SUBJECT: Proposed Procedure for Appointing Members
to Presidential Boards and Commissions

In order to properly and efficiently present the candidates for Presidential Boards and Commissions to Senior Staff, the Personnel Office proposes the following procedure. This proposed procedure is intended for the next two months so as to adequately fill the appointments to the major Boards and Commissions. After that time, we will be able to accommodate a greater number of appointments of a lesser priority.

First, as a general rule, we proposed to prioritize the persons to be appointed to the Boards and Commissions by placing the persons submitted from the following sources:

1. Congressional Campaign Committee: Their staff is currently preparing a list of candidates for 1982 campaigns (approximately 100);
2. Republican National Committee: Their staff is forwarding the names of 5 persons from each State for appointment (approximately 250);
3. Recommendations from Senate and House members;
4. Ambassadorial candidates who were not selected;
5. Persons not selected for PAS positions.

Second, the mechanics will be changed from the format utilized in the previous appointment process. We will continue to furnish the organic authority which establishes the Board or Commission, along with a brief description of its functions

and, if possible, an estimate of the annual costs. We will only furnish a list of the final candidates for review (short list). In other words, there will be no long list of other candidates due to the heavy volume of persons involved in the selection process and desirous of inclusion on the applicable Board or Commission.

Third, we will attempt to furnish you a list of the Boards or Commissions we intend to bring up at the next meeting. If any member of the Senior Staff has any preferential candidates, this should attempt to furnish them to Mike Farrell by noon the next day.

Fourth, if any member of the Senior Staff has an interest in a Board or Commission into which you do not want the PPO to initiate action, please let us know.

SUBJECT: ADVISORY BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

Along with the freeze of full-time federal hiring, the White House might be well advised to order that no new appointments to advisory boards or commissions be made subject to White House review of the vacancies now open and those positions where vacancies will occur within the next year.

Unless this is done, the Cabinet Officers and those Acting Agency heads held over from the Carter Administration will be preassured into appointing members to boards you might want to abolish, or worse, appointing the old team's loyalists to preside over the grant and contract processes from those Departments and Agencies.

While we tend to forget that these positions are not just prestigious honorariums for the party faithful who want to serve part-time but stay back home, the political power of these posts has never been lost on the Democrats. It is significant, that upon leaving office on January 19, 1981, President Carter slipped right by us the appointment of Carter White House Aide Anne Wexler and HUD Assistant Secty. Lawrence B. Simmons to the Pennsylvania Avenue Redevelopment Corporation. In addition, Carter White House Aide Bruce Kirschenbaum was appointed to the National Capitol Planning Commission, and Carter designated another Carter appointee already on board, Helen Scharf, as the new Chairman. President Reagan now can be assured that as he rides down Pennsylvania Avenue from the Republican White House to the Republican Senate, all the construction signs will be Democratic companies who will donate some of their profits earned during his tenure to the Democratic Party and his opponent in the next election. The Redevelopment Corp. has \$3 billion of contracts to let.

[Carter, however, made no last minute appointments to our nation's oldest advisory board, the Board of Tea Experts, whose six members terms all expire in 1981. This board of tea tasters pass on the quality of tea imported from the British Commonwealth. (See attachment 1)] Perhaps we can capture at least this Commission.

The most meaningful Commissions and Boards in terms of veto power (and therefore affirmative leverage to also encourage a grant or contract) is vested in National Boards at the Departmental level.

Many of the Boards and Commissions used to be prestigious Presidential Appointments, or at least Secretarial appointments with Presidential Approval. The essential reason was that while it took a long time and a herculean effort to remove from the bureaucracy those of opposing philosophies who make the grant and contract recommendations and replace them with those in whom the new Administration felt trust and confidence, the White House at least could stop their more partisan and subrefugious grant and contract activities by its control of the Board or Commission that had to approve the same. The field of the Health Boards (\$20 billion) is an example.

In 1973, a Democratic Congress weakened a Watergate preoccupied Administration by passing PL 92-463. On the positive side it made a review of the cost-effectiveness of the Board and Commission mandatory by giving Boards and Commissions a two year (average charter length) life, after which the Secretary had to recharter the Board or Commission.

On the negative side, that opportunity was used by the then beleaguered White House to give away to the Cabinet and Agency head its most valuable resource for policy and program implementation oversight; the veto power over the individual grant or contracting of already appropriated funds in an important program.

However, there is no legal reason why White House approval cannot be required for appointment, and in as much as the technical personnel procedure for appointing a person a member of the Board or Commission is as a consultant, why a freeze cannot be ordered pending the White House Review.

Otherwise, the following scenario will surely ensue. There are 13 members of the National Council of the Aging, for example. 6 members terms have or will expire immediately. They will find it difficult to have a quorum without continuing with the old appointees. Feigning support for the new team the staff secretary will run up to Secretary Schweiker's office and say it is necessary to appoint six new members, who, with the three members to be appointed in 1982 will be a majority. (If the NIH Director, who is chairman, is replaced then a new majority is immediate). NIH will say that these are "non-political" appointments and they just happen to have six experts to recommend with all the right scientific credentials. The Secretary will therein appoint most of them since he is to busy appointing Assistant and Deputy Assistant Secretaries to worry about "technical Boards and Commissions."

Ignored will be the politics behind medical grants and contracts, scientific though they might be. Democrats, especially in the Kennedy (left) wing which has preempted

the health bureaucracy (that's why Kennedy left the Judiciary Committee for that which oversees H&HS) has always fought for a Nationalized system of Health Care. Republicans favor the private physician and the role of the free enterprise system and local control in terms of clinics and hospital care.

By controlling all of the grants and contracts in medical care, education, technology, manpower development, and medical research, the power of the federal purse is directed towards the collectivization and eventual Nationalization of our health care professionals. Virtually 80% to 90% of all grants go to State University Hospitals and Medical Schools, and other State run medical facilities and programs. Almost no grants and contracts go to individual physicians or small private clinics, regardless of the merit of their work.

Since government funds are almost necessary to pay the high overhead of such research, anyone therefore who is serious about medical research must leave his private practice and go to work for a paycheck in a primarily government funded institution. The next easy step is to make that check a government paycheck. Also, the favored grantee, has his assistants and nurses, etc. paid for by the grantor, and the private patients are the "research subjects", and their fees are pure profit.

The President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports which will be important since the Olympics will be held here in Los Angeles next go-round, is one of the few Presidential Advisory Boards left in the whole Billion Dollar Health side of the government. To have the White House give them away is to give away the direction of the government in fact, ie: where the bucks go, thus where the direction of those who depend on government assistance turn.

Attached please find some sample advisory boards in the health field. Two are initial review committees which have the first cut. 72% of all grants go to those sitting on or represented on initial review committees. They in turn recommend grants and contracts to the National Advisory Boards. In all cases, the agenda is prepared by the bureaucrats. Would be nice to turn that around.

PRESIDENT'S COUNCIL ON PHYSICAL FITNESS AND SPORTS

AUTHORITY

Established by Executive Order 11562, September 25, 1970; further amended October 25, 1976; and Executive Order 12110, December 28, 1978. The Council is governed by provisions of P.L. 92-463 which sets forth standards for the formation and use of advisory committees.

STRUCTURE

Consists of fifteen members, including the Chairman, who are not officers or employees of the Federal Government, appointed by the President. Members are appointed on the basis of their competence in the fields of medicine, business and industry, physical education, amateur sports and research.

FUNCTION

The Council is instructed to "enlist the active support and assistance of individual citizens, civic groups, professional associations, amateur and professional sports groups, private enterprise, voluntary organizations and others in efforts to promote and improve the health of all Americans through regular participation in physical fitness and sports activities." Specifically, the Council is to recommend to the President and the Secretary of HHS steps necessary to the performance of this assignment.

MEETINGS

Meetings are held four times a year at the call of the Chairman, with advance approval of a Government official.

Of the voting members seven shall constitute a quorum to legally conduct business when special meetings are required to accommodate specifically announced program solicitations. At all regularly scheduled meetings a majority of the authorized members shall constitute a quorum to conduct official business.

Consists of the Director, National Institute on Drug Abuse, as Chairperson, the Chief Medical Officer of the Veterans' Administration, or his representative, and a medical officer designated by the Secretary of Defense, who serve as ex-officio members; and twelve members selected by the Secretary, who shall represent a broad range of interests, disciplines, and expertise in the drug area selected from outstanding professionals and paraprofessionals in the fields of medicine, education, science, and social sciences, and other related disciplines, who have been active in the areas of drug abuse prevention, education, treatment, rehabilitation, training, or research. Members are appointed for overlapping four year terms. Appointed members may serve after the expiration of their terms until their successors have taken office. No member is eligible for reappointment within one year after the end of his preceding term.

FUNCTION

Advises the Secretary; the Administrator, Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Administration; and the Director, NIDA, regarding the activities and functions of the Department in the field of drug abuse, including, but not limited to, the development of new programs and priorities, the efficient administration of programs, and the supplying of needed scientific and statistical data and program information to professionals, paraprofessionals, and the general public. Advises and makes recommendations concerning policies and priorities respecting grants and contracts in the field of drug abuse and performs all statutorily required grant and contract review and such other grant and contract review as directed by the Chairperson. In carrying out these functions, the Council may make recommendations pertaining to policies related to drug abuse, education, prevention, training, rehabilitation, or research.

MEETINGS

Meetings are held not less than three times a year at the call of the Chairperson.

NATIONAL COUNCIL ON HEALTH PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

AUTHORITY

Established on January 4, 1975, under section 1503 of the Public Health Service Act, as amended, 42 USC 300k-3. The provisions of section 14(a) of the Federal Advisory Committee Act (P.L. 92-463) shall not apply with respect to this Council. The duration of the Council is continuous and a charter is filed in accordance with section 14(b)(2) of P.L. 92-463.

STRUCTURE

Consists of twenty members. The Chief Medical Director of the Veterans' Administration, the Assistant Secretary for Health Affairs of the Department of Defense, the Assistant Secretary for Rural Development of the Department of Agriculture, and the Assistant Secretary for Health of the Department of Health and Human Services are non voting ex officio members. The remaining members are selected by the Secretary and are persons who, as a result of their training, experience, or attainments, are exceptionally well qualified to assist in carrying out the functions of the Council. Of the voting members, not less than eight are persons who are not providers of health care and those members will include individuals who represent urban and rural medically underserved populations, not more than three are officers or employees of the Federal Government, not less than one will represent hospitals, not less than three are members of governing bodies of health systems agencies and not less than three are members of Statewide Health Coordinating Councils.

The Chairperson is selected by the voting members from among their number. The term of office of the Chairperson is the lesser of three years or the period remaining in his or her term of office as a member of the Council. Voting members are appointed for overlapping terms of six years, except that: any member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of the term for which his or her predecessor was appointed, is appointed only for the remainder of such term. A member may serve after the expiration of his or her term until his or her successor has taken office.

Subcommittees composed of at least four members of the parent Council provide the Council with background study and proposals for consideration and action related to the three statutory responsibilities under section 1503(a). The subcommittees are known as the National Guidelines, Goals, Priorities, and Standards Subcommittee; the Implementation and Administration Subcommittee; and the Technology and Productivity Subcommittee. In addition, the Implementation and Administration Subcommittee reviews for Council consideration issues related to section 1122 of the Social Security Act, as amended.

Each of the voting and ex officio members are appointed by the Chairperson to one of the above subcommittees. The Chairperson designates a Chairperson for each respective subcommittee. Of the voting members, at least one consumer and one provider is appointed to each subcommittee.

An Agenda Planning Subcommittee composed of no less than five members, assists in planning and coordinating agenda discussions to assure that Council considers each statutory function in an appropriate time and manner. The Chairperson of the Council chairs the Agenda Planning Subcommittee and appoints members to represent each of the above three subcommittees as well as consumer and provider members of the Council.

FUNCTION

Advises, consults with, and makes recommendations to the Secretary with respect to (1) the development of national guidelines concerning health planning policy, (2) the implementation and administration of Title XV, National Health Planning and Development, and Title XVI, Health Resources Development, and (3) an evaluation of the implications of new medical technology for organization, delivery, and equitable distribution of health care services. In addition, advises in the preparation of general regulations to implement section 1122 of the Social Security Act, and provides advice on policy matters arising out of implementation of such section. Further, considers and advises the Secretary on proposals submitted by the Secretary under the provisions of section 1122(d)(2) that health care facilities or health maintenance organizations be reimbursed for expenses related to capital expenditures notwithstanding that under section 1122(d)(1) there would otherwise be exclusion of reimbursement for such expenses. The Secretary must consult the Council on the proposed termination of or failure to renew any agreement designating a health systems agency or a state health planning and development agency.

MEETINGS

Meetings are held at least twice a year, at the call of the Chairperson, with the advance approval of a Government official.

Meetings of the subcommittees are held, as necessary, at the call of the respective Chairperson with the advance approval of a Government official.

STRUCTURE

Consists of the Director, Bureau of Health Professions, as Chairperson, and twenty members appointed by the Secretary from persons who because of their education, experience, or training are particularly qualified to advise the Secretary with respect to the programs of assistance authorized by parts B, C, D, E, F, and G of Title VII. Twelve of the members are representatives of the health professions schools assisted under programs authorized by Title VII, including at least six persons experienced in university administration and at least four representatives of schools of veterinary medicine, optometry, pharmacy, podiatry, and public health, and entities which may receive a grant under section 791; two from among full-time students enrolled in health professions schools, and six are selected from the general public. Members are appointed for overlapping terms of four years, except that student members are appointed for one-year terms and are eligible for reappointment.

FUNCTION

Advises the Secretary and the Administrator, Health Resources Administration, in the preparation of general regulations and with respect to policy matters in the administration of programs of financial assistance for the health professions, including construction of facilities, student loans and scholarships, capitation for the support of educational programs, special projects and other purposes to improve the quality of education. Makes recommendations to the Administrator, HRA, regarding grant applications.

STRUCTURE

Consists of the Director, National Institute of Mental Health, as Chairperson, the Chief Medical Officer of the Veterans Administration, or his representative, and a medical officer designated by the Secretary of Defense, who shall serve as ex officio members; and twelve members selected by the Secretary, from authorities knowledgeable in the fields of fundamental sciences, medical sciences, or public affairs. Six of such twelve are leading medical or scientific authorities outstanding in the study, diagnosis, or treatment of psychiatric disorders. Members are appointed for overlapping terms of four years, and no member is eligible for reappointment within one year after the end of his preceding term.

FUNCTION

Advises the Secretary, the Administrator, Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Administration, and the Director, NIMH, regarding the policies and programs of the Department in the field of mental health. Reviews applications for grants-in-aid relating to research, training, and services in the field of mental health, and recommends to the Administrator, ADAMHA, approval of those projects which merit support. In accordance with sections 206(c)(5) and 236 of the Community Mental Health Centers Act, the Council advises the Secretary with regard to regulations referred to in those sections. The Council collects information as to studies being carried on in the United States and abroad related to psychiatric disorders, and makes such information available to interested individuals and organizations. Makes recommendations with respect to the acceptance of conditional gifts pursuant to section 501 of the Public Health Service Act.

NATIONAL COUNCIL ON HEALTH CARE TECHNOLOGY

AUTHORITY

Established on November 9, 1978, under section 309(f) of the Public Health Service Act, as amended, 42 USC 242n, and continuing until the recharter date of September 30, 1981.

STRUCTURE

Consists of the Director, National Institutes of Health, the Chief Medical Officer, Veterans' Administration, the Assistant Secretary for Health and Environment, Department of Defense, the Chairperson, National Professional Standards Review Council, a member of the National Council on Health Planning and Development, the Director, Office of Science and Technology Policy, Commissioner, Food and Drug Administration, Director, Center for Disease Control, and the Administrator, Health Care Financing Administration (or the successor to such entity, or their designees), who are ex officio members, and eighteen members appointed by the Secretary. Six of the appointed members are selected from individuals who are distinguished in the fields of medicine, engineering, or science (including social science). Of the six members, at least two are selected from individuals who are representatives of business entities engaged in the development or production of health care technology. Two members are physicians, two are hospital administrators, two from the field of economics, two in the field of law, one in the field of ethics, and three from the general public who represent the interests of consumers of health care.

The Chairperson is elected annually by the appointed members from among their number. Members are appointed for overlapping terms of four years, except that: any member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of the term for which his or her predecessor was appointed, is appointed only for the remainder of such term. Members may serve after the expiration of their term until their successors have taken office.

FUNCTION

Advises the Secretary and the Director, National Center for Health Care Technology, with respect to the performance of the statutory functions of the Center; reviews applications for grants and contracts in excess of \$35,000, and makes recommendations regarding the approval of applications; advises the Secretary, after consultation with appropriate public and private entities, regarding the safety, efficacy, effectiveness, cost effectiveness, and the social and economic impacts of particular health care technologies; after consultations with appropriate public and private entities, develops when appropriate, standards, norms, and criteria concerning the use of particular health care technologies; and promptly publishes, disseminates, and otherwise makes available, through the National Library of Medicine, standards, norms and criteria developed.

MEETINGS

Meetings are held at least four times a year, at the call of the Chairperson, with the advance approval of a Government official.
