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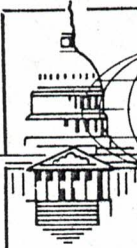

Dear Pen:

It was good seeing you last week at the Heritage Foundation dinner. You look very well considering the intense pressure that you are under over there.

You are right, you haven't heard from me about a post in the new Administration. My law practice is humming along and I am engaged in several very interesting projects, particularly in Central America.

I enjoyed the two weeks I spent as a surrogate speaker on the college campuses and I am very enthusiastic about the way the new Administration is proceeding and the sense of direction and leadership that the President is providing.

Despite my inclination to remain in the private sector during these years of mid-career, I do wish to serve in some capacity, particularly if the right opportunity arises. Therefore, there is a post I would like to be seriously considered for and that post is Ambassador to Brazil.

I lived and worked in Brazil for two years in the mid-sixties setting up non-profit corporations which mobilized the support of private industry to invest in self-help programs in the urban areas of Rio and Sao Paulo, and to provide low interest loans to small farmers in the impoverished northeast. This was an outgrowth of a successful program I had organized in Venezuela four years earlier. Acao. Comunitaria do Brasil, as it was called, was sponsored by the ACCION movement out of New York whose first Chairman was Don Kendall, Chairman of Pepsico, and was later headed by John Duncan, now the Chairman of the Council of the Americas. Many other prominent U.S. business leaders were actively involved in the ACCION program. The Brazilian operation continued to grow. In fact, last year the New York Times featured the results of 15 years of successful work in the Brazilian northeast.

The key to the success of the program was that the private sector, bankers and industrialists, principally from the Latin American countries, gave the time and money and materials to invest in the poorest areas of the countries and demonstrate that the people need not depend upon their

government to solve their problems. Rather the people, in partnership with the private sector, can improve their own lives.

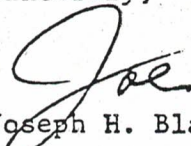
Throughout the years I maintained contact with Brazil. The Peace Corps had a large program there, for example, and I stayed in touch with the business community and helped the Sao Paulo Chamber of Commerce in some of their programs in this country in 1978. In June 1977, the Washington Post printed an article I wrote criticizing the Carter Administration's handling of that important friend and ally. Needless to say, my wife and I both speak Portuguese and have maintained good friends in both the American and Brazilian business communities.

I am personally convinced that the Reagan Administration has a unique opportunity to become closer to Brazil as a friend, trading partner and regional ally in the southern hemisphere, and I would be honored to serve our government as President Reagan's emissary there.

I have attached my resume, the article on Brazil and a list of individuals in the Administration and on the Hill, as well as other former officials and business leaders, who are familiar with my background and who would, I believe, endorse me for this important post.

Many thanks for your consideration of this request. I look forward to hearing from you.

U.S.-Brazilian Relations: Can the Strains Be Eased?

Rosalynn Carter's visit to Brazil this week presents the biggest challenge of her South American trip. Her diplomatic skills will be sorely tested if she is to repair the needlessly strained relations between the two countries.

Brazil-U.S. relations have been dull yet comfortable over the last decade, but have plummeted dramatically since Rosalynn's husband took office. Nuclear proliferation, human rights and the arms race are the issues in the eyes of the Carter administration. What grates on Brazilian nerves is the way their country has been treated when those questions have been raised.

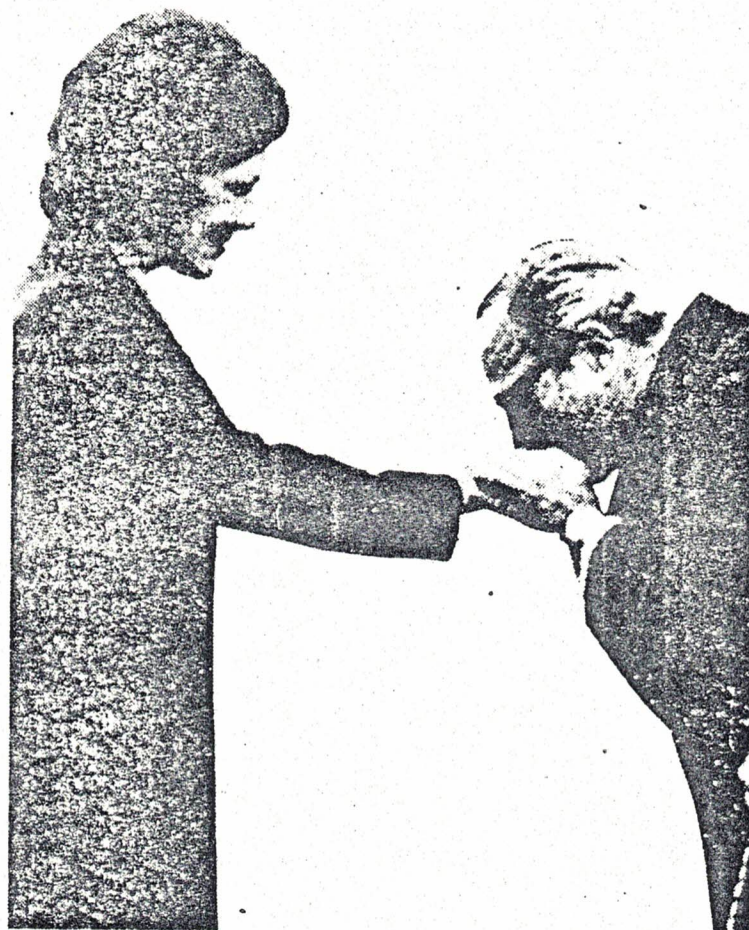
The new administration was scarcely a few days old when Vice

President Mondale suggested to Chancellor Helmut Schmidt that West Germany cancel a \$4 billion agreement to supply Brazil with a nuclear fuel recycling plant. The Brazilian government was shocked that it was not consulted on the meeting. The agreement had already been signed with U.S. blessing, and an accord had been reached with the International Atomic Energy Agency providing strict safeguards to prevent the explosion of nuclear devices or the transfer of nuclear technology to third countries. The Carter administration began with a rude bang as far as the Brazilians were concerned.

But more shock waves were to come. No sooner had the Mondale flap subsided than Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher took off for Brasilia to pressure the Brazilians into backing off on the West German contract. The Brazilians told him coldly that the nuclear deal was on, period. U.S. meddling, as they saw it, was not welcome.

Things went from bad to worse. The State Department then handed the Brazilian government—and made public—a report criticizing its handling of the human rights of Brazilian citizens and citing the torture of political prisoners. Foggy Bottom admitted that the report was mild in its criticism and even stated that things were getting better. Besides, the Carter ad-

ministration viewed the publication of the report, prepared by the previous administration, as separate from the nuclear issue.

But the Brazilians did not. The Brazilian press erupted. To them it was another U.S. attempt to pressure Brazil on the nuclear deal. Brazilians were puzzled that similar reports were not delivered to governments that violated human rights far more seriously, such as Iran, the Philippines and Korea. And why, Brazilians wondered, was Washington warming to Castro, whose record on human rights was the worst in the hemisphere?

The State Department tried to soothe things over. A private meeting was arranged between Secretary of

State Vance and Brazilian Foreign Minister Antonio Azeredo da Silveira. But President Carter's public remarks, as recently as five weeks ago, continued to exacerbate relations. His statement that he would withstand criticism on the human-rights question from countries "such as the Soviet Union and Brazil" couldn't help but hurt deeply.

It was indeed surprising for the President to lump Russia and Brazil in the same category since Brazilian-American friendship goes way back. While other Latin American countries were flirting with Hitler, Brazil sent troops to Italy to fight against the fascist powers. Since then both countries have exchanged thousands of stu-

dents and political leaders, including the former governor of Georgia himself. As recently as a year ago, Secretary of State Henry Kissinger signed a "memo of understanding" that pledged close cooperation and consultation, a move hailed in Brazil as a bright new day in Brazilian-U.S. relations.

Unfortunately this nose dive in official relations has happened just as Brazil is reaching its potential as an emerging world power. With U.S. prodding and support, the military and civilian elite that has governed the nation since 1964 has sustained a 10 per cent annual growth rate and made Brazil an industrial nation that produces automobiles, steel, aluminum and chemicals. It is, moreover, the world's leading exporter of iron ore and coffee. Despite great poverty, if the growth rate stays at 8 per cent, the current gross national product of \$126 billion will grow to \$215 billion by the year 2000. Brazil's economy will then be the size of Japan's in the early 1970s.

The missing link in Brazil's development is energy. That's why the nuclear issue is so touchy. West German technology will help Brazil get out from under a \$3 billion yearly oil bill and make the country sufficient in energy before the year 2000.

U.S. concerns over human rights and spreading nuclear power will affect the future of our relations with Brazil and many other countries. American officials will press hard in these matters. Agreement won't come easily. But nations are as proud as individuals and even more sensitive. The public statements rebuking the Brazilian government, for example, triggered overwhelming support in its behalf from its own critics. "The sovereignty of the country is at stake," declared the leader of the opposition party. "We carry out opposition to the government, not the nation."

Consultation and quiet pressure may not always work on fellow sovereign nations. But respect and consideration to friends are also American values. As one Brazilian diplomat remarked privately: "If you have a good friend that you think drinks too much, you pull him aside, point out his fault and offer guidance. You don't stand up and publicly denounce him as a drunk."

Peace Corps Has Always Kept Clean

The Peace Corps should not be removed from ACTION as some members of the Senate are advocating. Sen. Alan Cranston tried to block the nomination of Tom Pauken to head ACTION because Pauken served in military intelligence in Vietnam 12 years ago - and the director of ACTION also oversees the Peace Corps.

In another attempt to thwart the president's choice, Sen. Cranston now wants to take the Peace Corps out from under ACTION and put it in the State Department. He claims that if Mr. Pauken is anywhere near the Peace Corps, his background will scare people in the Third World and perhaps endanger Peace Corps volunteers.

This is the same debate that has been carried on since the Peace Corps' founding, and by now it is one of those arguments that may mean something in Washington but has no reality beyond the Potomac.

Ever since the Peace Corps began 20 years ago, the Soviets have been trying to convince the Third World that the Peace Corps is a CIA plot, in spite of the fact that six presidents, from Kennedy to Reagan, have maintained strict adherence to a complete separation of the Peace Corps and the CIA, both in fact and appearance.

There is nothing in Peace Corps policy, however, which would prevent someone who has served in military intelligence many years ago from also serving in the Peace Corps today.

Regardless of Peace Corps policy or how the corps is positioned in the federal bureaucracy, the Soviets will continue to claim that the volunteers are spies. On my first trip to Africa in 1969, Soviet propaganda and columnist Jack Anderson claimed that I was trained and financed by the CIA. Anderson publicly retracted the claim, but the Soviets went further. Since I had played tournament tennis while in college, the Soviets pushed the line that the popular television series "I Spy,"

then being syndicated in the Third World, was the story of my life.

The people of the Third World and their leaders weren't impressed by this propaganda many years ago and couldn't care less today. They have enough problems to cope with in their daily lives to worry about Washington political machinations or appearances that the backgrounds of ACTION directors may give.

Besides, these countries have witnessed and been impressed by the work of thousands of volunteers and never has there been a single incident of spying or intelligence gathering. As one African official who supervised Peace Corps programs in his country told me, "If sending volunteers is what the CIA is up to these days, then please tell them to send more."

So let's keep the Peace Corps in ACTION and give President Reagan and Mr. Pauken a chance to spin out some new ideas to make ACTION fulfill its mission of giving Americans of all ages and backgrounds the opportunity to perform peacetime service to their country at home and abroad.

Business, Bottles And Babies

Unfortunately, American babies are not a powerful interest group and cannot lobby on behalf of their Third World relatives for the World Health Organization guidelines on infant formula marketing.

The Reagan administration reportedly believes that the WHO guidelines violate corporate First Amendment rights of "commercial free speech." Now, in my copy of the U.S. Constitution, the First Amendment refers to free speech but never to "commercial free speech." Rights of "commercial free speech" do not come directly from the First Amendment but must be inferred from it.

Since the Reagan administration seems to have already decided to uphold the corporate interest over the interests of the poor and a clean environment, I am not surprised to see the administration finding all sorts of corporate rights in the Constitution. But when Third World babies are sacrificed so that corporations can sell more formula and increase profits, and when this is then justified by an appeal to the Constitution, one has to ask: Which constitution does the Reagan administration use? One written by the Founding Fathers or one written by the Fortune 500?

SUBJECT: Key Remaining Ambassadorial Appointments

I strongly urge that in your selection of the remaining ambassadors you agree to the following appointments in Europe:

Bonn: Arthur Burns - Burns has indicated a willingness to serve in Bonn and would be a strong advocate of both of your policies and of the American system and way of life.

NATO: W. Tapley Bennett - Bennett is currently serving at NATO and I personally know him to be an especially effective Foreign Service professional who will assure that our reshaping of European defense priorities will be effectively presented.

In the months ahead we will need the strongest possible team to reach our objectives vis-a-vis the Europeans and Burns and Bennett are the ideal candidates to fill these positions. These appointments have been discussed with Cap Weinberger and he agrees with the recommendations.

I would also strongly urge that you agree to the following appointments:

OECD: Abraham Katz. Katz is one of the most able economic officers in the Department and served with distinction as DCM at OECD for 5 years. He would become Chief of Mission, and Andrew Falkiewicz, the Vice President's choice, would be offered the Deputy Chief of Mission position. David Bushong, Senator Kassebaum's candidate, who is also supported by Senator Laxalt, would become Chairman of the AID related Development Assistance Committee. This arrangement has Clark and Deaver support.

The Hague: William J. Dyess. Dyess, a career Soviet Specialist with high public affairs skills is well-equipped to take on the problems we now face in the Netherlands, which are rooted in growing reluctance of the Dutch public to face up to the Soviet challenge. Dyess knows what to do, and I know of no one else who would be as effective. I

know him to have first-rate political and policy sense. He was converted to Republicanism as a student in Alabama and has never left the fold, even while serving ably your predecessors over two decades. He has had a good meeting with Lynn Nofziger who may wish to comment on him.

Bolivia: Edwin Corr. Corr is currently Ambassador to Peru. He also served as Deputy Assistant Secretary in the Bureau of Narcotic Affairs. His profound knowledge of narcotics issues and programs makes him an ideal candidate for Bolivia. He speaks fluent Spanish.

We may not have met but I would like to share some thoughts with you on the prospective ambassadorial appointment to Italy.

First, my own credentials for presuming to nominate anyone:

I speak flawless Italian and only last year spoke to appellate judges, academicians, special prosecutors and leading members of the Italian Bar at the request of the United States State Department. I spoke in six different cities on the differences in the jurisprudence system between the Common Law System and the Court Code--spontaneously and without benefit of supporting notes.

My wife, a native of Lucca, and I retain close family ties in Italy, generally visiting there at least once a year. I have spoken over the years before leadership audiences and have appeared on Italian national television.

I know that Italy is a highly vulnerable component of our alliance facing the Iron Curtain. I know a goodly number of the political principals well, and this experience prompted me to speak personally to Bill Casey of the importance of this post.

We cannot afford the luxury of anything less than the best in Rome. I believe Maxwell M. Rabb fulfills that description perfectly. He is not a hack or professional ethnic. He is, however, an individual of superior intelligence, maturity, broad-gauge experience and dedication to the principles that motivate our new Republican Administration.

I invite careful scrutiny of his background and the assessment of his professional and governmental colleagues. It would only point up that I have understated my esteem for a valued friend and the respect in which he is held by those who have the pleasure of associating with him.
