SUBJECT: Judge William J. Rea

Judge William J. Rea's chances for an appointment to the position of United States District Judge for the Central District of California are, at this point, largely indiscernible. Senator Hayakawa has yet to submit his list of recommendations for the three vacancies on the Court.

Because the Justice Department has lacked the Senator's formal input, the selection process has been conducted in a somewhat backward fashion. Judge Cynthia Holcomb Hall, U.S. Tax Court, is the top contender for one of those appointments. She has been recommended by Elizabeth Dole, Carla Hills and Darrell Trent. Subsequent to their initiative, the Senator was consulted and signed off on the nominee. She was approved by the Federal Judicial Selection Committee for pre-nomination clearance at the July 2, 1981 meeting.

Another individual, Judge Alfred Margolis of the Superior Court of California, has been recently recommended to the Justice Department for a seat on the Federal bench in the Central District. At the time this memorandum was prepared, the Justice Department had not made a decision on whether to forward his file for serious consideration during tomorrow's Judicial Selection Committee meeting.

Judge Rea does not appear in either Counsel's Office or Justice Department files, although the letter attached to your July 27, 1981 memorandum suggests that he has made such an application. It is possible that his name was sent directly to Senator Hayakawa, the California Merit Selection Panel, one of the many ad hoc Bar Association nominating committees, or a combination thereof.

In any event, "California vacancies" is a scheduled agenda item for discussion at tomorrow's meeting. During the meeting I will inquire further into the consideration of Judge Rea and will report back to you at its conclusion.

Dear Mr. President:

I would like to strongly commend former Senator John Sherman Cooper for the United States delegation to the United Nations.

As you know, Senator Cooper's record, both in the Senate and in several ambassadorial positions, is one of great distinction.

His skills in foreign relations played an important role in shaping our nation's foreign policy after World War II. In the late 1940's, he served as a delegate to the U.N. before joining Secretary of State Dean Acheson's staff as a consultant. President Eisenhower then appointed him Ambassador to India and Nepal in 1955.

In addition to his excellent work as an ambassador, Cooper was revered by his colleagues in the Senate and by his constituents in his home state of Kentucky. In 1960, he was elected to his first full term in the Senate by a wide majority of the popular vote. During his years in the Senate, he continued to take an active part in foreign affairs as a member of the Foreign Relations Committee.

After retiring from the Senate, he was appointed in 1974 by President Ford as this country's first Ambassador to East Germany, and remained in this important and sensitive post until 1976.

In sum, his is the record of a dedicated statesman. I have known and respected Senator Cooper for many years, and would appreciate your consideration of him for a position as a member of the U.S. delegation to the U.N.

Prior to her appointment in 1979 to her present position, she served as a Superior Court judge in Phoenix, Arizona, from 1975 until 1979. She went on the bench after five years in the Arizona State Senate, where she became Senate majority leader in 1973. Before becoming a State Senator, Judge O'Connor served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 until 1969.

Judge O'Connor was born on March 26, 1930, in El Paso, Texas. She is the daughter of a pioneer Arizona ranching family, with ranching interests in Arizona and New Mexico. Because of the remoteness of her family home in eastern Arizona, Judge O'Connor was educated at a private girls' school in El Paso. She attended Austin High School, a public school in El Paso, and graduated in 1947.

In the fall of 1947, Mrs. O'Connor entered Stanford University. Majoring in economics, she graduated in 1950 at the age of 20. She graduated with the honor of Great Distinction, the highest academic honor bestowed by the University. Upon her graduation, she entered Stanford Law School, where she was elected during her second year to the legal honorary society, the Order of the Coif. Mrs. O'Connor was one of eight individuals in her class elected to that society as a second-year student. She also served on the Stanford Law Review, becoming a member of the Board of Editors of the Review during her third year.

Upon graduation from law school at the age of 22, Mrs. O'Connor was named Deputy County Attorney for San Mateo County, California. As Deputy County Attorney, Mrs. O'Connor represented municipal entities, including utility and other special districts, in a broad range of legal matters. She served in that capacity until 1953, when her husband, John Jay O'Connor III, who is now a lawyer in Phoenix, entered military service upon his graduation from the Stanford Law School. By virtue of Mr. O'Connor's assignment in Frankfurt, Germany, Mrs. O'Connor secured a position as a civil attorney on the staff of the Quartermaster General in Frankfurt. Engaging in the review, analysis and drafting of bids, contracts and other legal instruments, Mrs. O'Connor served in that capacity throughout her husband's tenure in Frankfurt.

Returning to Arizona following her husband's military service, Mrs. O'Connor established a private law practice in Maricopa County in 1959. She engaged full time in the general practice of law until the birth of her sons, Scott who is now 22, Brian, 19, and Jay, 17. From 1961 until 1965, Mrs. O'Connor raised the family's three children, practiced law part-time, and was active in civic and political affairs in Phoenix.

In 1965, Mrs. O'Connor returned to her professional career full time, being selected as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona. Representing state agencies such as state hospitals and the state welfare department, Mrs. O'Connor served in that capacity until 1969.

In 1969, Mrs. O'Connor was appointed as a member of the Arizona State Senate by the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors to fill the unexpired term of a state senator who left to accept a government position in Washington, D.C. She was elected to the State Senate in her own right in 1970 and was overwhelmingly reelected in 1972. In 1972 and 1973, she served as Chairman of the State, County and Municipal Affairs Committee in the State Senate. In 1973, Mrs. O'Connor was elected as Majority Leader of the Arizona State Senate, the first woman in Arizona to hold that position, and one of the first women in the Nation to serve in such a capacity.

After two years as Majority Leader, Mrs. O'Connor determined to leave the legislative arena and to enter judicial service. She ran for and was elected as a Superior Court judge in 1974, taking office in 1975. As a state trial judge, Judge O'Connor handled numerous civil and criminal cases. She received a 90 percent rating in September 1976 from members of the Phoenix bar for overall performance, with a 97 percent rating for integrity in carrying out the duties of her office. In a 1978 survey of Phoenix attorneys, Judge O'Connor garnered an 85 percent overall rating and a 97 rating for integrity. In the November 1978 election, Judge O'Connor was retained in office as a trial court judge.

Following four years of service on the state trial bench, Judge O'Connor was elevated in 1979 by Governor Bruce Babbitt to the Arizona Court of Appeals, the twelve member intermediate appellate court of the State. Judge O'Connor has served in that capacity until the present time, garnering in 1980 a 90 percent overall rating from the bar and a 97 percent rating for judicial integrity.

In addition to her positions in public service, Judge O'Connor has served as a Member of the Board of the Smithsonian Associates, a Member of the Board of Trustees of Stanford University, and as president of the Board of Trustees of the Heard Museum in Phoenix. She also served as president of the Junior League of Phoenix and as a board member of the Salvation Army Advisory Board, the YMCA of Maricopa County, the Phoenix Historical Society, the Phoenix Country Day School, and Golden Gate Settlement. Mrs. O'Connor also served as a member of the board of directors of the First National Bank of Arizona and of Blue Cross/Blue Shield Arizona. She continues to serve as a member of the board of her family's ranching firm in Duncan, Arizona.

Besides her numerous board memberships, Judge O'Connor served as Vice Chairman of the Select Law Enforcement Review Commission in 1979-1980, Chairman of the Maricopa County Bar Association's Lawyer Referral Service in 1960-1962, Chairman of the Maricopa County Juvenile Detention Home Visiting Board 1963-1964, and as Chairman of the Arizona Supreme Court Committee to Reorganize Lower Courts in 1974-1975. Active in Arizona political circles, Mrs. O'Connor was Co-Chairman of the Arizona Committee to Re-Elect the President in 1972 and served as Republican District Chairman and as a member of the Arizona State and Maricopa County Republican Committees. She was actively sought out as a Republican gubernatorial candidate during two election races.

In recognition of her achievements, Mrs. O'Connor was selected in 1975 for the Annual Award of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. In 1972, she was selected as "Woman of the Year" by the Phoenix Advertising Club. Arizona State University presented her in 1980 with the Distinguished Achievement Award.

Judge O'Connor is a member of the State Bars of Arizona and California and is a member of the Maricopa County Bar Association.

She resides with her husband, a senior partner in the Phoenix law firm of Fennemore, Craig, von Ammon & Udall, in the Phoenix suburb of Paradise Valley.

In announcing on July 7 his intention to nominate Judge O'Connor as an Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, President Reagan stated: "Judge O'Connor brings a truly outstanding background to the Court. She has served with great ability as a lawyer for the State of Arizona, as a State Senator who rose quickly to become Senate Majority Leader of her State, and as a distinguished trial court judge and appellate judge. Her academic background is superb. Judge O'Connor brings to the bench the qualities of excellence, competence, temperament and a strong sense of the appropriate role of the judiciary and of the federal government in our lives. I have every confidence that, upon her confirmation, she will be an outstanding and distinguished Justice."



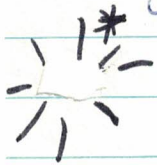

International Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies surprised and deeply concerned by current reports that Norman Roberts is again being considered for appointment as Director of U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. It is our considered judgement that he lacks the knowledge, background, and experience essential to this important position and we would on that basis, be impelled to oppose his confirmation if he is nominated. The Association consists of state and federal fish and wildlife management agencies and is dedicated to professional, rational, and balanced fish and wildlife resource management use. All 50 states are members. We have actively supported your budget proposals; we have endorsed your choice of Secretary Watt and your selection of Assistant Secretary Arnett, but we feel that nomination of a man inexperienced in fish and wildlife management to be Fish and Wildlife Director would be inappropriate and would alienate sound resource and conservation organizations which are now similarly disposed. We would strongly favor the nomination of Robert Jantzen, a working professional with unquestioned credentials for the position in question, and are convinced that this view is widely shared by other concerned organizations and affected interests. The post has now been vacant for almost six months. We therefore respectfully urge your consideration of our expressed views and your prompt action to resolve this matter by nomination of such an experienced and qualified fish and wildlife manager as Mr. Jantzen.



I am enclosing two items that you might want to scan. The first is the Justice Department report that I mentioned earlier this week; it calls for the prohibition of manufacture and sale of ~~certain~~ handguns. Although approved under the Carter Administration, it wasn't published until just recently, although I haven't determined precisely when. It is just for your information, but it is another in the stack of reasons why we are opposing the effort, strongly pushed by the Carter Administration and Ted Kennedy, to move BATF and the enforcement of the Gun Control Act to the Justice Department.

The second item is a copy of a telegram from the International Association of Fish and Wildlife Commissioners to President Reagan. As I mentioned on the phone, we have no intention of becoming actively involved in this controversy, although we are concerned, both for the position and the embarrassment that might be caused the Administration.

Senator Stafford (Chairman of the jurisdictional committee for this nomination) has pointed out two potential problems in the nomination of Norman C. Roberts to be Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

1. Roberts may not meet the statutory qualifications to be Director of Fish and Wildlife. The applicable statute states that:

No individual may be appointed as Director unless he is, by reason of scientific education and experience, knowledgeable in the principles of fisheries and wildlife management.
16 U.S.C. § 742b(b).

Although Roberts has a scientific education as a veterinarian, he has no identifiable experience or knowledge "in the principles of fisheries and wildlife management." For the past twenty-two years, Roberts has been involved in the financial and investment management field. His career as a veterinarian appears to have ended in 1958 when he left a 12-year equine practice on major race tracks.

2. While a weak case could be made for Roberts qualifications under the statute, the constituent groups of the Fish and Wildlife Service have indicated that they will oppose his nomination on those grounds. The wildlife groups that have indicated their probable opposition to this nomination are the traditional "conservative" wildlife groups who have been supporting the Administration's proposals and will be looked to for support on conservation issues raised in the Congress.

Senator Stafford advised us that while he understands the basis for nominating Roberts, his confirmation will be controversial and difficult. Senator Baker concurs in this assessment.

The position of Director of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service was established within the Department of Interior in 1974 by P.L. No. 93-271 (codified at 16 U.S.C. §742b (1976)). (Tab A). The Act abolished the position of Commissioner of Fish and Wildlife, as well as the former Fish and Wildlife Service, which consisted of two separate agencies headed by separate directors appointed by the Interior Secretary.

In order to attach greater importance to the position, subsection (b) was passed to transform the position into a Presidential appointment requiring Senate confirmation. In addition, subsection (b) provides that:

"[n]o individual may be appointed as the Director unless he is, by reason of scientific education and experience, knowledgeable in the principles of fisheries and wildlife management."

16 U.S.C. §742B(b) (1976).

The legislative history contains the following discussion of this new subsection:

"In keeping with the intent of upgrading the position of Director, your Committee deemed it appropriate to add language to the bill that would set forth the background and qualifications the individual should have who is to head this office, thereby assuring the appointment of a professionally-trained public servant." (Emphasis added).

Only one individual, Lynn Adams Greenwalt, has occupied this office since its reconstitution. Mr. Greenwalt was nominated by President Nixon in July and confirmed in October of 1974. According to the personnel forms attached at Tab B, Mr. Greenwalt is a career bureaucrat, who brought approximately 17 years of experience to his current position.

The Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources has jurisdiction over this appointment. The Committee's composition is set forth at Tab C.

No individual may be appointed as the Director unless he is, by reason of scientific education and experience, knowledgeable in the principles of fisheries and wildlife management.

**Succession to United States Fish and Wildlife Service and
Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife**

(c) The United States Fish and Wildlife Service established by subsection (b) of this section shall succeed to and replace the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (as constituted on June 30, 1974) and the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife (as constituted on such date). All laws and regulations in effect on June 30, 1974, which relate to matters administered by the Department of the Interior through the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (as constituted on such date) and the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife (as constituted on such date) shall remain in effect.

Functions and responsibilities of Secretary of Interior

(d) All functions and responsibilities placed in the Department of the Interior or any official thereof by sections 742a to 742d and 742e to 742j of this title shall be included among the functions and responsibilities of the Secretary of the Interior, as the head of the Department, and shall be carried out under his direction pursuant to such procedures or delegations of authority as he may deem advisable and in the public interest.

As required, attends meetings with the Secretary of the Interior, Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks and representatives of other Interior Bureaus and Government agencies on matters affecting sport fisheries and wildlife.

Supervisory Controls:

Receives general administrative direction from the Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks as to broad, national program policies and objectives.

ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURCES

—Jurisdiction comprises energy policy; energy regulation and conservation; energy research and development; solar energy systems; non-military development of nuclear energy; naval petroleum reserves in Alaska; oil and gas production and distribution; extraction of minerals from oceans and Outer Continental Shelf lands; energy related aspects of deepwater ports; hydroelectric power, irrigation, and reclamation; coal production, distribution, and utilization; public lands and forests, including farming and grazing thereon, and mineral extraction therefrom; national parks, recreation areas, wilderness areas, wild and scenic rivers, historical sites, military parks and battlefields on the public domain, and preservation of prehistoric ruins and objects of interest; mining education and research; territorial possessions of the United States, including trusteeships.
