Dear Madam:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of January 9th relative to the pilgrimage you have been invited to make to the grave of your son, the late Lieutenant Charles P. Anderson, sailing July 12th on the PRESIDENT HARDING.

There are two other groups of women who are to visit the St. Mihiel American Cemetery, where the remains of your son are interred, during the coming summer. The first party will sail May 17th on the PRESIDENT HARDING and the other will sail July 26th on the PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT. It is requested that you advise this office as soon as possible which date you desire to make the journey.

With reference to your desire to have your sister accompany you on the trip you are advised that under the law governing the pilgrimage the Government can bear no part of the expense of relatives or friends accompanying pilgrims on their journey, nor can it make any arrangements for them. It is possible, however, for your sister to accompany you at personal expense and be with you for the greater part of the pilgrimage. It is estimated the entire trip would cost her \$550.

Sightseeing trips in and around Paris and transportation between Paris and the cemeteries are accomplished by busses which are chartered by the Government for official use only, and this office therefore could not authorize your sister's transportation in these busses.

If your sister desires to accompany you at her own expense under the above conditions, she should immediately communicate with the Roosevelt Steamship Company, #1 Broadway, New York City, for reservation for the ocean voyage between New York and

France, advising them the name of the steamship on which you are to sail, the date of sailing, and your name. The steamship company will furnish full information as to the cost of ocean transportation. On receipt of definite advice that your sister is accompanying you, this office will advise the Officers in Charge of the Pilgrimage in New York and Paris, and if you so desire, your sister will be placed in the same room with you at the hotels and on the steamers, provided the same class of transportation and hotel accommodations are secured.

The American Express Company, #11 rue Scribe, Paris, France, is in close touch with the pilgrimage office in Paris and will probably arrange itineraries that will parallel those of the pilgrimage. It is suggested your sister communicate with them for arrangements as to transportation in Paris and to and from the cemeteries and for hotel accommodations in the town near the cemetery.

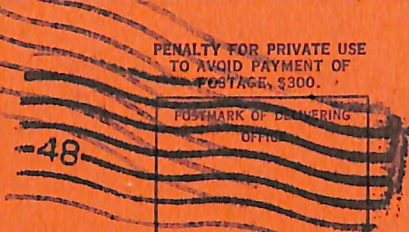



Your attention is invited to the enclosed copy of an Act of Congress approved March 2, 1929, entitled an Act "To enable the mothers and widows of the deceased soldiers, sailors and marines of the American forces now interred in the cemeteries of Europe to make a pilgrimage to these cemeteries".

The records of this office show that you are the father of the late First Lieutenant Charles P. Anderson, 96th Aero Sq., whose remains are now interred in the St. Mihiel American Cemetery, Thiaucourt, Meurthe-et-Moselle, France.

Will you please advise this office whether or not he is survived by a mother or widow who is entitled under the provisions of the above quoted Act, to make the pilgrimage, and if so, will you please furnish the full names and addresses of the mother and widow in order that action may be taken to extend invitations to them to make the pilgrimage. Both mothers and widows are entitled to make the pilgrimage.

Your attention is particularly invited to Section 4 of the enclosed Act, which defines the terms "mother" and "widow". If the relative is a stepmother, mother through adoption, or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the decedent, a statement as to her relationship is requested. If he was survived by a widow who has since remarried it is also requested that a statement to that effect be made.

For your reply, you may use the enclosed envelope which requires no postage.

Dear Sir:

The Quartermaster General desires that receipt be acknowledged of your letter of April 15, 1924.

Please know that the permanent American cemeteries overseas are now in the process of reconstruction. This work has required much regrading and filling. All graves settle in the course of time and must be refilled; until then, it is not possible to complete the work of beautification.

This office is unable to state definitely just when the permanent headstone will be placed at the grave of your son, the late 1st Lieutenant Charles P. Anderson, 96th Aero Squadron. Erection of the headstones is practically the last step in this work. The work of placing them at the graves of our soldier dead in Europe will be begun as soon after July 1, 1924, as is possible.

It is suggested that you communicate with Lieutenant Colonel Robert Sterrett, Chief, American Graves Registration Service, Q. M. C., in Europe, 20 Rue Molitor, Paris, (16eme) France, who will be glad to attend to the matter of having flowers placed on the grave of Lieutenant Anderson, or should you prefer, Mr. Francis Jacques, Adjutant of the American Legion, 94 rue du Cherche, M.R.D.1, Paris, VIe, France, will gladly assist you in this respect.

The inclosed "Certificates of Grave Location", if attached to your applications for a passport, will enable you and your wife to secure them free of charge, subject to the regulations of the State Department concerning visits to other countries and the inclusion of other purposes in the journey.

Kindly call at the office of the Chief, American Graves Registration Service, Q.M.C., in Europe, whose address is given above, upon your arrival in France. Information will be gladly furnished concerning all matters pertaining to the cemeteries and visiting the graves of our soldier dead. An information service is maintained there for the purpose of assisting visitors to the graves of relatives or friends.

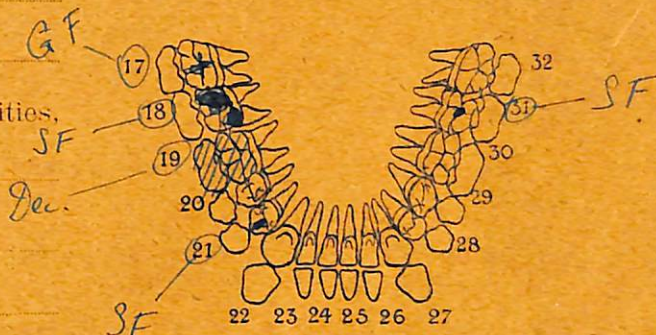
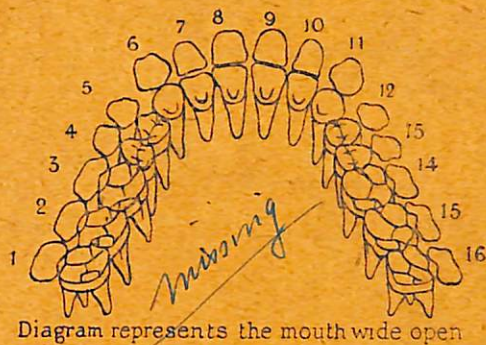

Lieut. P.B. Anderson, Pilot, 96th Aeron Squadron, was shot down near Joudreville (12 kilometers north west of Briey, in the department of Meurthe et Moselle, Arrondissement De Briey) Lieut Anderson was killed immediately and was buried in the cemetery at Joudreville by the French people of that village. M.le Mayor, Auguste Leonard, Dept. Meurthe et Moselle, Arrondissement De Briey, Canton de Audun-le-Romain, Commune Joudreville, Had charge of the funeral ceremony. He has a letter from Lieut. Anderson's mother to her son, which was found in his pocket. The Mayor insisted upon the body being brought from the field despite the opposition of the Germans, who wished to bury him there, and had a coffin made. He was buried on Sunday in the cemetery and all of the village people followed carrying flowers. His parents may communicate with the Mayor for further information. We promised the Mayor that his parents would communicate with him immediately and arrange for the permanent upkeep of his grave. This officer died in combat against a superior number of German aeroplanes.
