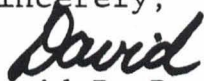

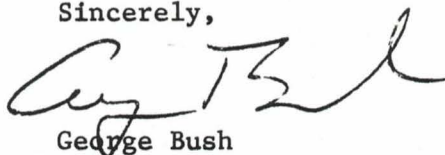

Heroes say they would do it again

Vain effort to rescue woman leaves both men with injuries

Two young men who made a valiant but vain effort to save an elderly Palo Alto woman from her burning house say they would do it all again, even though both were injured during the rescue attempt and one of them may be out of work for weeks.

One of the heroes, David White, 24, of Cupertino, has an appointment with an orthopedic specialist today to determine when he will undergo surgery to repair a tendon he apparently severed when he used his bare hand to smash open a window of the burning house.

White said it may take weeks to regain use of the hand.

"Like I told the doctor, I think I would do it all over again, but I don't think I would knock out that window with my hand," said White, a self-employed landscaper. "I would do it again, but I'd find another way to enter the house."

The other hero, Sean White, 21, of Mountain View, said he suffered third-degree burns on his right hand. Although he has gone back to his job with a Sunnyvale construction company, he is only able to do light work, he said.

The fire victim, Lillian Avilla, 74, was pronounced dead at the scene.

The drama began shortly after 3 a.m. Monday when the two friends were on their way home. Both had spent Sunday to-

gether, watching the Super Bowl on TV and partying with other friends.

Normally, they would have taken Alma Street home, David said, but as fate would have it, they wound up on Middlefield Road.

Sean, who was driving, was the first to spot flames coming from a house at 1717 Middlefield Road. He made an abrupt U-turn and pulled up in front of the house.

"The house was fully engulfed in flames by the time we got there," Sean said. "We got out and we just started breaking win-

dows and doors" to get in.

"I thought there might have been kids in that house," David said in a separate interview Tuesday. "You see something like that and a lot of things go through your mind."

David said he ran next door to alert neighbors, while Sean looked for a way to get into the house.

When David returned, Sean told him he had spotted what appeared to be an unconscious woman in one of the bedrooms.

Together, the two friends forced open a

door and entered the inferno, but they lost each other in the thick, choking smoke.

Sean managed to reach the elderly woman's bedroom, where the heat was so intense that household items made of plastic already were melting.

Meanwhile, David went around outside and, unable to find anything with which to smash open the bedroom window, used his bare left hand, apparently slashing a tendon in the process.

By that time, Palo Alto firefighters were starting to arrive.

David said that with all the excitement he didn't notice his cut hand until Sean pointed it out later.

The two friends helped firefighters pull the victim through the bedroom window, not realizing she was already dead of smoke inhalation.

David, his hand bleeding profusely from his cut, sat with the victim on the ground.

"I had never seen anyone die before," he said. "Her head was on my lap, and I was massaging her face. I didn't even know she was dead. I just did the best I could."

A police officer said David was so overwrought by the ordeal that

he knelt on the ground and sobbed.

Paramedics later bandaged David's wound and advised him to seek further medical attention, according to a Fire Department report.

David and Sean stayed long enough to give a police officer their statements, then they drove home, emotionally drained by the ordeal.

Fire investigators have determined a burning cigarette may have fallen into an overstuffed chair in the victim's living room, setting off the blaze that apparently had smoldered for several hours.

Fire damage was estimated at more than \$200,000.

There were no smoke detectors in the house, fire investigators said.

Assistant Fire Chief Jim McLaughlin said Tuesday he was "grateful" for the actions taken by David and Sean, although it is Fire Department policy to discourage citizens from helping once fire-

fighters arrive at the scene.

Palo Alto police Officer Dave Trujillo described the actions by the two young men as "pretty incredible," and police officials said they would recommend that both receive commendations.

But because of their injuries, both men are having to pay for their heroism.

For David in particular, the problems have just begun. After surgery to repair the severed tendon, he will have to undergo weeks of therapy. He said his doctor has told him he may be out of work for up to two months.

"I don't know how much it's going to cost," said David, who has no medical insurance. "I imagine that because a specialist is involved it's going to cost a lot."

Sean, like his friend, said despite his injury he would do it all over again.
