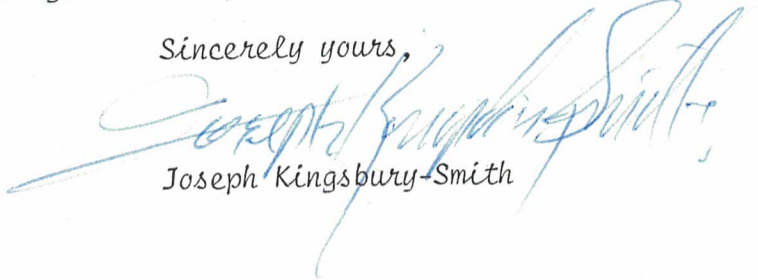

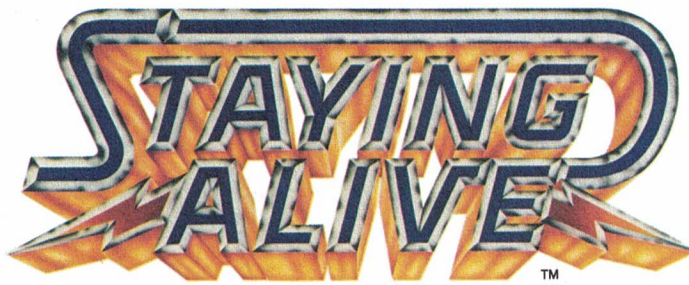

Mary, my sister, thought some advisor in the White House could be interested in the columns also.

The gist of the printed column is that, contrary to the bishops, the Kremlin's population centers are not innocent but are "material co-operators" (a technical term in moral philosophy) in evil.

The gist of the latest column copy argues that denying innocent people their right of self-defense through fear of material evil is unjustifiable and immoral.

Mike, we appreciate all your efforts for our country and the world. You're in our prayers.

The Moral Angle



Q. The main argument of some clergymen, including many of the Catholic bishops in the United States, opposed morally to nuclear warfare is that nuclear weapons produce massive and indiscriminate destruction directly intending the death of innocent people yet directly intending the death of innocent people can never be morally allowed.

Do you agree?

William G.

A. The major premise, the prohibition against the direct killing of the innocent, is certainly correct. Terrorists, for instance, will sometimes kill a child of the opposition leader and threaten to kill the rest of his family unless he surrenders. Even for the best of causes such means may never be used.

Along with that premise the clergymen probably also hold the traditional moral principle that the indirect killing of innocent people can be allowed for an adequate reason. For example, when bombing of a munitions factory of the gravely unjust aggressor is necessary to bring the war to a halt and prevent further unjust harm, the foreseen death of innocent people living near the factory ordinarily does not prohibit the bombing. The factory, not the people, is the target.

However, their minor premise, the use of nuclear bombs capable of destroying the whole population of a city directly intends the death of innocent people, is questionable.

The clergymen seem to presuppose the bombings in all cases would be indiscriminate—intentionally thrown at innocent and guilty alike. Then they also presuppose that, no matter what the circumstance, the people of a city who are not producing goods directly related to military purposes are innocent and therefore may not be bombed.

But it is not possible for warring countries to use nuclear weapons against military targets only? One nuclear bomb probably could completely de-activate the largest aircraft carrier and do it very cheaply. (I understand the free world's nuclear arsenal at one-tenth the cost counterbalances the Soviet conventional forces poised against Europe.) But the problem lies, it seems, in the fallout drifting across to cities not only of the countries shooting at each other but also of other countries. Solving the problem lies in analysing the clergymen's second supposition.

Are most civilians in an unjust aggressor's cities completely innocent or, at least, innocent enough to prohibit their being killed directly? It seems the answer would have to be in the affirmative when each of the warring nations have and practice, by and large, a fair sense of justice. In the Falkland War, for instance, it seems nuclear bombing by Britain or Argentina of each other's cities would have been morally inexcusable. In such cases the bone of contention would be much too

small to allow obliteration of entire cities as well as the fallout on the rest of the world and probably even the fallout from nuclear bombing of military installations alone. But when an almost diabolically unjust aggressor, on his way to enslaving the whole world, would enslave or destroy an entire nation, does his own civilian population still retain sufficient innocence to prohibit being annihilated in a desperate self-defense measure by the potential victim nation?

By the way, a number of the clergy in question seem to fail to recognize that the free world is facing such an inhuman aggressor. Rather, they equate the Kremlin's desire for peace with Washington's and see us as no less of an aggressor than the Kremlin. Against such a foe, then, they naturally would oppose nuclear warfare.

Now, when an aggressor would inhumanly enslave a nation on his way to enslaving the entire world, the majority of the people in his cities would probably be civilians and non-combatants in the sense that, unlike soldiers and munition workers, they would not be directly aiding the unjust war. Yet would they not be the resource for the war—providing money, food, propaganda, communications, clothes, personnel and so many other things? It seems, then, most people in the cities would be material co-operators in the evil of their leader. Their co-operation may be indirect and remote, yet it could be essential to the war effort. So as material co-operators they would be sharing in the guilt of their leader even though they were civilians and ordinarily considered non-combatants.

If the potential victim nation, then, could not defend herself adequately by less destructive means than by destroying the sources of the evil aggressor's power, it seems she would be morally free to obliterate his cities; the people would lack sufficient innocence to prohibit the attack.

Of course, cities would have lower priority as a military target than combat soldiers, tanks, airplanes, armament factories and the like. But in a total war effort, it seems most people of an inhuman totalitarian power would be contributing to the war, except for such people as the very young and the elderly in rest homes. Those few really innocent people would not be the targets; their deaths would be indirect and could be morally permitted.

The potential victim nation would undoubtedly suffer great destruction. Yet, it seems she has a right to accept the destruction and fight to the death rather than to go into slavery.

The harm from nuclear fallout which could come to spectator nations could also be allowed it seems. Either they belong to the free world and should be willing to suffer rather than lose their freedom or they have been aiding somehow the diabolic tyrant. In either case it seems their suffering would be morally allowable.

Could it be true that our right of self-defense cancels out when too many people would necessarily die? I thought we could use whatever force was necessary to stop someone trying to enslave or murder us.

A. The least immoral act can never be justified even though it would mean saving an entire city from obliteration. Obliteration of a city with her people is a material evil; immorality is an evil of the rational soul, deteriorating the very worth of a person as a human being. No amount of material evil can harm a person's worth. Death can take a man's family and friends, and he himself can be crippled, diseased, blind; yet all those evils cannot of themselves change the man from loving what he should love. Immorality, though, corrupts his love, makes him less good, less courageous, less trustworthy, less worthy of being human.

The people of a just nation have a right to life, which inseparably means a right to defend the possession of it. So denying the right to self-defense, it seems, unjustly denies innocent people their right to life and allows them to be killed directly.

The fact that allowing the immorality would prevent massive material destruction of cities and their populations cannot, as was said in the first paragraph, justify the immorality.

By the way, it seems pacifists act immorally when they refuse to help protect their community from being treated very unjustly, perhaps murdered or enslaved. They are part of the community and as part are bound to sacrifice themselves for the good of the whole. They need the community for their well-being; in return they share the responsibility of protecting her existence and rights. At the same time, they are obliged, like all men, to prevent unjust evil when they reasonably can.

Lois Sabatino, Manager Community Relations of United Technologies, Hartford, Connecticut, advised that they are sponsoring a one-minute, every week-night program entitled, "Good News Break" as a direct result of reading that First Lady Nancy Reagan said that the media was reporting only gloom and doom and not good news. The program is aired in Hartford on WVIT-TV, an NBC affiliate, 6:59 to 7:00 p.m. immediately following the local news program.

The subjects covered in these programs are health, science and technology, the elderly, social welfare, sports, recreation, education, youth, business and industry, arts, government and history. United Technologies' budget for this program is \$163,000 per year. They are sending video tapes.

Although this copyrighted program is currently only aired in Hartford, United Technologies, which is worldwide, plans to bring the program to other geographic regions in which they have offices.
