Bitburg visit is just another personal reminder of events that occurred 40 years ago which had a profound impact on my life. Bitburg, as you know, was the staging area for the Germans who attacked the U.S. Forces at Bastogne, Belgium. It was, however, the 4th Armored Division of General Patton's 3rd U.S. Army who liberated the surrounded 101st U.S. Airborne Division. Ironically, the 4th Armored Division crushed the German armor and pushed to and past Bitburg, of all places. As a teenage rifleman assigned to the 1st Squad, Company B, 53rd Armored Infantry Battalion, 4th Armored Division we continued eastward as the point of an advance element and liberated the concentration camp at Ohrdruf in what is now East Germany. When relieved by another division while still further east at Crimmitschau and only 40 miles from contact with the Russian Army, we pushed south and then east again into Czechoslovakia by way of the Regen Pass.

In order to help compensate for the wreath laying controversies as it now stands, I would like to suggest having the president make an unannounced stop and lay a wreath at the point the 4th Armored Division entered or exited from what is now East Germany, unless other points along the Iron Curtain would be more appropriate. The occasion could serve as a grim reminder of the "living dead" still behind the Iron Curtain and may help defuse the over emotional situation. Certainly, we should all support our president's decision who has many important matters on his mind.

Best of luck to all for a successful trip to West Germany.

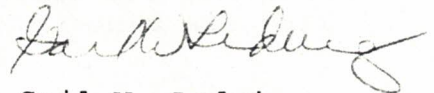

You have asked for my views on an April 10 letter to you from Michael Srednick. In his letter, Mr. Srednick conveyed the interest of Celestron Precision Optics in donating a \$6,000 telescope to the country through the President. The President could accept such a gift on behalf of the Government. After any such acceptance, the telescope would be turned over to the General Services Administration for disposition.

Celestron must understand that it may not use the presentation in any commercial promotion. The President's name could not be used in advertising for Celestron, nor could the fact that he accepted the telescope on behalf of the United States. Such promotion by Celestron would contravene established White House policy against any use of the President's name in a manner that suggests or could be construed as endorsement of any commercial product or enterprise. I am particularly concerned about this potential problem in light of Srednick's letter, which notes that the telescope in question "is owned by both Johnny Carson and Leonard Nimoy, just to mention a couple names."

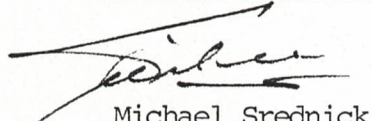
