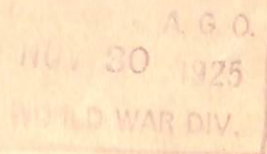

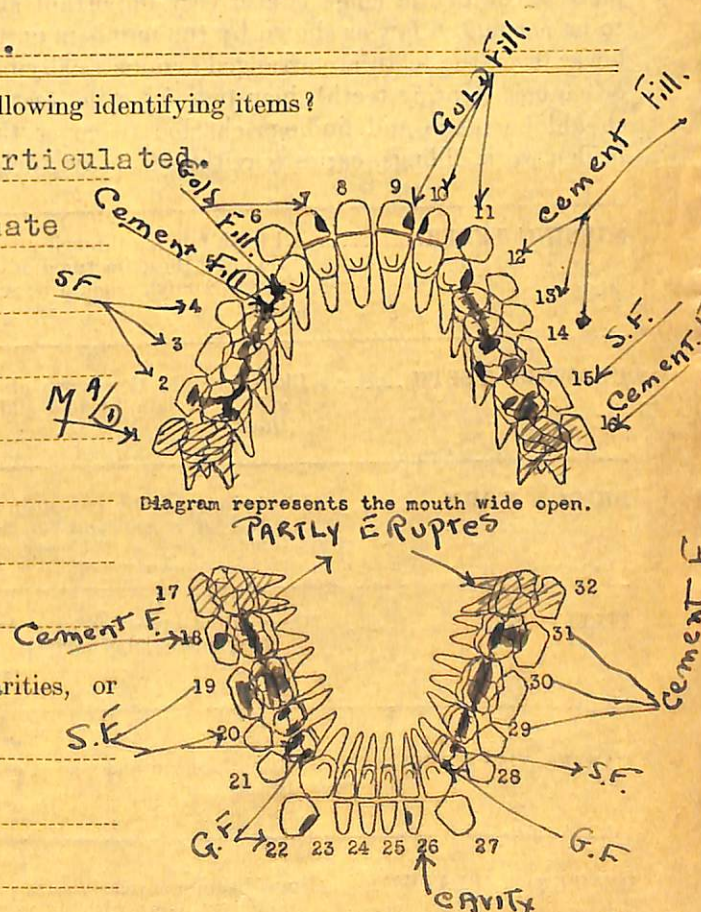

Enter information, as noted below, on reverse side of sheet in the *corresponding numbered space*. This form is supplemental to and is to be forwarded with G. R. S. Form 1-a, reporting reburial locations. To be used in answer to Question 26, Form 114, in case no means of identification on body.

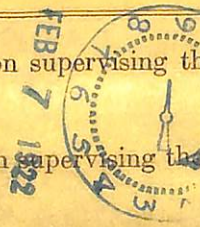



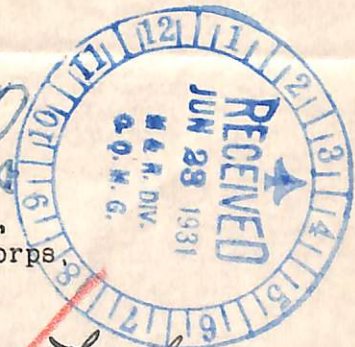

On October 14th, 1918 Company "M" attacked a german trench in front of Revillon near the Aisne River. Captain Miles the Company Commander was seriously injured and evacuated. Lieutenant ANGIER took command and led the company forward firing a chauchat rifle. He was hit near the trench attacked, when Sgt. Wall came to pick him up the Lieutenant said "I'm gone help those who you can help" He died almost immediately after.

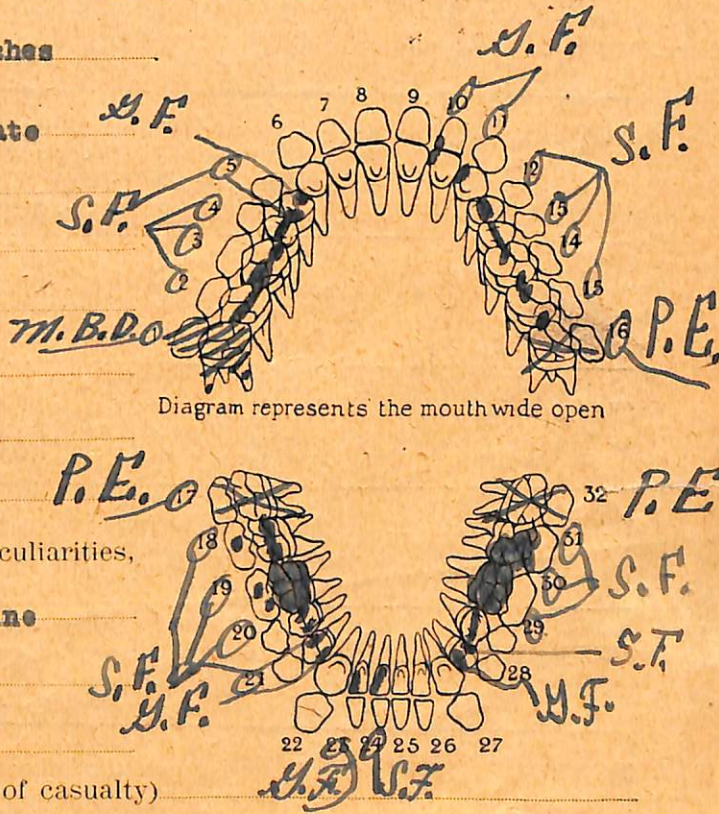



1. In further reply to your letter of February 4, 1921, referred to this office by our branch office at Hoboken, New Jersey, you are advised that the remains of your son, the late 1st Lieutenant Albert E. Angier, Company L, 308th Infantry, are now interred in grave #311, Section E, Plot #6, American Cemetery at Seringes-et-Nesles, Department of Aisne. In the event you go to France to visit the grave of the deceased, it is suggested that upon your arrival in Paris, you call at the office of the Chief, American Graves Registration Service, Q.M.C., in Europe, #8 Avenue d'Iena, where detailed information will be gladly furnished you concerning all matters pertaining to traveling in France and visiting the graves of our soldier dead. Particular pains have been taken to assure relatives visiting abroad every courtesy and attention possible.

2. The War Department regulations do not prevent the decoration of the graves of our soldier dead with wreaths and cut flowers and information to the contrary is erroneous. There are certain regulations adopted for the purpose of giving the cemetery a more presentable appearance, that is by not permitting unseemly monuments or other decorations which destroy symmetry and uniform monumentation. However, as stated in the preceding sentence, no regulations forbid the placing of fresh flowers and wreaths upon the graves of our soldier dead.

3. This office is in receipt of numerous letters of commendation regarding the care and attention given the graves of our heroic dead. It is believed that you will be able to contradict the erroneous impressions given in your letter after you have seen for yourself the actual conditions that exist in France with respect to the manner in which the department is handling these problems.

4. In order to facilitate securing your passport, there is enclosed herewith an executed form showing the purpose of your visit overseas.

Dear Sir:

Referring to the enclosed form which I have filled out, - G.R.S. Form No. 120, Identification mark; 608-70 Lae, - I beg to state that over a year ago I notified the Department that it was my desire that the remains of Lt. Albert E. Angier, 308th Infantry, be interred in France, and I am making the same request on the enclosed form.

(1) I would appreciate it very much if you would advise me as to the location of his remains at present, as I expect to go to France within the next six weeks.

There is one other matter that I would like information on if you can give it to me. If not, will you kindly refer me to the correct Department.

I understand, from what I consider very authentic sources that the Regulations of the War Dept. prohibit the decorating of the graves in any way and that they do not even permit friends to place wreaths or cut flowers on the graves. I cannot believe that this is so.

I can readily appreciate that permanent, planting or erection of monuments, curbing, or anything of that sort might reasonably be prohibited.

I would therefore like to receive a copy of the Regulations in regard to the question of decorating graves, and if there is any information you can give me as to the future policy of the Government as far as the acquisition and maintenance of permanent American Cemeteries in France, I would like to have it.

A number of friends of mine who have sons buried in France and have recently returned from there are very much disturbed in their minds as to these points and as one woman put it to me yesterday, - "The cold-blooded manner in which the War Department is handling this question, is not only cruel to the parents of these boys, but is a disgrace to the United States, - particularly the War Dept.

I realize the difficulties that the Government is working under and also that stories become exaggerated and if you can give me the exact facts, it will not only be helpful to me, but perhaps enable me to make some of these people feel easier in their minds.

1. In further reply to your letter of February 4, 1921, referred to this office by our branch office at Hoboken, New Jersey, you are advised that the remains of your son, the late 1st Lieutenant Albert E. Angier, Company L, 308th Infantry, are now interred in grave #311, Section E, Plot #6, American Cemetery at Seringes-et-Nesles, Department of Aisne. In the event you go to France to visit the grave of the deceased, it is suggested that upon your arrival in Paris, you call at the office of the Chief, American Graves Registration Service, Q.M.C., in Europe, #8 Avenue d'Iena, where detailed information will be gladly furnished you concerning all matters pertaining to traveling in France and visiting the graves of our soldier dead. Particular pains have been taken to assure relatives visiting abroad every courtesy and attention possible.

2. The War Department regulations do not prevent the decoration of the graves of our soldier dead with wreaths and cut flowers and information to the contrary is erroneous. There are certain regulations adopted for the purpose of giving the cemetery a more presentable appearance, that is by not permitting unseemly monuments or other decorations which destroy symmetry and uniform monumentation. However, as stated in the preceding sentence, no regulations forbid the placing of fresh flowers and wreaths upon the graves of our soldier dead.

3. This office is in receipt of numerous letters of commendation regarding the care and attention given the graves of our heroic dead. It is believed that you will be able to contradict the erroneous impressions given in your letter after you have seen for yourself the actual conditions that exist in France with respect to the manner in which the department is handling these problems.

4. In order to facilitate securing your passport, there is enclosed herewith an executed form showing the purpose of your visit overseas.

Referring to the enclosed form which I have filled out, -G.R.S. Form No 120, -Identification mark: 608-70 lae, -I beg to state that over a year ago I notified the Department that it was my desire that the remains of Lt. Albert E. Angier, 308th Infantry, be interred in France, and I am making the same request on the enclosed form.

I would appreciate it very much if you would advise me as to the location of his remains at present, as I expect to go to France within the next six weeks.

There is one other matter that I would like information on if you can give it to me. If not, will you kindly refer me to the correct Department.

I understand, from what I consider very authentic sources that the Regulations of the War Dept. prohibit the decorating of the graves in any way and that they do not even permit friends to place wreaths or cut flowers on the graves. I cannot believe that this is so.

I can readily appreciate that permanent planting or erection of monuments, curbing, or anything of that sort might reasonably be prohibited.

I would therefore like to receive a copy of the Regulations in regard to the question of decorating graves and if there is any information you can give me as to the future policy of the Government as far as the acquisition and maintenance of permanent American Cemeteries in France, I would like to have it.

A number of friends of mine who have sons buried in France and have recently returned from there are very much disturbed in their minds as to these points and as one woman put it to me yesterday, -"The cold-blooded manner in which the War Department is handling this question, is not only cruel to the parents of these boys, -but is a disgrace to the United States, -particularly the War Dept."

I realize the difficulties that the Government is working under and also that stories become exaggerated and if you can give me the exact facts, it will not only be helpful to me, but perhaps enable me to make some of these people feel easier in their minds.

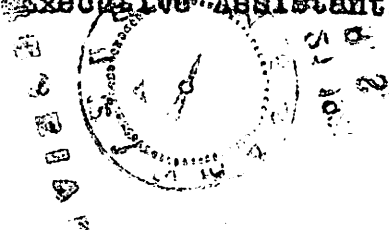

1. The records in the case of Albert E. Angier, 1st Lieutenant, Company L, 308th Infantry are returned herewith, it having been determined that the body shall remain permanently buried in France.

2. Copy of reply made by this office to letter of February 4th, 1921, from Mr. George M. Angier, is inclosed herewith, and it is recommended that Mr. Angier be fully informed in answer to other questions advanced in his letter of February 4th, not treated upon in letter from this office.

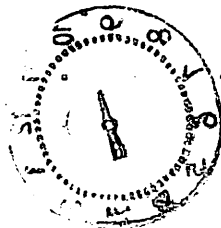
