Dear Mike:

As you undoubtedly know, although I no longer own a public opinion firm, I still do a great deal of consulting for a number of the leading companies in those instances where individuals or companies are questioning their results.

What is fascinating to me is the number that are contacting me relative to the consistency and durability of the President's lead. Contrary to what happened with Humphrey (where he made steady gains on Nixon), Walter Mondale on an overall basis is not able to develop the same pattern. In some states, he has made gains, but on an overall basis, the President's strength stays remarkably firm. From time to time, I will try to pass on comparable information if you desire, because on most instances I am able to discuss subjects on an overall basis like this even as to changes within some states.

Also, the issue on which I have been meaning to write to you for some weeks is the impending selection of a Chairman to replace C. Douglas Dillon as Chairman of the National Museum Services Board. Although I am myself personally interested in the appointment, I also believe that Dr. Peter Raven, who was the number two candidate for Secretary of the Smithsonian, would be an excellent choice because of his service on the Board and his standing in his profession, plus his willingness, as in my case, to give the time necessary to do the job as it should be done.

Both of us are of the same general philosophy as would be the President insofar as Federal Grants

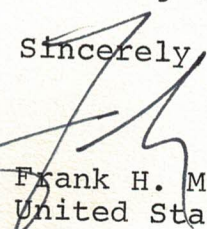
