SUBJECT: Proposed Gift of Aeration System

Thank you for your June 10, 1983 memorandum responding to David Waller's request for further details regarding the aeration system that Mr. Dick Franklin, President of Ramco Sales Inc., has expressed an interest in giving to the President for use in the pond at Rancho del Cielo.

Although there is no legal prohibition per se to the President's acceptance of the aeration system, the gift should not be accepted if Mr. Franklin or Ramco Sales Inc. has or seeks to obtain contractual or other business relations with any department or agency in the Executive branch, conducts activities regulated by any department or agency in the Executive branch, or has any interests which may be substantially affected by official actions taken by the President.

If the gift is accepted, the retail value of the equipment and the cost of its installation would, of course, have to be listed in the President's annual Financial Disclosure Report which will be filed next May. As you know, President and Mrs. Reagan have endeavored to hold to a minimum the total value of gifts personally accepted by them. To that end, many of the gifts given to them, rather than being personally accepted, have been designated by them for possible inclusion in the Presidential Library. The Office of Government Ethics has advised that gifts so designated need not be reported in the Financial Disclosure Report. That option obviously is unavailable with respect to the instant gift offer. Thus, the decision to be made by President and Mrs. Reagan between accepting the aeration system as a gift and purchasing it, */ should be made with the knowledge that, if accepted as a gift, the \$945 retail value will have to be reported in next year's Financial Disclosure Report. Although

*/ The offer to lease the equipment to the President "for a very small amount then turn it over [to the President] when he leaves

this office would recommend against acceptance of this offer, Mike Deaver, as you know, has worked very closely with President and Mrs. Reagan in making these determinations, and I suggest you consider discussing this matter with him.

Regardless of whether the aeration system is accepted as a gift or purchased, it would be inappropriate for Mr. Franklin to use the President's name or likeness in advertising or commercial promotion in any way that suggests a connection between the President or First Lady and such advertising or promotion. Thus, if you have any reason whatsoever to believe that Mr. Franklin may attempt to utilize the President's name, likeness, etc., in connection with the promotion of his equipment, we will notify him of this restriction on advertising as contained in the Do's and Don'ts in Advertising Copy published by the Council of Better Business Bureaus, Inc.

Thank you for bringing this matter to our attention.

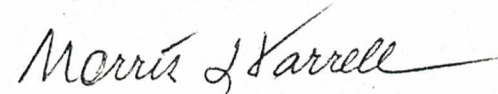

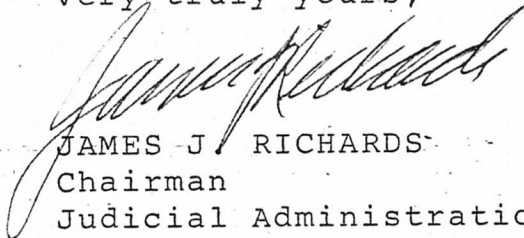
