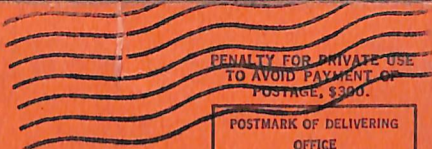

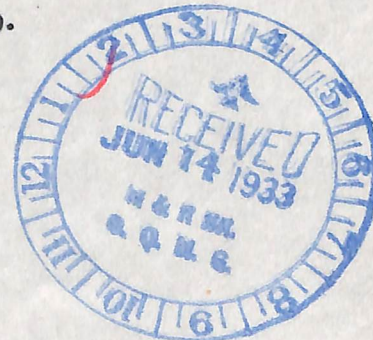

Immediately following receipt of your acceptance of the invitation to make a pilgrimage to Europe, sailing on July 12, 1933, a letter containing general information of importance was mailed to you. In this letter you were told how to proceed to obtain a passport which you must have before you can visit Europe. Your passport has not yet been received in this office.

If it is your intention to make the pilgrimage, you should go at once to the Clerk of the District Court, Lawrence, Kansas, taking with you:

1. Four (4) photographs of yourself on thin paper (unmounted) not more than 3 x 3 inches or less than 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches in size;
2. Your invitation and any evidence of citizenship you may have;
3. Someone who has known you for at least two years to identify you.

The Clerk will help you fill out the application and HE will forward it to the State Department. Your passport will be delivered to you aboard the boat. No charge will be made for the application or passport.

If you have changed your mind and do not intend to make the pilgrimage, please so inform this office at once. It is necessary to know at this time whether or not you intend to make the pilgrimage in order that reservation and other necessary arrangements may be made for you.

It is requested you advise whether you are making application for your passport or whether you have decided not to make a pilgrimage. A self-addressed envelope which requires no postage is enclosed for your convenience in replying.

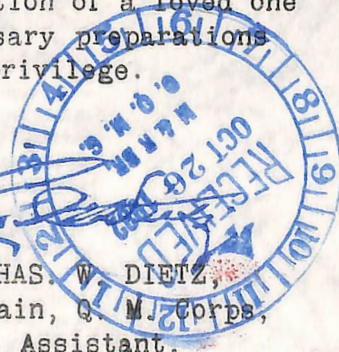

The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries Of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

In order to assure proper and satisfactory accommodations for the mothers and widows making the journey in 1933, reservations for steamship transportation must be made by this office several months in advance. It is requested that you answer the questions below by writing "Yes" or "No" or "Undecided" in the blank space following the question. 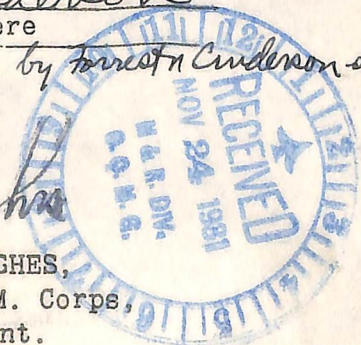

The records of this office show that you are the father of the late First Lieutenant Lionel A. Anderson, M.R.C. Attd. #48, Casualty Clearing Station, whose remains are now interred in the Flanders Field American Cemetery, Waareghem, Belgium.

Will you please advise this office whether or not he is survived by a mother or widow who is entitled under the provisions of the above quoted Act, to make the pilgrimage, and if so, will you please furnish the full names and addresses of the mother and widow in order that action may be taken to extend invitations to them to make the pilgrimage. Both mothers and widows are entitled to make the pilgrimage.

To: The Quartermaster General of the Army, Washington, D.C.

1. Your attention is invited to the Unlocated case of Sergeant Wilbert E. Lyons, 1206233, Company I, 106th Infantry, reported Killed in Action September 27, 1918, per letter your office of January 12, 1925 (file QM 293. A.C-subject; Unlocated Dead), and it is recommended that Unknown U.S.Soldier U-2801, now buried in Grave 1, Block A, Row 3, Flanders Field American Cemetery, (originally carried as LYONS), be considered in connection therewith, with a view to identification.

2. Grave Location Blank for Lyons, Pvt.(later made U-2801) shows place of death as Namur, Belgium, date of burial October 28, 1918, place of burial; Communal Cemetery, Namur. Died while a Prisoner of War.

3. The records of this office also contain a letter dated Namur, May 26, 1920, addressed to the Supervisor, AGES, Area of Belgium, signed by a Madam Calembert who had charge of burials of American prisoners who died in Namur while the Germans occupied Belgium, concerning 5 American Prisoners of War interred in the Communal Cemetery at Namur, and reading in part as follows ;-

(Translated from the French) "American prisoners of war arrived in Namur only in 1918, and the first arrived in the latter part of September, coming from the front line where they had been working for the Germans.

The first one who died was STUBBS, Rose, 117th Infantry.

The second was BICHEN, Isidore, 106th Infantry.

The third was LYONS, the name of Lyons was erroneously written on the coffin by a German soldier, Lyons arrived at Namur, dying, not even being able to talk. He was from Company I, 106th Regiment of Infantry. His father was a shoemaker in Boston. He was buried October 28, 1918.

They all died of influenza.

The other two Americans, Dr. Anderson and Willy French, died after the Germans had evacuated Namur. They were taken care of as best as we could. They also died of influenza.

3. There is no body description or dental chart on file here for Sgt. Lyons and copies of G.R.S. Forms 16-A for U-2801 are forwarded herewith for comparison with data in Washington. Attention is invited to the difference in tooth-charts.
