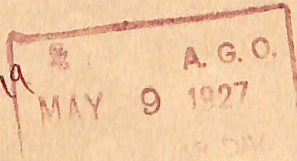

The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries Of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

In order to assure proper and satisfactory accommodations for the mothers and widows making the journey in 1933, reservations for steamship transportation must be made by this office several months in advance. It is requested that you answer the questions below by writing "Yes" or "No" or "Undecided" in the blank space following the question. Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of August 26, 1929, relative to the pilgrimage of the Gold Star Mothers and Widows to Europe.

In reply it is regretted to have to advise that Mrs. Armstrong is not eligible to make the pilgrimage to your son's grave in Aisne-Marne Cemetery in France in view of the fact that she has made a previous visit to his grave. It has been held that the obvious purpose of Section 2 (b) of the Act of March 2, 1929, is to exclude those who have previously visited the cemeteries described in Section 1 regardless of the fact that the body was buried in a temporary location or the work on the cemeteries had not been completed at the time of the visit.

With reference to your question as to whether a husband is eligible to accompany his wife on this pilgrimage at his own expense, you are informed that the Act of March 2, 1929, does not contain any provision for any member of the family to make the trip except the mother or unmarried widow, nor does it permit of the mother or widow being accompanied by any member of her family either at Government or personal expense.

The War Department has been charged with the execution of this Act and its efforts therefore must be restricted to making the arrangements necessary for the transportation, entertainment, etc. of those named as eligible under the Act.

Any arrangements which are desired to be made by relatives or friends of such eligibles to visit the Cemeteries in Europe must be made by them personally. The limited accommodations available in the small towns in the neighborhood of the Cemeteries in Europe, and the fact that it is contemplated that the War Department will utilize these accommodations to the limit for these mothers and widows

eligible under the above mentioned Act, make it necessary for those ineligible under the Act to make their own arrangements.

Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

In order to assure proper and satisfactory accommodations for the mothers and widows making the journey in 1933, reservations for steamship transportation must be made by this office several months in advance. It is requested that you answer the questions below by writing "Yes" or "No" or "Undecided" in the blank space following the question. When you have answered the question, sign your name and return this sheet in the enclosed addressed envelope which requires no postage. PLEASE DO NOT DELAY, as it is essential that the information be in this office promptly.

This letter is being sent to all eligible mothers and widows who did not make the pilgrimage during the years 1930, 1931 or 1932. There is enclosed a circular of information WHICH YOU SHOULD READ VERY CAREFULLY BEFORE MAKING YOUR DECISION.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of August 26, 1929, relative to the pilgrimage of the Gold Star Mothers and Widows to Europe.

In reply it is regretted to have to advise that Mrs. Armstrong is not eligible to make the pilgrimage to your son's grave in Aisne-Marne Cemetery in France in view of the fact that she has made a previous visit to his grave. It has been held that the obvious purpose of Section 2 (b) of the Act of March 2, 1929, is to exclude those who have previously visited the cemeteries described in Section 1 regardless of the fact that the body was buried in a temporary location or the work on the cemeteries had not been completed at the time of the visit.

With reference to your question as to whether a husband is eligible to accompany his wife on this pilgrimage at his own expense, you are informed that the Act of March 2, 1929, does not contain any provision for any member of the family to make the trip except the mother or unmarried widow, nor does it permit of the mother or widow being accompanied by any member of her family either at Government or personal expense.

The War Department has been charged with the execution of this Act and its efforts therefore must be restricted to making the arrangements necessary for the transportation, entertainment, etc. of those named as eligible under the Act.

Any arrangements which are desired to be made by relatives or friends of such eligibles to visit the Cemeteries in Europe must be made by them personally. The limited accommodations available in the small towns in the neighborhood of the Cemeteries in Europe, and the fact that it is contemplated that the War Department will utilize these accommodations to the limit for those mothers and widows

eligible under the above mentioned Act, make it necessary for those ineligible under the Act to make their own arrangements.

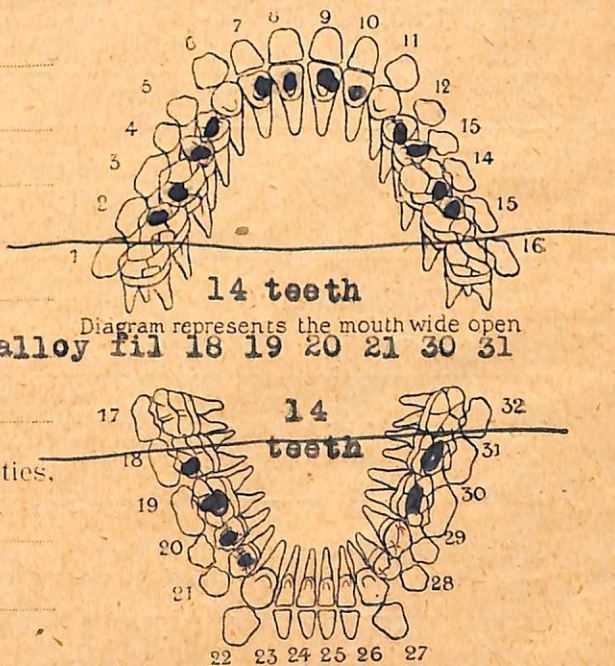

You are advised that the American Cemetery at Clermont Ferrand, Department of Puy-de-Dome, in which the remains of your son, the late 2nd Lieutenant Ralph Sheldon Armstrong, 7th Aviation Instruction Center, Signal Corps, are buried will not be maintained permanently and that when the return of the remains project is completed, all bodies remaining in such temporary burial places will be concentrated into the four permanent American Cemeteries established in France. In the case of your late son, his body would be removed finally to the Belleau Wood American Cemetery at Belleau, Department of the Aisne.

2. Owing to the fact that operations incident to the return of the American soldier dead from the American Cemetery at Clermont Ferrand have already commenced, should you desire these remains returned to this country it is not thought that such a transfer could be effected at the present time. In such event, it will not be until our Field Forces return to the cemetery at the time final concentration operations are commenced, that this body could be returned.

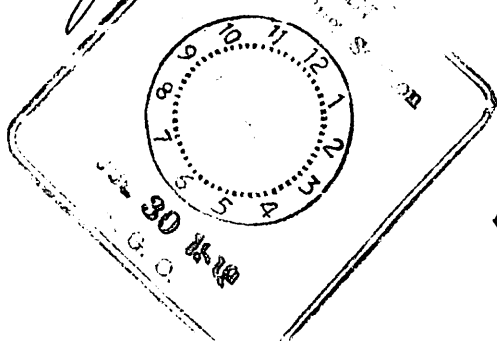
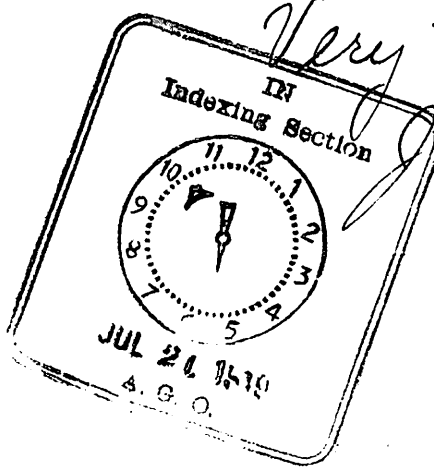
Your letters of March 20th and June 10th relative to the disposition of the remains of my son, the late Lieut. Ralph D Armstrong were both received.
