I appreciate your comments on the results of the Ford Motor Company study of the 20 "worst case" cities with regard to ozone attainment, the Multinational Business Services costs study, and the National Highway and Traffic Safety Administration statement on safety implications.

As you know, the EPA is in the early stages of its proposed rulemaking on onboard controls. The notice of EPA's refueling emissions proposal was published in the Federal Register on August 19, 1987, for public comment. A public hearing on the proposal has been scheduled for the last week of October 1987, to be followed by an additional 30-day public comment period.

It is my hope that you participate in the EPA rulemaking so that the agency has the benefit of your views prior to any rulemaking decisions. The Administrative Procedure Act requires that EPA base its final rulemaking on the administrative record it assembles from the public comment periods and from the public hearing, and your concerns and testimony could become a vital part of this administrative record. In addition, I have taken the liberty of forwarding a copy of your letter to Lee Thomas, EPA Administrator, for his consideration.
