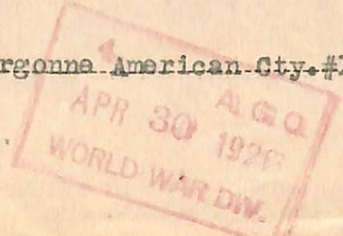

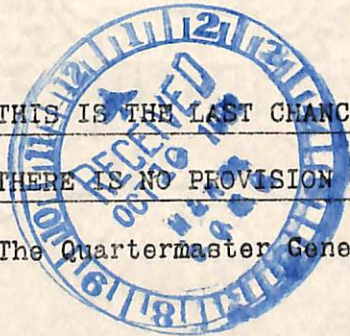

Dear Madam:

The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

In order to assure proper and satisfactory accommodations for the mothers and widows making the journey in 1933, reservations for steamship transportation must be made by this office several months in advance. It is requested that you answer the questions below by writing "Yes" or "No" or "Undecided" in the blank space following the question. When you have answered the question, sign your name and return this sheet in the enclosed addressed envelope which requires no postage. PLEASE DO NOT DELAY, as it is essential that the information be in this office promptly.

This letter is being sent to all eligible mothers and widows who did not make the pilgrimage during the years 1930, 1931 or 1932. There is enclosed a circular of information WHICH YOU SHOULD READ VERY CAREFULLY BEFORE MAKING YOUR DECISION.

Receipt is acknowledged of your request for stopovers at Washington, D. C., Annapolis, Md. and Greenville, S. C. on your return from the pilgrimage to the Meuse Argonne American Cemetery in Europe, sailing from New York on the S.S. PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT, August 17, 1932.

Arrangements will be made for stopovers at Washington, D.C. and Greenville, S.C. which will involve no additional cost to you for either rail or pullman fare. As Annapolis is not directly on your return route of travel, it is suggested that you make your own arrangements for a side trip from Washington, D.C. to Annapolis and return to Washington. The cost of this round trip will be approximately two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) which must be paid from your personal funds. There will also be in effect at the time of your return from Europe, a seven-day limit excursion fare of one dollar and twenty two cents (\$1.22) for the round trip.

Receipt is acknowledged of form letter completed by you and your letter of August 7, 1930 inquiring as to whether or not a relative could accompany you on the pilgrimage to the grave of your son, the late Second Lieutenant John Wilcox Anderson, as authorized by the Act of March 2, 1929.

Under the law providing for this pilgrimage, the Government cannot bear any part of the expense of relative or friend accompanying the pilgrim, nor can it make any arrangements for them. This must be entirely a personal matter.

It may be possible for your son or sister to secure accommodations on the same ship and possibly at the same hotels in New York and Paris, but no authority exists for transportation of friends or relatives in the busses chartered by the Government to convey the pilgrims from Paris to the cemeteries. The Government can assume no responsibility for relatives or friends accompanying pilgrims and they must not expect medical or other assistance from the Government or to be included in official tours paid for by the Government.

If your son or sister desires to accompany you under these conditions, it is suggested that the matter be taken up with the steamship company when you are notified as to the name of the vessel upon which reservation has been made for you and the date of sailing.

Competent personnel has been provided to care for the women making the pilgrimage from the time they leave home until they return thereto. Medical attendants and all other necessities have been arranged for and you are assured that the trip will not only be made at the expense of the United States, but everything necessary

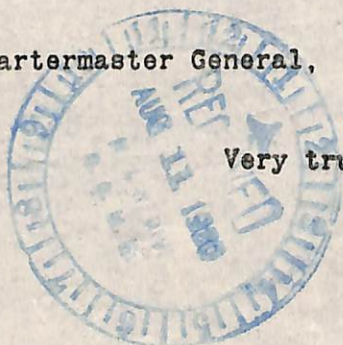



Receipt is acknowledged of form letter completed by you and your letter of August 7, 1930 inquiring as to whether or not a relative could accompany you on the pilgrimage to the grave of your son, the late Second Lieutenant John Wilcox Anderson, as authorized by the Act of March 2, 1929.

Under the law providing for this pilgrimage, the Government cannot bear any part of the expense of relative or friend accompanying the pilgrim, nor can it make any arrangements for them. This must be entirely a personal matter.

It may be possible for your son or sister to secure accommodations on the same ship and possibly at the same hotels in New York and Paris, but no authority exists for transportation of friends or relatives in the busses chartered by the Government to convey the pilgrims from Paris to the cemeteries. The Government can assume no responsibility for relatives or friends accompanying pilgrims and they must not expect medical or other assistance from the Government or to be included in official tours paid for by the Government.

If your son or sister desires to accompany you under these conditions, it is suggested that the matter be taken up with the steamship company when you are notified as to the name of the vessel upon which reservation has been made for you and the date of sailing.

Competent personnel has been provided to care for the women making the pilgrimage from the time they leave home until they return thereto. Medical attendants and all other necessities have been arranged for and you are assured that the trip will not only be made at the expense of the United States, but everything necessary
