ACYPL Trustee Sarah Weddington suggested that I introduce the ACYPL to you and that I seek special aid from the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States in support of our funding initiatives in the private sector.

The American Council of Young Political Leaders was founded in 1966 by a group of young politically active Americans concerned about the security of the United States in an increasingly volatile international climate. Confronted with a future global outlook of equal if not greater uncertainty, the ACYPL's founders assessed their own depth of understanding of international issues, found themselves wanting, and set out to gain new levels of competence commensurate with their own civic and political aspirations.

The concept of learning through firsthand experience led quickly to ACYPL's programmatic basis in the exchange of delegations, first with young political counterparts in the NATO countries of Western Europe. Funding for ACYPL's first year of operation was provided by the Ford Foundation.

So successful were those exchanges that the Department of State committed funds under the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act to continue and strengthen ACYPL's programmatic base. Throughout its sixteen years, ACYPL's principal source of funds has been this legislation, administered first through the State Department, then the U.S. Information Agency, and now the United States International Communication Agency (USICA).

ACYPL is by charter a completely bipartisan, non-profit, tax-exempt organization. The Council is governed by an equally bipartisan Board of Trustees carefully chosen for the quality of their experience, commitment, and leadership in international affairs. Since 1966, more than 1,500 young men and women--half from the U.S. and an equal number from 41 other countries--have shared the unique experience of international travel and one-to-one communication. But it is not the number of young

global travelers that distinguishes the ACYPL in the international exchange community. It is its strategic and increasingly crucial mission: Fostering the readiness of future political leaders to function effectively in the complex arena of foreign policy. In tandem with this mission for young Americans, ACYPL brings true global dimension to its service by welcoming young foreign political leaders to the United States. Here they gain first hand insights into the American political process affecting our nation's foreign and domestic policies.

A recently conducted survey of the ACYPL Board of Trustees by an independent consultant revealed a compelling consensus of the need for heightened awareness and support from the private sector--corporations, foundations, the university community, and private citizens--if ACYPL is to fulfill its increasingly important potential service in the interests of national security and a more coherent, peaceful world in the decade of the 1980's.

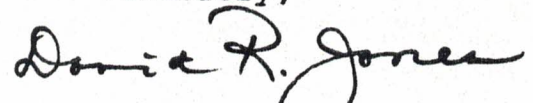
Early response to our efforts is encouraging. Recent successes with the Tinker and Potter Foundations, G.D. Searle and Company and many corporations and other organizations that have participated as hosts of visiting delegations are exemplary.

Our priority during the fiscal period is to establish a special fund that will enable us to broaden ACYPL's base of programmatic and recurrent annual support from the private sector. In effect, we seek such a fund to extend our communications with the private sector, thereby securing increasing financial support for an expanding international exchange program, and to create significant new linkages with the nation's academic community of international scholars and students.

To those ends, we seek the help of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, and respectfully request consideration of a grant in the sum of \$10,000. Such a grant would be used to advance our special planning and philanthropic support initiatives during the current fiscal period ending October 31, 1982. At the conclusion of that period, we would be pleased to provide a detailed account of accomplishments made possible through the generous assistance of Equitable. In the meantime, should you need information on the plans and activities of the ACYPL, please call on me.

I am enclosing a more complete statement of purpose and a list of those activities through which we believe we achieve those goals.

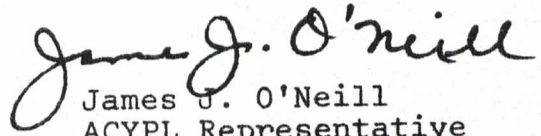
To assist the American Council in these activities, we request a grant of twenty thousand dollars from Philip Morris to be used to support our general activities, as well as for:

The American Council of Young Political Leaders is a bipartisan, non-profit organization that strives to foster an awareness of international affairs and domestic politics. We do so by conducting seminars and exchange study tours for young American political leaders and their counterparts from around the world.

The ACYPL was founded in 1966 by a group of young and politically active Americans who were concerned about the security of the United States in an increasingly volatile international climate. They found that the first-hand experience of meeting with their peers from the NATO countries had a profound impact on them. No second-hand testimony can fully convey the value of such exposure early in the careers of young political leaders likely to be making policy decisions in the coming decades. (The ACYPL is the only organization that focuses on this select group.) What is true at the summit seems even more so among young leaders: face-to-face contact sharply increases trust together with understanding.

From those beginnings in the mid-1960's, The ACYPL has grown into an organization with reciprocal exchange programs in more than 40 countries, involving some 1500 future leaders. The dire need for such programs then perceived is even greater today.

One of the center pieces of our exchange program has been a project every other year to bring young politicians from Western Europe and Canada to observe the culmination of the American political process--our national elections. We are now preparing for this

exchange with plans to invite 25 young leaders from the NATO countries as described in the enclosed papers. The tentative schedule calls for a post-election seminar to be held in Denver to analyze the election and the political dynamics observed in four different parts of the United States.

As you can imagine, this project is no small undertaking. The major part of the cost is being borne by funds provided through the United States International Communication Agency. Increasingly, because of rising costs and diminishing government resources, The ACYPL has turned to corporations and foundations to share in the participation and support of these important international programs.

In this instance, we are seeking a grant in the amount of \$7,500 from the Coors Foundation to partially pay for the costs of the seminar in Colorado. This would cover air fare and expenses in Colorado for major speakers, the facilities, and any special events that would be appropriate for the circumstances. These are costs which cannot be paid for from our government grant, but are, we believe, essential to the success of the seminar.

In addition to the broad interests I have described, you should know that a number of Coloradans have participated in this program, and I enclose a list of them. I also am sending you a list of delegates to the last Election Study Tour, with their itinerary. (The post-election seminar was held in Nashville with The Potter Foundation supporting that event.)

Thus, with the international, national, and regional interests served so well by our programs, we very much hope that the Coors Foundation will want to become involved with the ACYPL in this important and timely project.

Since 1966, the American Council of Young Political Leaders has helped to prepare future political leaders to deal with the complex problems of foreign policy. The ACYPL seeks to provide opportunities for young American politicians to gain insight into the vital area of international affairs early in their careers. The ACYPL also serves to give young political leaders in other countries a better understanding of the American political process and the domestic framework for foreign policy decision making in the U.S.

The American Council of Young Political Leaders has come to be recognized as unique among the community of foreign affairs organizations:

- It is the only organization that focuses on those individuals who are most likely to be making policy decisions in the decades ahead—young political leaders.
- It is a bipartisan organization and maintains a strictly bipartisan policy in all of its programs. Its Board of Trustees and participants include individuals from both major parties as well as independents. The ACYPL does not engage in lobbying and does not pass resolutions on political questions.
- It has established a worldwide network of political, business and academic contacts who, along with its Board of Trustees and staff, enable the ACYPL to arrange top quality programs.
- Because of its record of achievement, it receives an unprecedented level of official international cooperation from the U.S. government, multinational organizations and foreign governments.

The American Council of Young Political Leaders strives to provide the knowledge and common ground upon which future leaders here and abroad can foster the personal relationships necessary to develop mutual awareness and understanding of common problems, opportunities and challenges. It is a private, non-profit organization, and all contributions to the Council are tax deductible.

PROGRAMS

Conferences

The ACYPL organizes national foreign policy conferences at the Department of State for young political leaders from throughout the United States. Each conference attracts some 400 participants. These meetings provide an opportunity for state legislators, city council members, young Democratic and Republican leaders, county commissioners, party officials and political activists of all persuasions to be thoroughly briefed on the current foreign policy of the United States. Top officials of the Department of State and experts in all key areas appear before the sessions not only to talk and lecture, but also to answer questions and engage in sometime lively debates.

Study Tours

Overseas

The ACYPL, with assistance from the International Communication Agency, annually sends at least eight to ten American delegations overseas. Since 1966, more than 700 politically active men and women have participated in these study tours. Programs with the Soviet Union, Mexico, and Europe have become annual events—but the overseas agenda continues to expand and today includes the Middle East, Eastern Europe, the Peoples' Republic of China, Brazil, India and a number of African countries. The tours arranged by the host country, in consultation with the U.S. Embassy and ACYPL/Washington, involve pre-trip briefings and in-country meetings and discussions with key government officials, political leaders, and private sector representatives. Many times a tour will be multinational in scope in order to emphasize international organizations such as the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, or to appreciate regional complexities as was experienced by a recent ACYPL delegation to Cairo, Tel Aviv, Amman, Damascus, Jidda and Khartoum. In addition, ACYPL delegations have had an official presence at various elections as "U.S. Observers".

ACYPL delegations going to other countries are composed of young men and women who have already made a mark for themselves in the American political process, and who will more than likely go on to senior leadership positions. The ACYPL strives to ensure a balanced delegation that, without sacrificing quality, will assure representation of men and women of different backgrounds and viewpoints. In fact, only by maintaining such a balance will foreign host nations gain realistic insights into the full diversity of American perspectives.

United States

The ACYPL, again with assistance from the International Communication Agency, regularly hosts delegations of young political leaders from abroad for study tours of the United States. These tours provide an inside look at the way politics and government work at the local, state and national levels. They include meetings and discussions with key political and government officials, mini-seminars on topics of unique interest to politicians, special briefings on U.S. foreign policy, explanations of American political campaign techniques, visits and dinners with American counterparts and their families, and an appropriate amount of sightseeing and social functions. Because of the effective work of the Council, future leaders in many foreign countries look to the United States with greater knowledge, greater understanding and greater good-will.

Seminars

In conjunction with study tours for delegations of young politicians from abroad, the ACYPL organizes varying kinds of seminars, which may last four days or four hours. Through them an opportunity to discuss, to question, to debate and to reflect is provided. The ACYPL has had a number of seminars with the Committee of Youth Organizations of the Soviet Union. In each of these, an equal number of Americans and Soviets met for several days for discussions on politics, education, government and international affairs. Similar seminars are held on a multilateral and bilateral basis with Western Europe, Japan and Eastern European countries.

Workshops

The most recent addition to the ACYPL program portfolio is workshops—held around the country—focusing on a specific country, region or issue.

A generous grant from the Tinker Foundation will enable the ACYPL to sponsor several workshops on Latin American countries. The first of this series, "Mexico—Colossus of the South", was held four days before President Carter called upon President Portillo in Mexico City in March, 1979.

During 1979, in recognition of the 30th anniversary of NATO, the ACYPL, in cooperation with the Atlantic Council of the United States, will also convene a series of workshops on the common security, economic and political concerns of the NATO countries.

THE FUTURE

The most worthwhile aspect of the American Council of Young Political Leaders' program is that it provides young political leaders with the opportunity to appreciate firsthand the interests, individuals and the inconsistencies which comprise international relations today, thereby better equipping them for the responsibilities of leadership.

Thousands of outstanding young leaders—who are moving up through the political system—need the international affairs background and experience which the ACYPL provides.

Their involvement is limited only by the extent to which the ACYPL can secure the financial resources necessary to sustain and expand its programs.

Dear Mike:

In furtherance of various discussions which have been held in recent weeks with respect to the ACYPL, I think it would be useful to focus on how we might best proceed to assure a continued orderly participation of the White House in the exchanges which ACYPL carries out.

This letter is designed to reach an understanding on whether the procedure which you, Peter McPherson and I have followed in this regard to date is to be followed in the future.

As you know, the American Council of Young Political Leaders is a private, non-profit, tax-exempt organization. Organized in 1966, it sponsors exchanges between U.S. young political leaders and foreign young political leaders, with approximately one half of the delegations going abroad. It has a Council of several hundred members and a board of trustees of twenty-five.

As you also know, Peter McPherson is the chairman of the Republican delegate selection subcommittee, but this relates to his capacity as an ACYPL trustee and not to his AID position. The delegate selection committee, consisting of six persons, acts as two subcommittees: one of three persons on the Republican side of the aisle, the other of three on the Democratic side, with each side making its own selections from nominations before it. Nominations usually exceed selections made therefrom by about 3 to 1.

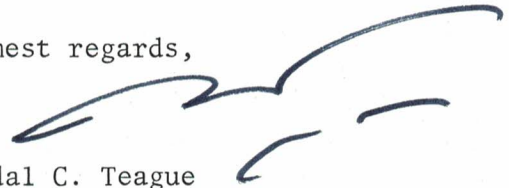
There are two members of the White House staff who are trustees of ACYPL: you and Mrs. Dole. ACYPL coordination with the White House on Republican nominations has been through you. This has been my agreement with the White House in my capacities as the secretariat for the Republican delegate selection subcommittee and, more recently, as President of ACYPL.

A growing awareness in the White House of ACYPL's potential has led increasingly to nominations by others. In no way is this letter intended to dampen what I interpret as unparalleled enthusiasm in the White House for this program, or the quality of those nominations. That enthusiasm is very much appreciated. But a recent communication (attached) from Ms. Wood in Ms. von Damm's office was not through you and seems by its text to have gone beyond a nomination and does not involve the White House staff. If our understanding has been amended in the White House by an agreement that Ms. von Damm or her staff will make nominations directly to me, as we now understand she or they intend to do, I should be notified of that by you. I simply think that all White House nominations should be through you, so we do not end up with confusion, risks and embarrassments.

I regard Ms. von Damm's judgment highly and think her knowledge of people in the Republican Party is almost without parallel, and I want to continue to encourage her interest. In the meantime, should I regard this Pennsylvania nomination as a White House nomination? If so, if you would have Ms. von Damm provide me information on Mr. Holtzman's relationship to the White House, his background and his relationship to the issues affecting U.S. relations with Canada and Western Europe, principally NATO, we will consider it a nomination well made for a trip which we hope to finalize very soon.

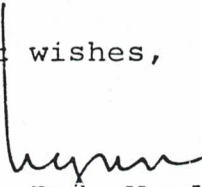

ARTICLE VII

Committees

Section 1. Delegate Selection Committee.

a. Composition and Organization. At the Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees, or such Special Meeting of the Board of Trustees as may be called for the purpose, the Trustees shall: (1) elect from their number two (2) persons, one Republican and one Democrat, who shall constitute the representatives of the Board of Trustees to the Delegate Selection Committee; and (2) shall elect from the Council four (4) persons, two (2) Republicans and two (2) Democrats, who shall constitute the representatives of the Council to the Delegate Selection Committee. All members will serve one (1) year terms and will be eligible for reelection.

b. Powers and Duties. The Delegate Selection Committee shall be empowered to select those individuals who shall represent as "Delegates" the American Council of Young Political Leaders in its international activities and at seminars within the United States. The method of selection shall be as follows:

(1) Prospective delegates may be nominated by any member of the Board of Trustees or the Council who shall forward their nominations/recommendations to the Delegate Selection Committee;

(2) Upon receipt of recommendations, the Co-Chairmen of the Delegate Selection Committee, in consultation with the members of the Committee, shall consider each nomination and with majority approval of the Committee, select delegates and alternates in a timely fashion.

In the event that the Delegate Selection Committee is unable to consider nominations due to an invitation received less than thirty (30) days prior to departure or other reasons, the Co-Chairmen of the Delegate Selection Committee shall be empowered to select members of the delegation in order to expedite selection, provided that the Co-Chairmen shall make a good faith effort to discuss such nominations with all members of the Delegate Selection Committee.

(3) The Delegate Selection Committee shall make reasonable effort to assure that each delegation:

- (a) is equally divided between representatives of the Republican and Democratic parties;
- (b) is composed of at least fifty percent (50%) elected public officials;
- (c) has no member over forty-one (41) years of age; and
- (d) reflects a good faith effort to ensure adequate representation of women and minorities.

(4) Subsection (3) (a) and (b) of Article VII, Section 2.b., preceeding shall not be applicable to the selection

of delegates in the event an invitation specifies to the contrary.

Section 2. Executive Committee.

a. Duties. There shall be an Executive Committee which shall manage affairs of the Corporation between meetings of the Board of Trustees. The acts of said Executive Committee shall be in conformity with and subject to provision of the Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws and the policies and positions established by the Board of Trustees.

b. Composition. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the President, the Executive Vice President, the Vice President, the Secretary, and the Treasurer of the corporation and the Co-Chairmen of the Delegate Selection Committee.

c. Meetings. All meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held within the District of Columbia unless another place outside the District of Columbia is jointly agreed upon by both the President and the Executive Vice President of the corporation. The Executive Committee shall meet upon the joint call of the President and Executive Vice President of the corporation who shall give ten (10) days written notice to each of the members of the time and place of the meeting and provided further that notice of any such meeting may be waived in writing and attendance shall constitute notice of any such meeting. Neither the business to be transacted at nor the purpose of any such meeting need be specified in the notice or waiver of notice of such a meeting.

d. Procedure and Operation. The President, Executive Vice President and two (2) other members of the Executive Committee, present either in person or by proxy, shall constitute a quorum and all decisions of the
