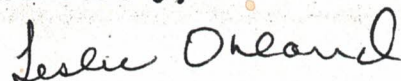

Charter 100 Comes to D.C.

Is Washington ready for another networking group? At least one Washington woman is convinced it is and thinks her concept of a networking group to span all networking groups will succeed.

Diana Zanetti, a Reagan appointee handling refugee, asylum, and parole issues at the Immigration and Naturalization Service, believes her Charter 100, which brings together women from different fields, is unusual enough to survive in Washington, which is filled with networking groups.

"All the other groups specialize in one profession. If you are a lawyer, you stick with lawyers. If you are a doctor, you stick with doctors. You're isolated, but Charter 100 is a mix," Zanetti says.

"This is a coalition of leading women in every facet of professional and community life—legal, medical, business, educational, politics, sports, and the arts, including top volunteer women," she says.

The nonprofit, tax-exempt group is being styled after several Zanetti founded on the West coast. Her first—the Charter 100 of San Diego—now numbers two hundred women. Groups also have been formed in Dallas, Houston, Orange County, Baja California, and Phoenix, where Sandra Day O'Connor was a member.

Although it has had a handful of lunches since December and counts twenty-eight Washington women as members, Charter 100 is still being formed here and will establish membership criteria this summer, says Zanetti. Still, at least one thing is decided: Dues will be \$150 a year.

Designer Takes On Boring Desks

Working world rise up! Your desks are too dull, or so argues Margery Goldberg, a wood sculptor and furniture designer, who has launched her own campaign to brighten up Washington's offices through its furniture.

"Your desk should be an extension of your personality. Chances are you sit at that desk up to ten hours a day, five or six days a week," she says. "And who wants a desk like everyone else?"

Besides being the director and an owner of the Zenith Gallery, Goldberg fashions mirrors, desks, conference, dining room, and cocktail tables with the five women wood workers she employs in a workshop next to the Zenith Gallery.

"A lot of what people buy in the way of office furniture is nothing more than mass produced plywood or veneer, not well made or finished, not fashioned from woods of interesting colors, and not meeting their particular needs," contends Goldberg.

One place Goldberg has made inroads in her efforts to spruce up people's offices is at the law firm of Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering, where she has a special connection: One of its partners, Michael Klein, is a partner in the Zenith Gallery.

Goldberg's latest desk creation, which will go to firm partner, Andy

*Parr Prosecuting Iffy Tax Shelters

"It's a very big thing. I mean, it can make a dent in the national debt," says Carolyn M. Parr, of the \$4 billion in additional taxes the Justice Department may collect from illegal shelters.

Seventy thousand individual investors are getting letters from the IRS Commissioner advising them their shelter is being investigated.

Under 1982 legislation which puts the monkey on the promoter's rather than the investor's back, Justice has accepted 58 of 63 IRS-recommended actions for litigation.

Parr, acting chief of the Office of Special Litigation at Justice, has obtained thirteen injunctions, filed

twenty-eight suits with another twenty-five in preparation for filing, and has an additional 250 actions in the pipeline. She advises.

"Don't take the deduction."

Parr waited eighteen years after graduation from Stetson University to enter law school. "I always thought I would make a good lawyer but until the women's movement I didn't have the courage," she says.

She's invited to scores of legal and accounting professional meetings to discuss the drive against abusive shelters, and finds the professions squarely behind the move to go after promoters who "get cash back out of other taxpayers' pockets."

Frequently, a client will hear from a friend about a shelter with an eight-to-one write-off and then immediately go to her tax lawyer or accountant to complain. Parr says. When her advisor explains that he doesn't like it, the client often goes to her friend's adviser, buys in and gets bitten.

Lawyer Discloses Secret Weapon

Elizabeth Guhring is considered one of Washington's top divorce lawyers.

The partner in Guhring and Forbes has a secret to her success. It's shorthand.

"I don't like lawyers sitting across tables from me reading my notes, so I take it all in shorthand," admits Guhring, who says it also has come in handy taking down judge's decisions and statements made by opposing counsel.
