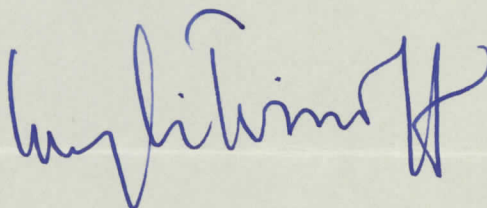

For letters and translations thereof of following correspondence: Letter to the President signed M . Kalinin - countersigned V. Molotov, People's Commissar for Foreign Affairs, the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics - dated Sept. 7, 1943, to the effect that the above-mentioned Presidium has decided to give another appointment to Citizen Maxim Maximovich Litvinov, recalling him from his post as Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to the United States of America; a second letter, also dated 9/7/43 - and translation, signed as the letter above-mentioned from the Soviet Presidium, to the effect that Citizen Andrei Andreevich Gromyko is to be appointed as Ambassador to replace Litvinov, and a translation of Citizen Andrei Andreevich Gromyko's letter of credence to the President.

The President wrote thanking him for interesting new postage stamps from the Soviet Government. The President said that ten years ago, when Litvinoff first came over for the purpose of reopening diplomatic relations, he (Mr. Litvinoff) gave the President as a personal gift an album containing all the Soviet stamps up to that time. The President said he had not been able to keep things up to date since then and that the stamps from Admiral Standly were a great addition. (Penciled note: The President has stamps and letters)

Letter to the President, saying that in regard to the Wm. B. Ziff book which he gave the President, he received telegram from George Fielding Eliot (enclosed) in answering to a wire which he sent asking for Mr. Eliot's opinion. Mr. Wallace call attention to the Cabinet Meeting when Secretary Hull made statement with regard to Ambassador Litvinoff's great concern about the influence of our State Department in influencing Latin America with regard to reestablishing relations with Russia. Mr. Wallace is afraid that the origin of Litvinoff's concern may perhaps have a serious aspect to it.
