(President Reagan Letter prepared by Stephen Winchell & Associates, Inc.)

5 September 1984

Dear Mr. Alexander:

In just a few weeks the voters will cast their ballots in this, my final campaign for public office.

I know of your generous and early support of my re-election effort, Mr. Alexander. Believe me, I am deeply grateful for it. Your contributions helped my campaign committee carry out its programs and knowing of your personal commitment to what I have been trying to accomplish for our nation has helped sustain me and Nancy.

It is as a friend, and fellow conservative, that I would like to take a private moment now and share with you some special concerns I have about this election.

In my opinion, what will be decided on November 6th is whether you and I will have the chance to create a true "opportunity society" or whether the Democrats will instead preside over a government ruled by special interests and a society torn apart by their politics of greed and envy.

Our Party has clearly put itself on the side of economic growth and the traditional values that made this country such a wonder in the world's history.

But our opponents, the Democrats led by Walter Mondale, have just as decisively allied themselves with the negative policies of overtaxation at home and lack of resolve abroad which by 1981 had brought our nation to such a low point.

If we lose this election, then I frankly fear we may lose forever the chance to secure for our children and grandchildren the same opportunities and liberties which you and I, and generations of Americans before us, enjoyed.

Today, the biggest threat facing every one of our candidates, including me, is the massive voter registration and activation drive mounted on behalf of the Democrats by some of the special interest groups opposing us.

Let me tell you as plainly as I can -- this election is going to be close. The polls mean almost nothing. Despite what

I believe is our Party's strong support among individual citizens throughout this nation, we are in danger of losing several key electoral states simply because of the organizational strength of these special interests.

I am convinced that the most important task facing our Party is to neutralize this Democratic advantage by registering new GOP voters and getting them to the polls on November 6th.

To spearhead this GOP counter-offensive, our state parties, in conjunction with the Republican National Committee, have worked together to pay for our voter registration drive and get out the vote effort.

I have enclosed for you a brochure which outlines this project. As you can tell from reading it, we are already well on the road to registering the new voters we need.

But we are nearly \$1 million short of the funds needed to set up the phone banks that will coordinate our get-out-the-vote-drive on November 6th.

I know I don't need to overemphasize to you that unless we get our new voters to the polls on Election Day, our entire voter registration drive really will have been in vain.

I would count it as a special favor if you could make a contribution to help us pay for this last, and most critical, program of the 1984 campaign and mail it back to me today. The brochure tells you how to make out your check.

I don't feel comfortable asking you to send a specific amount, because you have already proved to be such a loyal friend. But if you could match the amount you gave my campaign committee, Reagan-Bush '84, I would be truly in your debt.

As Nancy and I have campaigned across the country this year, we have both been struck again not only by the natural splendor of America, but also by the extraordinary dedication and character of her people.

You and I both have a special calling to do whatever we can to preserve and strengthen this nation and her liberties for the generations of Americans that will come after us. That is why I entered public life nearly twenty years ago, and I think that is why you give so selflessly to support our Party and our cause.

I pray I can count on you to help me one last time in this campaign to build a better future for our nation.

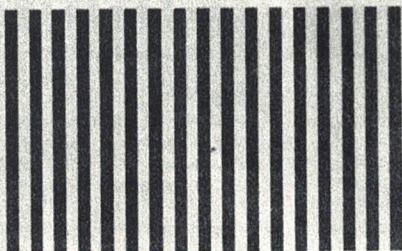

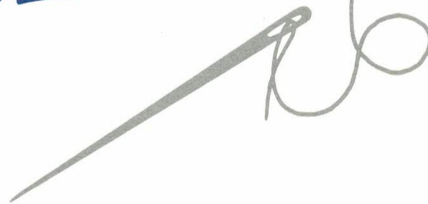

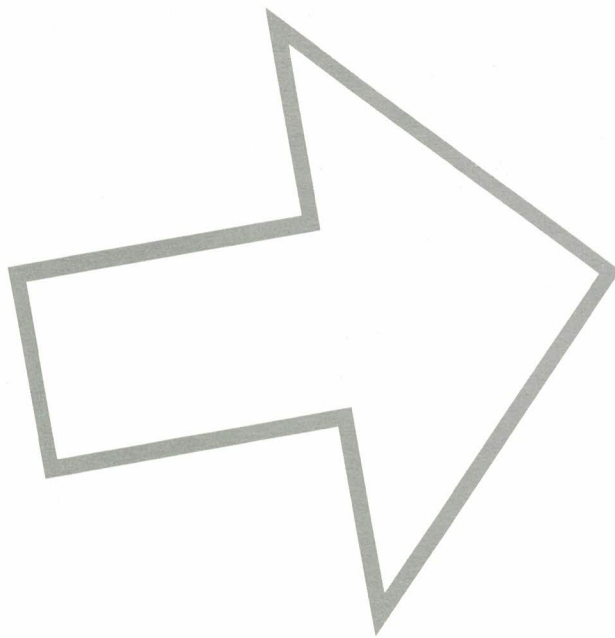

The Answers

If you answered "C. None" on every question, you pass the test. Basically President Reagan can't count on any of the millions of new voters these groups are registering. *And he is just one of hundreds of Republican candidates who are the targets of these and many other campaigns to register voters and get them to the polls to vote for Democrats in November.*

But, do these tactics work?

An eight-day campaign in New Jersey registered 11,500 food stamp recipients. Post-election research showed that two-thirds of those who registered and received follow-up information actually made it to the polls to vote.

How much impact can these new voters have, anyway?

If the Democrats control 10-15 million new voters this year, they can control the outcome of virtually every election at every level of American government in every section of the country.

The Republican counter-offensive

To neutralize this Democrat advantage, Republican state parties have launched a massive counter-offensive to register new Reagan supporters and get them to the polls on election day.

Phase One: 2,000,000 new voters. The first phase of the Republican counter-offensive, a nationwide voter registration campaign, is nearing completion. It has been enormously successful, signing up more than two million new Republican supporters.

Phase Two: Getting out the vote. The second phase, a comprehensive get-out-the-vote program, will get underway in September. It will include such operations as:

- ☐ Voter identification programs
- ☐ Phone banks
- ☐ Door-to-door campaigns
- ☐ Mass mailings
- ☐ Ballot integrity programs

These operations are funded under special provisions of the federal elections laws. Each state Republican Party is allowed to establish an account as a part of its Federal Committee for the purpose of raising and spending *unlimited amounts of money* to pay for certain specific volunteer activities. These accounts have been identified in most (but not all) states as the "Victory '84" accounts. Note that contributions to these accounts are subject to the restrictions of the Federal Election Campaign Act.

While federal laws place no limits on the amount of money which can be raised and spent, they do place restrictions on the types of activities these special federal accounts can fund. The law allows these accounts to pay for voter identification, voter registration and get-out-the-vote programs, as well as campaign materials and certain types of mailings. No media advertisements are permitted.

Specifically, these accounts may fund the following

1. **Campaign Materials**—bumper stickers, buttons, tabloids, posters and other campaign materials which are used and distributed by volunteers in support of all federal candidates, including President Reagan.
 2. **Volunteer Phone Banks** on behalf of the Republican Party's nominees for President and Vice President.
 3. **Mass Mailings** of campaign materials by volunteers in support of federal candidates, including President Reagan, and use of mailing lists developed by the state parties.

How will this program help the President?

Federal ceilings on presidential campaign spending restrict the amount of money available to the President's re-election campaign and make it essential that the state and local parties become more active. Non-allocable expenditures from state and local Party federal accounts as set forth above are the only way for Republicans to exercise a financial advantage over the Mondale-Ferraro ticket in coordination with the Reagan-Bush '84 campaign. *Every dollar that the Reagan-Bush '84 campaign has to spend on these types of activities is a dollar that cannot be spent on media or other direct campaign costs. So, in effect, Party expenditures on these exempt activities increase the presidential and other Republican candidates' campaign budgets.*

Why your contribution is important

1. **1984: a crossroads in American politics.** The decisions voters make on November 6 will shape the course our nation takes for years to come. For example, with five Supreme Court justices over age 75, the next president is likely to appoint several new members of the Supreme Court.
2. **Dramatic changes in the election process.** Elections used to be predictable. Today they're not. In 1980, for example, the polls showed the presidential election to be virtually even as late as 10 days before voters handed Ronald Reagan a landslide victory. Money raised now and spent by the state Parties in the last days and weeks before the election can make the difference between four more years of progress or four years of failure in the Carter-Mondale tradition.
3. **The legacy of the Carter-Mondale Administration.** When voters kicked them out of office in 1980, Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale left behind a weak national defense, a struggling foreign policy and an economy in shambles. Interest rates, inflation and unemployment were heading upward.

4. **The leadership of the Reagan-Bush Administration.** After less than four years under Republican leadership, *America is back!* We are once again recognized as the leader of the free world. Our national defenses are stronger. And our economy is rebuilding, with interest rates cut, unemployment down and inflation under control.

5. **A vitally important way to support President Reagan.** A contribution to your state Party's federal account is one of the most important ways you can give money to support President Reagan's re-election.

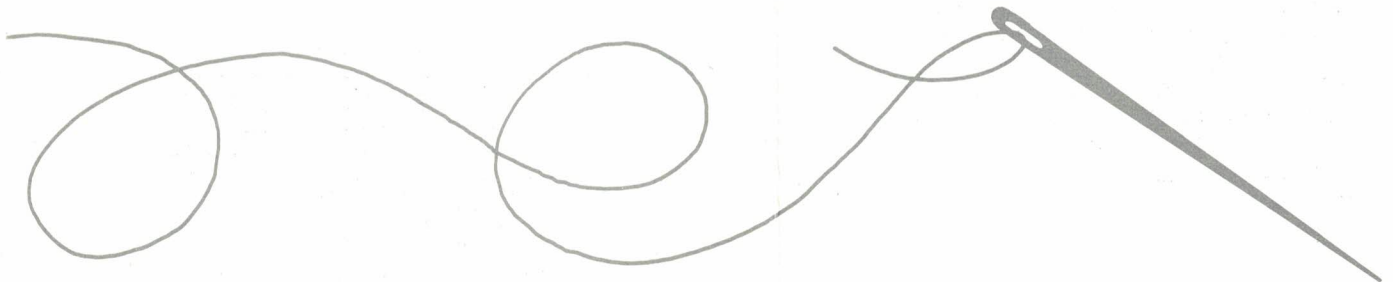
