Dear Mike:

It was great to bump into you in LaGuardia Airport on Monday and to chat a bit about recent events concerning the President's Mid-East Peace Plan, especially since I was enroute to Washington to visit with Bob Tuttle.

Bob had asked me in to explore my current interests in helping the Administration. I told him quite honestly that there was one post coming open which would arrest me in every way: the ambassadorship to Israel. Sam Lewis, our current Ambassador and a career man, is planning to retire and will probably leave his post in the summer.

It is a bold idea, Mike, to name a Jewish person to that post. It must be someone who strongly supports the Reagan Plan; who is willing to do honest battle with Prime Minister Begin when the policies of the two countries do not converge (as will continue to be the case for some time); and who, above all, is willing to be an articulate spokesperson in Israel and to the American Jewish community as to the wisdom of the President's policies and his abiding commitment to the security of Israel.

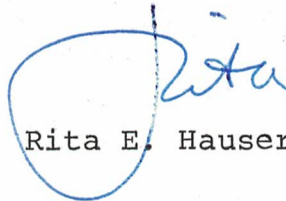

I told Bob I am sure others can fit this bill. For me, it would be a splendid challenge and a chance to work for policies and principles I deeply believe in, knowing full well that many American Jews need yet to be convinced on this score. I think such an appointment would be a dramatic stroke for the President, for it would demonstrate his knowledge that American Jews can love and cherish Israel without necessarily supporting all its policies. In other words, it would go far toward dissipating the "dual loyalty" argument, and would thus be widely supported in many quarters in our country and in the Jewish community in particular.

I told Bob I am available to help in any way I can in the foreign policy area - which is my field of interest. The 1984 election will be very tough, and will, in my view, be won or lost in the center among independent voters whose party ties are weak but who are heavily issue oriented.

I hope to see you again soon. Best of wishes to everyone.

Marketing Orders Meeting

Congressman Pashayan and several colleagues from California, Oregon, and Washington are visiting you to complain about the administration's handling of marketing order regulations for fruits, vegetables, and nuts. USDA marketing orders cover 47 of these crops. Most orders involve size, grade, and container standards and are relatively uncontroversial. But 11 of the orders--including oranges, lemons, hops, spearmint, almonds, and raisins grown on the West Coast--involve direct production controls such as entry restrictions ("allotments") and season-long volume controls ("prorates," "reserve pools," and "market allocations"). OMB has taken the position that these controls are inconsistent with the President's Executive Order 12291, while USDA believes that the controls should generally be continued. A decision paper from the CCFA to the President is being prepared this week that presents these two options.

I expect that the congressmen will make two arguments to you. First, they will argue that we should not attempt to make any changes in the production-control marketing orders, and that any such attempt would prompt a legislative reversal. Some, such as Chip, will say that the controls are good policy, since production of these crops is unique and the free market "doesn't work" without federal regulation. Others, such as Sid Morrison, will admit privately that the production controls are terrible policy, but argue that it would be politically rash to oppose them, given the strong support for them from growers groups, who are generally solidly Republican. They will probably argue that Governor Reagan was a supporter of state marketing orders, and may argue that the policy changes OMB advocates would be illegal (I can't answer the first question, but there are no legal difficulties).

Second, they will object that the administration has caused serious problems in Washington and Oregon by delaying a decision on this year's hops and spearmint oil production controls for several months. They will point out that it is getting very late in the season for both crops, that the delay has created major market uncertainties, and that disapproval of the controls would diminish the market value of the producers current "allotments" (permission to market the crops), which are used as collateral

for bank loans. The two orders have been the subject of a longstanding disagreement between USDA and OMB, and final decision on this year's controls has been held up pending last week's CCFA meeting on the general policy issue and the decision paper to the President.

Talking Points:

- o We are not attempting to "ruin" the marketing order program. There is no objection within the administration to most of the orders, which do not involve production controls. Only 11 of the 47 orders have such controls, and these cover only 14% of U.S. production of fruits, vegetables, and nuts.
- o The production controls present serious policy issues under the President's regulatory reform and agricultural policies. The controls interfere with entrepreneurial freedom by transferring key business decisions from the individual grower to administrative committees backed by the government. While supporters argue this is essential to promote "orderly markets," opponents argue that most of these kinds of crops are marketed profitably without any production controls, and that the controls themselves cause serious resource misallocation and inflated prices. There are deep divisions within each marketing order crop--some producers favoring the production controls and others opposing them just as strongly. And press accounts of crops being held off the market or abandoned in the fields are bad for the administration.
- o We are going to resolve the hops and spearmint oil issues promptly--within a matter of days--but the general question of season-long production controls needs to be resolved as well, in order to avoid similar crop-by-crop controversies in the future. The current USDA Marketing Order Guidelines have proven too vague and ambiguous to provide a useful guide to individual production-control decisions.
- o Any general policy change will be applied prospectively only, and will be implemented in a way that avoids disruption of current marketing plans.

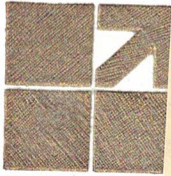

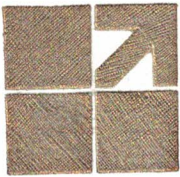

Dear Senator Dole:

To say that I am disappointed in your stand concerning banks is an understatement. I became a Republican in 1952 because of these types of comments from then President Harry Truman.

We had thousands of our depositors flood us with inquiries as soon as information became public about withholding from interest and dividends. 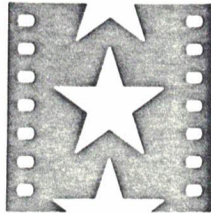

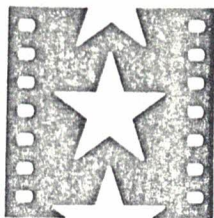

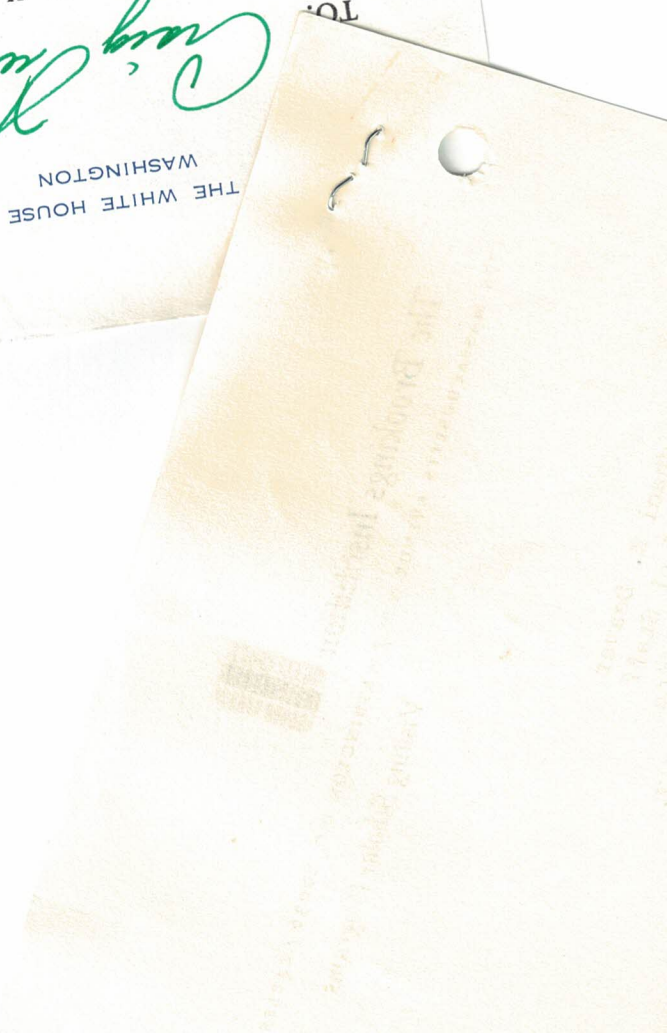

Last November 11, I wrote you requesting an interview in connection with a project I am conducting at Brookings. Subsequently, I contacted your office a few times. However, I could not establish whether you had seen my letter and would give an interview. Since you were engaged at the time in a heavy travel schedule, I decided to defer further contacts.

To refresh your memory, I am preparing a book focusing on organization of the White House and the operation of cabinet-level consultation under the Reagan administration. I have published previously with Macmillan, the University of Toronto Press, and Yale University Press.

I expect that my book on the Reagan advisory system will become a prominent part of the scholarly record. To date, I have encountered exceptional cooperation from various elements of the White House.

I hasten to acknowledge that your own case is unusual due to your extremely tight work schedule. However, I would be grateful for whatever time, even if relatively modest, you could spare. I cannot go far in such a specialized project without considering your role. I would feel vastly more confident in fulfilling my mission if I had the advantage of a session with you.

I will be in touch with your appointments secretary to see if we can in fact arrange a session. I greatly appreciate any further consideration you have given to this request.
