





If you have any friend that you would like to be quartered with we will endeavor to arrange it if you will communicate with this office.

The ocean voyage will last about 8 days and when the ship docks at Cherbourg, France, each party will be met by officers especially detailed for the purpose and taken in a special train to Paris where The first day in first class hotel accommodations have been reserved. Paris will be a day of rost. The entire duration of your stay in Europe will be 14 days; and the itineraries have been so arranged that each day will be provided for. Except in case of illness or other unavoidable cause it will not be possible for any woman making the pilgrimage to remain in Europe for a longer period than 14 days nor to leave the party with which she is travelling unless she is prepared to pay all of her expenses after leaving the party since the Act of Congress authorizing the pilgrimage specifically states that the government shall not pay the expenses of any woman who willfully leaves her party.

Upon return to the United States each ship will be met in New York City by army officers who will escort the mothers and widows to the trains which will take them home. Laundry service can be obtained in New York and Paris. Since the climate of Europe is much colder than that of the United States, each woman should provide herself with sufficient warm clothing to stand the motor bus trip and the visit to the cemeteries.

There is on file a request made by you to the effect that you desired the remains of this soldier returned to this country for private interment. As some time has elapsed since you made the request, this letter is to inquire as to whether it is still your wish that this action be taken. Should it still be your desire that the remains be returned, this office will be unable to state definitely at this time as to when the particular case of your husband will be reached, as the Army Transport Service between this country and Europe has been discontinued and shipments will now have to be made by commercial or mayal vessels at such times as can be arranged for.

In the event it is not now your wish that the return of the remains be effected, they will be buried in one of the permanent American Gemeteries in Europe, where you are assured perpetual care of the grave by this Government.

While it is not the policy of the Department to attempt to influence relatives in their decision, it is always gratified to receive their consent toleaving the graves of their soldier dead in its care. 
