1. This office is in receipt of your letter of the 11th ultimo requesting to be advised if there will be anything put to mark the grave of your sister, Miss Florence L. Athay, Red Cross Nurse, who died November 12, 1918, and was buried in the Everton Cemetery at Liverpool, England.

2. In reply you are informed that under the regulations of the United States Graves Registration Service in Europe, it is not at present permitted to erect any permanent monument at the graves of members of the American Expeditionary Forces buried abroad, all such graves being temporarily marked with a cross or the regulation headboard such as is used in the national cemeteries in the United States. No other markers can be authorized until the final disposition of the dead has been made.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of May 6, 1929, furnishing information requested by this office relative to the Gold Star Mothers' and Widows' Pilgrimage to Europe authorized by the Act of Congress approved March 2, 1929.

It is noted you request the privilege of making the pilgrimage to your sister's grave under the provisions of Section 4 (a) of the Act which states in part "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces". In determining who is meant by the phrase "who stood in loco parentis", this phrase has been given its usually accepted legal meaning and it has been held that:

- (a) A person cannot stand in loco parentis to an adult who is not incapacitated either mentally or physically.
- (b) In order for a woman to occupy such a status towards a minor or incapacitated adult, she must act the part of a lawful father of such person in performing the duty of providing for him, intending thereby to take the place of the father in this particular.
- (c) In order to receive the benefits of the Act in question, she must have occupied the status toward a particular deceased member of the military or naval forces "for the year prior to the commencement of his service in such forces".

The records indicate that the late Nurse Florence L. Athay was 40 years of age when she was appointed for service during the World War. As there is a positive showing that the nurse in question was not incapacitated either mentally or physically at the time of her entry into the military service and that she was more than 18 years of age when she was appointed, it is not possible for you to have stood in loco parentis to her within the meaning of the Act, for the year immediately preceding the commencement of her service in the Army. It is therefore regretted to advise that you are ineligible to make the pilgrimage. at government expense.



Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of May 6, 1929, furnishing information requested by this office relative to the Gold Star Mothers' and Widows' Pilgrimage to Europe authorized by the Act of Congress approved March 2, 1929.

It is noted you request the privilege of making the pilgrimage to your sister's grave under the provisions of Section 4 (a) of the Act which states in part "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces". In determining who is meant by the phrase "who stood in loco parentis", this phrase has been given its usually accepted legal meaning and it has been held that:

- (a) A person cannot stand in loco parentis to an adult who is not incapacitated either mentally or physically.
- (b) In order for a woman to occupy such a status towards a minor or incapacitated adult, she must act the part of a lawful father of such person in performing the duty of providing for him, intending thereby to take the place of the father in this particular.
- (c) In order to receive the benefits of the Act in question, she must have occupied the status toward a particular deceased member of the military or naval forces "for the year prior to the commencement of his service in such forces".

The records indicate that the late Nurse Florence L. Athay was 40 years of age when she was appointed for service during the World War. As there is a positive showing that the nurse in question was not incapacitated either mentally or physically at the time of her entry into the military service and that she was more than 18 years of age when she was appointed, it is not possible for you to have stood in loco parentis to her within the meaning of the Act, for the year immediately preceding the commencement of her service in the Army. It is therefore regretted to advise that you are ineligible to make the pilgrimage, at government expense.





Diagram represents the mouth wide open


