The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries Of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

In order to assure proper and satisfactory accommodations for the mothers and widows making the journey in 1933, reservations for steamship transportation must be made by this office several months in advance. Dear Madam:

Reference is made to correspondence forwarded you from this office relative to a pilgrimage to the grave of your son, the late Private Printer B. Arnold.

It is noted you previously stated you desired to have your son accompany you should you make a pilgrimage. While it is regretted to advise that under the law governing the pilgrimage the Government can make no arrangements for or bear any part of the expense of relatives or friends accompanying pilgrims on their journey, it is possible for your son to arrange to accompany you at personal expense and be with you for the greater part of the trip, that is, on the trains to and from New York, at the hotels in New York and Paris, on the steamer both going and returning and on the train between Cherbourg and Paris. However, sightseeing trips in and around Paris, and transportation between Paris and the cemeteries are accomplished by busses which are chartered by the Government for official use only, and this office therefore could not authorize your son's transportation in these busses.

If your son desires to accompany you at personal expense under the above conditions, he should immediately communicate with the Roosevelt Steamship Company, #1 Broadway, New York City, for reservation for the ocean voyage between New York and France, advising them the name of the steamship on which you are to sail, the date of sailing and your name. The steamship company will furnish full information as to the cost of ocean transportation. On receipt of definite advice from you that your son is accompanying you, this office will advise the Officers in Charge of the Pilgrimage in New York and Paris.

The American Express Company, #11 rue Scribe, Paris, France, is in close touch with the pilgrimage office in Paris, and is prepared to arrange itineraries that will parallel those of the pilgrimage, and your son should communicate with them for arrangements as to transportation in Paris and to and from the cemeteries, and for hotel accommodations in the town near the cemetery.

Should you desire to make the pilgrimage this summer, arrangements can be made for you to sail June 28th on the LEVIATHAN or August 17th on the PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT, provided you so notify this office 60 days prior to the date on which you wish to sail.

While no information can be given as to cost of transportation to Europe, experience has shown that accommodations in Europe average \$10 per day per person. The mothers and widows sailing June 28th and August 17th will remain in Europe 16 days, so that your son should be provided with funds accordingly. He should also be prepared for a two or three day stay in New York.

It is believed, however, that you should feel no hesitancy in making the pilgrimage unaccompanied by some member of your family, as competent personnel to care for the comfort and needs of the mothers and widows will be provided, and doctors and nurses will be available. During the past two years many mothers in poor health and of advanced age made the pilgrimage and appeared to have benefited by the sea air and the excellent care they received. Should you make a pilgrimage you are assured that not only will all necessary expenses be borne by the Government, but everything possible will be provided for your comfort and welfare.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of January 20, 1930, with which you enclose questionnaire, properly filled out, relative to making the pilgrimage to the cemeteries in Europe under the provisions of the Act of Congress of March 2, 1929.

In connection with your inquiry as to whether special transportation rates may be obtained for your son whom you wish to have accompany you as your escort, you are advised that the above mentioned Act contains the stipulation that "No mother or widow shall be entitled, by reason of any payment made by or for her, to be furnished by the Government with transportation, accommodations, meals, and other necessities pertaining thereto different in kind from those prescribed by the Secretary of War for the pilgrimage of the particular group". To carry out this mandate of Congress, reservations have been made on commercial liners and in hotels in Europe and these reservations take most of the cabin class accommodations aboard steamships and practically all available space in the hotels in Europe outside of Paris. Motor bus transportation has also been arranged to transport the women who make the pilgrimage from Paris to the cemeteries and return. In view of the limited accommodations which are available, it is impracticable to accommodate relatives or friends who desire to accompany women making the pilgrimage in the same staterooms aboard ship or in the same hotels outside of Paris, since the reservations already made will be required for the use of the women who are authorized to make the pilgrimage.

It is of course possible for relatives and friends to secure accommodations on the same steamship and arrange for accommodations in Europe, and if this is desired you should take the matter up direct with the steamship company when you are notified of the ship upon which passage for you has been engaged.

The plans for the conduct of the pilgrimages have been prepared by the Quartermaster General and provide for every care needed by the mothers and widows from the time they leave home until they return thereto. The War Department has no information on file as to the probable cost of the journey or whether reduced rates will be offered.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of January 20, 1930, with which you enclose questionnaire, properly filled out, relative to making the pilgrimage to the cemeteries in Europe under the provisions of the Act of Congress of March 2, 1929. *See last letter*

In connection with your inquiry as to whether special transportation rates may be obtained for your son whom you wish to have accompany you as your escort, you are advised that the above mentioned Act contains the stipulation that "No mother or widow shall be entitled, by reason of any payment made by or for her, to be furnished by the Government with transportation, accommodations, meals, and other necessities pertaining thereto different in kind from those prescribed by the Secretary of War for the pilgrimage of the particular group". To carry out this mandate of Congress, reservations have been made on commercial liners and in hotels in Europe and these reservations take most of the cabin class accommodations aboard steamships and practically all available space in the hotels in Europe outside of Paris. Motor bus transportation has also been arranged to transport the women who make the pilgrimage from Paris to the cemeteries and return. In view of the limited accommodations which are available, it is impracticable to accommodate relatives or friends who desire to accompany women making the pilgrimage in the same staterooms aboard ship or in the same hotels outside of Paris, since the reservations already made will be required for the use of the women who are authorized to make the pilgrimage.

It is of course possible for relatives and friends to secure accommodations on the same steamship and arrange for accommodations in Europe, and if this is desired you should take the matter up direct with the steamship company when you are notified of the ship upon which passage for you has been engaged.

The plans for the conduct of the pilgrimages have been prepared by the Quartermaster General and provide for every care needed by the mothers and widows from the time they leave home until they return thereto. The War Department has no information on file as to the probable cost of the journey or whether reduced rates will be offered.

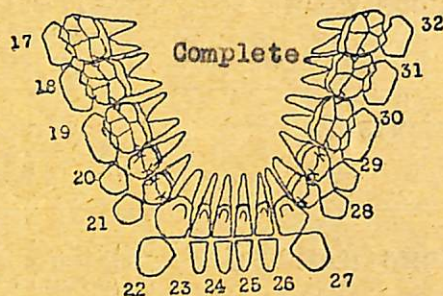
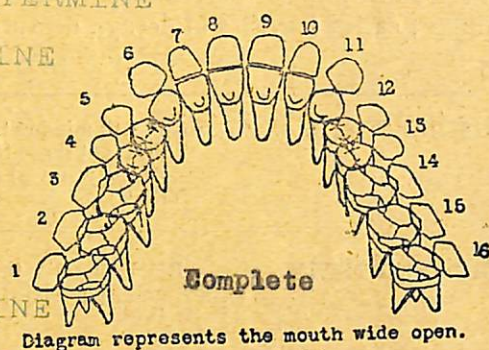

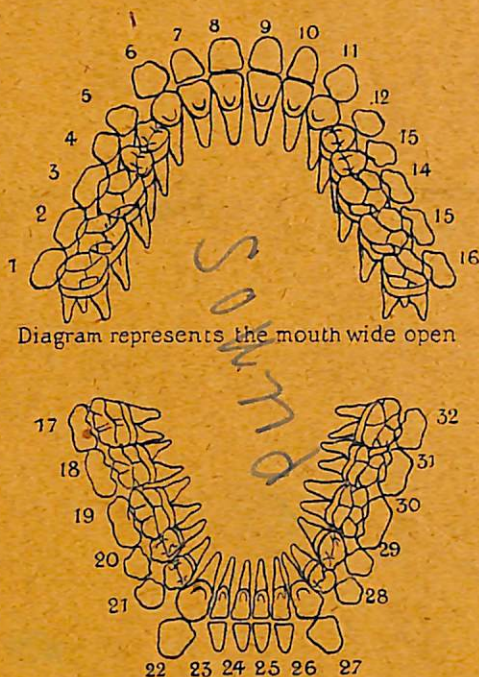
