Randal Teague nominated T. Timothy Ryan for President, M. Peter McPherson for Vice President, Robert Understein for Secretary, and himself, Randal Teague for Delegate Selection Committee Co-Chair.

R. Spencer Oliver nominated Hon. Terry Sanford for Chairman, Hon. Hodding Carter for Executive Vice President, Robert Schmidt for Treasurer, and himself, R. Spencer Oliver for Delegate Selection Committee Co-Chair.

Mr. Teague also nominated Don Cogman for Council Co-Chairman and Bruce Weinrod as the ACYPL U.N. Representative. He informed the Board that Mr. Ryan would have to resign as Counsel to the Board because of his election as President, and that Republican Counsel would remain vacant temporarily.

Mr. Oliver nominated Sarah Weddington for Council Co-Chairperson, Stuart P. Ross for Counsel to the Board, and Joe Fallon as U.N. Representative.

The following persons were nominated for membership on the respective Delegate Selection Committees:

There was a motion that all of the above nominees be elected. This motion was seconded and unanimously approved.

Amendments to the Bylaws

Mr. Teague presented an amendment to the Bylaws Article II, Membership, Section 4, Composition and Tenure, Subsection a, Board of Trustees. His amendment would change the number of Trustees from 30 to 34 and 17 instead of 15 Members to be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Board. The additional 4 members are to be the Chairmen of the Young Republican National Federation, Young Democrats of America, College Republicans, and College Young Democrats of America.

Mr. Teague proposed a change to the amendment to leave the Bylaws as they stand in this instance, making the Chairmen of the Young Republican National Federation and the Young Democrats of America Board Members, non-voting, ex-officio.

This amendment to the amendment was unanimously approved. Discussion on the original amendment, now amended, was closed. The amendment was seconded, and unanimously adopted as amended.

Mr. Teague also presented an amendment to Article VI, Officers, Section 3, President. It proposed that the President and the Executive Director of the ACYPL be of the same political party as the President of the United States. After some discussion on the topic, there was a motion that the President of the ACYPL be of the same political party as the President of the United States, but the Executive Director position would not be restricted. This amendment to the proposed Bylaw amendment was passed unanimously, and the Bylaw amendment, as amended, was approved unanimously.

President's Report

Mr. John Hurson reported on the ACYPL programs since May 19, 1983, the last Board Meeting. He stated that 10 programs had been completed and 3 were still to come, including the ATA Annual Assembly in Rome to start November 8, U.S. to Turkey program beginning November 6, and Yugoslavia to U.S., November 12. He reported that we were able to perform 3 additional programs from savings made on previous ones. They included a Romania to U.S. visit, a U.S. to Australia visit, a U.S. to Turkey visit, and additional funds to send more delegates to the ATA Annual Assembly. He also informed the Board of the cancellation of the Japan to U.S. visit because of parliamentary elections going on in Japan this December.

Mr. Teague spoke on the FY84 Proposed Schedule. He pointed out that the FY83 schedule concentrated on Western Europe, particularly West Germany. In 1983, there were no Mideast or Japanese programs. The 1984 schedule was to be more diverse.

Mr. Oliver reported on the Endowment for Democracy Act, earmarking \$23 million for Foreign Policy Programs, could increase the funding of the ACYPL for 1984.

Financial Report

Mr. Schmidt reported that the ACYPL is \$4,000 under budget on Administrative costs. There is still \$142,000 left of Program monies, but the additional programs (ATA, Turkey, and Haus Rissen) would absorb some of these savings.

Council Report

Mr. Cogman brought the Board up to date on the Blair House Luncheon held June 26. He reported having received donations from some of the corporations represented there, and the others were very interested, with contributions pending.

Ms. Weddington reported that R.J. Reynolds was very close to sending a check. She suggested setting up a special committee in Texas to help coordinate the effort for contributions.

Mr. Cogman expressed the need for good follow-up when seeking funds for the private sector. He mentioned the list from Fortune 500 John Hurson and Steve Schwartz had put together pertaining to business dealings in other countries. He also commended Messrs. Hurson and Schwartz for the "start-up" list (cost per delegate). This list informs the reader of the cost to send one delegate to a particular country.

Mr. Cogman also suggested having a dinner as a follow-up on the Blair House luncheon, possibly at the State Department. This dinner could focus on Australian Companies. Another suggestion Mr. Cogman made was a luncheon on the Hill, inviting members of Congress and committee staffs. Mr. Cogman feels the Embassys should be more involved in fund-raising for programs relating to their respective countries. He also mentioned New York as being a good city for programming, therefore possibly a target for fundraising.

Mr. Teague suggested using the names of other contributors to help convince new prospects.

General discussion followed concerning the Council. It was mentioned that Gary Bruner and Charles Black were inadvertently left off of the Council list. A general discussion involving Council support occurred. The Chairman requested a full report on procedures and policies regarding the Council at the next meeting from the staff.

Nominations for the Council followed. Mr. Cogman nominated Rebecca Lambert, Richard Hohlt, Donald Rumsfeld and Pierre S. duPont. Mr. Allen nominated Steve Rutherford. Sarah Weddington nominated John Kastin and Joel Shukeur. Governor Sanford nominated William Green. All nominations were approved unanimously. Mr. Teague informed the Board of other nominations made by the Executive Committee which were approved.

There was a motion that these names be added to the Council, it was seconded, and passed unanimously.

Other Business

Ms. Mimi Dawson reported on the 1983 AAYPL activities. She mentioned the AAYPL is looking for funding for FY84 to help include more programs. Ms. Dawson also informed the Board that the next AAYPL Biennial Assembly (1985) will be held in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Teague informed the Board that Tom Hutson, former Executive Director, stationed in Lagos, Nigeria shows continued interest in the ACYPL. He commended Mr. Hurson for doing an outstanding job with handling the USIA Auditors. Mr. Teague also commended the entire staff on a job well done.

Mr. Hurson introduced the staff to the Board, noting their respective duties.

Mr. McPherson addressed the Board to congratulate Mr. Teague on his great accomplishments as President of the ACYPL.

There was no other business to be discussed, so the meeting was adjourned at 4:15 p.m.

Governor Sanford called for additions or corrections to the minutes of the previous Board Meeting of October 10, 1982, as reviewed by Mr. Teague. No revisions were forthcoming at that time, the minutes were approved as presented.

IV. Financial Report

Governor Sanford asked the Treasurer, Mr. Robert Schmidt to give a report. Mr. Schmidt reported that the organization was running below budget projections. Mr. Teague requested John Hurson, Senior Program Officer, to give a status of the 1983 grant and audits of previous grants. Mr. Hurson reported the 1983 grant has been established at a totally funded level of \$419,000. Mr. Hurson reported that USIA had tried to establish a quarterly grant process which was felt unnecessarily disrupted programs. An annual grant process was guaranteed by the highest source at USIA for the present. Mr. Hurson also reported that audits of previous grants were awaiting USIA investigation.

V. President's Report

Mr. Teague explained the anticipated incoming and outgoing delegations with particular emphasis on the incoming Yugoslavian and Hungarian delegations for this Fall. He expressed gratitude to the staff for the savings they have made on previous programs, and asked Mr. Hurson to give a figure as to what those savings were. Mr. Hurson reported savings of approximately \$10,000 to date. Mr. Teague suggested with the money saved from these programs, along with private sector support, we can plan more delegations. Mr. Oliver suggested that additional funds be utilized on a U.S. to Japan delegation because of the benefit to ACYPL from previous delegates who have traveled to Japan. A general discussion ensued regarding fundraising and additional delegations. Points of discussion focused on USIA grant restrictions, Australian, Japanese and other delegations and related fundraising.

VI. Council Report

Ms. Sarah Weddington gave a Council report. She indicated that the Council has taken on considerable responsibility with fundraising and suggested that the rolls of the Council be filled to accomplish all of the tasks assigned for this year. She is looking for good staff follow-up to accomplish these tasks. Governor Sanford suggested that a publicity effort be made to let people know of the Council's existence. Mr. Schmidt inquired as to the qualifications for admission to the Council, particularly the age limit set at 40. Mr. Oliver suggested that all those with suggestions on who should be on the Council should send their names to the staff. Mr. Teague suggested that the next newsletter keep track of in-kind contributions by Council members and the members of the Council elected to Congress. Mr. Schmidt stated he knew an individual over age 40, but who would be very valuable to the Council. Mr. Hoving suggested consideration of a two tiered system. Mr. Keegan suggested a re-evaluation of the "Young" in the organization's title. Mr. O'Neil and Mr. Oliver thought a name change was not desirable. Mr. Teague instructed staff to prepare a list of all private sector contributions for the next meeting. At this point, Don Cogman nominated the following people to be added to the ACYPL Council:

Mr. Carter moved to accept these people to the Council. Mr. Schmidt seconded the motion, and it was passed unanimously.

VII. Staffing Report and Recommendations

Mr. Robert Carter stated that Thomas Hutson had resigned as Executive Director to return to the Foreign Service, and that in his absence, Mr. Carter had been named by the Executive Committee to be Acting Executive Director. The personnel committee had interviewed 17 candidates, but was still looking for the right person. Mr. Carter announced he had made John Hurson, Senior Program Officer, the Deputy Director to handle staff matters and negotiations with USIA.

Mr. Carter announced that work on a brochure was underway, under Mr. Hoving's direction, and that AVON Products had volunteered to pay for its printing. The next ACYPL newsletter is due in July.

Mr. Teague announced that the transition could not have been done without the help and support of Mr. Carter and the hard work of the staff. He stated that over the next three months, there must be a review of the salary levels of all employees, which had been capped because of Federal budget cuts. Mr. Carter endorsed Mr. Teague's assessment of the staff as very competent.

VIII. Other Business

Mr. William Hybl spoke concerning the upcoming AAYPL Biennial Assembly in Portugal. He announced that the U.S. delegation would continue in its historic role of active involvement in the leadership of the AAYPL, and he expressed special thanks to Lynn Van Housen on staff for her support efforts for the AAYPL.

Mr. Teague announced that Mr. Martin Anderson was resigning from the Board because of time commitments. He proposed to bring Mr. Frank Fahrenkopf, Chairman of the Republican National Committee on to the Board to replace Mr. Anderson. This motion was seconded by Mr. Carter and approved unanimously.

Mr. Robert Allen proposed that there be a provision in the bylaws to select members of the Board for vacancies by mailed ballot. Mr. Ross suggested that a provision exists in the bylaws for Board decision by mail, and that no exceptions exist for replacement of Board Members. Mr. Teague pointed out that D.C. Corporation law requires the election of Board Members at the Annual Meeting. Mr. Oliver suggested that the proposal was aimed at the situation where it was necessary to select a prestigious Board Member for a vacancy on the Board. He suggested that the Executive Committee could nominate individuals for election to the Board. He noted that recent meetings had re-nominated all sitting Board Members because the organization had lost track of the overlapping terms of office for Board Members. Mr. Hoving suggested that a Nominating Committee could be established to propose names for vacancies on the Board. Mr. Oliver moved to establish a Nominating Committee of four people, two Democrats and two Republicans, appointed by the President, and approved by the Executive Committee, to report written nominations for Board positions for election at the Annual Meeting at least 21 days before the Annual Board Meeting. This motion was seconded by Mr. Peter McPherson. This was then passed unanimously by the Board.

There was a motion to adjourn the meeting, seconded and passed unanimously.

We need urgently a "White House meeting" with respect to the existing vacancy in the executive directorship at the American Council of Young Political Leaders. The selection of the right executive director will govern the effectiveness of a genuinely bipartisan approach over the next several years. (Historically and presently, ACYPL is more Democratic than Republican in its leadership and staff.)

An executive director should meet the following qualifications:

1. Someone with experience in government grantsmanship, private sector fundraising, the management of a small staff and budget (which is often more of a trick than that of larger staffs and budgets), and programming (both substantively and advancing).

I am enclosing the most recently prepared ACYPL tentative schedule for 1983. As always, you should keep in mind that the schedule remains subject to amendment to reflect changes in the external environment and recommendations within ACYPL and/or USIA as to changed priorities.

You will note that there are only five U.S. delegations going abroad in this current list, three of which have been completed, including two to West Germany. West Germany is insisting on U.S. delegations being completed months in advance now.

Several thoughts are in order:

1. We expect several additional delegations to be added to this list. This will be a product of additional USIA funds available to us, as well as the availability of private funds. You should note in respect to the latter point, for example, that the Japan to U.S. tour in September is being partially funded with significant private sector funds.
2. We need recommendations desperately as to the U.S. to F.R.G. "German-American Young Journalists Conference in Germany on July 8-21. Delegates must be presently members of the working media (newspapers, periodicals, radio & television).

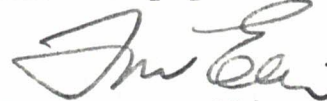

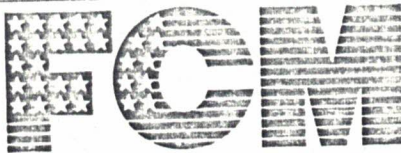

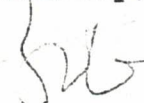
Dear Jack:
