



"Robbie" presided over the Tent's organizational meeting on January 19th of that year, and the Tent's first "roast" was staged just four months later on May 26th, 1952.

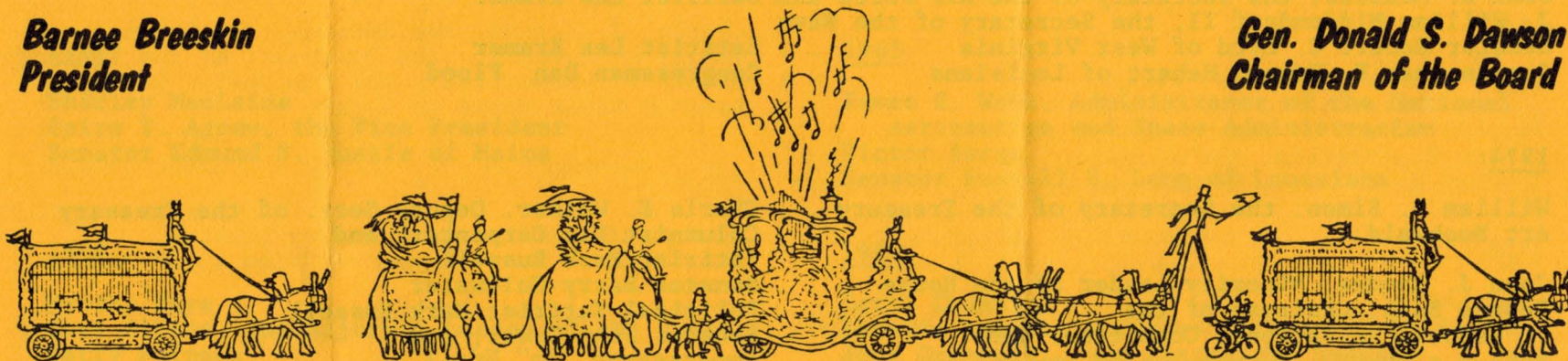



I don't wish to seem disloyal
to my President - but it sure
is good to see you in the
White House, regardless of the
