Dear Frank:

I am dictating this belated letter for the reason that even I cannot read my own handwriting and, therefore, cannot expect anyone else to do so. Also this is my excuse for being so belated; I had to get back to my office to dictate and I have been away for a long time.

First I want to thank you for your letter to my daughter. You don't know how thrilled she was to receive a note from the President. She is keeping it among her most valued possessions.

Of course you know I got the news of her illness the night of the Dinner at Groton, and of course I had to leave in a hurry before I could thank you for the drive over from Worcester. At first the Infantile did not seem to be serious, but it gradually developed into a question of life and death. If I hadn't been able to lay my hands on a Respirator (every hospital should have at least one) my girl would not be alive today. At present, thank God, she is out of danger and will live, though she still spends ten of the twenty four hours a day in the Respirator, but this is merely for rest and not of necessity. What permanent harm has been done no one can tell yet, though I feel that she will come through absolutely whole. I am so sure that I won't let myself think anything else. Her progress has been remarkable for a child given up for dead three months ago.

Some time I may have a favor to ask of you, because later we may want to take her to Warm Springs, Georgia; if so, may I call upon you to put me wise to what to do, and so forth, down there?

Again may I thank you for my trip with you, and your generous thought in writing to Sister Lord, and

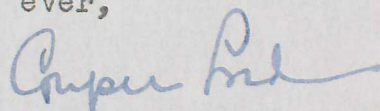

She can move her legs and arms a good deal, and she can also sit up for a short time unaided although we don't let her do that much as it might tire her. 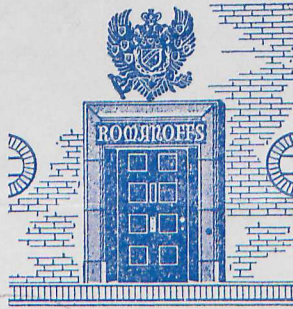
