Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries of Europe for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces. The purpose of the Act is an endeavor to bring a measure of peace and comfort to the hearts of the mothers and widows whose loved ones made the supreme sacrifice, and it appears from communications from women who have made the journey that this effort has not been in vain.

As the stepmother of the late Private Josephirnone, you are eligible to make a pilgrimage to his grave in the Mease-Argonne American Cemetery in France. All necessary expenses of the pilgrimage will be borne by the Government and personnel to care for your comfort and needs will be provided. In other words, you will be the honored guest of the United States Government.

Reference is made to correspondence between you and this office relative to the pilgrimage authorized by Congress in the Act approved March 2, 1929.

Under a decision rendered subsequent to letter addressed to you by this effice under date of August 12, 1930, it has been held that although it is the generally accepted rule of law in the United States that relationship by affinity ceases with the dissolution of the marriage, by either divorce or death, which created it, it appears evident that Congress in defining the term "mother" as used in the Act, intended to provide for such cases as yours, in which the intimate relationship existing between you and Private John Arnone was that of mother and son.

In view of the foregoing, your name has been placed upon the list of mothers and widows who are eligible to make the pilgrimage during the summer of 1931, and it will not be necessary for you to furnish the affidavits as requested in office letter of September 15, 1930. It is requested that you fill in the enclosed blank form and return it to this office so that your desires may be properly recorded and arrangements made for you accordingly.

Dear Madam: This letter is in further reference to correspondence from this office relative to your eligibility to make a pilgrimage to the cometeries of Europe, authorized by the Act of March 2, 1929 as amended May 15, 1930. As stated in office letter of August 12, 1930 you are not eligible as a stepmother to make the pilgrimage to the grave of the late Private John Arnone. The only provision of the Act under which you might qualify for the privilege of making the pilgrimage, is contained in Section 4 (a) which was amended May 15, 1930 to read in part as follows: "--or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces for a period of not less than five years at any time prior to the soldier, sailor or marine becoming 18 years of age." In order to satisfy legal requirements it will be necessary for you to furnish as proof of your relationship, in loco parentis, the affidavits of at least two persons not related to you. In the event you consider yourself eligible, under the law, to make the pilgrimage, it is requested that the inclosed form be completed and returned to this office in order that your sligibility may be determined. Under paragraphs 1 (c) and 1 (d), sufficient information should be included to permit an intelligible decision as to eligibility. For The Quartermaster General.

Receipt is acknowledged of form letter of this office sent you under date of August 2, 1930, completed and returned by you, relative to the pilgrimage authorized by Congress in the Act approved March 2, 1929.

A stepmother, in order to qualify as eligible to make the above pilgrimage, must show that she was married to the father of the deceased veteran, whose grave she is desirous of visiting, at the time of the latter's entrance into the military or naval service of the United States and at the time of his death.

In view of the fact that the father of the late Private John Arnone died in 1913, approximately five years before
the death of his son while serving with the American forces,
your case is not covered by the provisions of the above Act.
Under the circumstances, therefore, it will not be possible
for the War Department to make any arrangements for you to visit
the grave of the late Private Arnone in the Meuse-Argonne Cemetery, France, at the expense of the Government.

The only provision of the Act under which you might qualify for the privilege of making the pilgrimage, is contained in Section 4 (a) which was amended May 15, 1930 to read in part as follows: "--or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces for a period of not less than five years at any time prior to the soldier, sailor or marine becoming 18 years of age."

In order to satisfy legal requirements it will be necessary for you to furnish as proof of your relationship, in loce parentis, the affidavits of at least two persons not related to you.

This letter, which contains general information regarding the pilgrimage to the cemeteries of Europe, is being sent to each mother and widow who has expressed a desire to make the pilgrimage during the calendar year 1930. The general plan for the conduct of the pilgrimage is shown in the Pilgrimage Regulations, a copy of which is enclosed herewith. In addition to the information shown in the regulations, the following explains in detail some of the most important things connected with the pilgrimage.

Formal invitations are being extended to each mother and widow who has expressed a desire to make the pilgrimage during 1930. In so far as practicable, these invitations are being extended with a view to keeping the women from each state together and the order in which the invitations to the women from the several states are issued is based on a drawing by lot which was held about one month ago. Inclosed with each invitation is a card for acknowledgment and it is quite important that you accept or decline this invitation promptly in order that the necessary railroad, steamship and hotel reservations may be arranged. The government will defray all the necessary expenses of the pilgrimage, including railroad fare, hotel accommodations, steamship fare and all other incidental expenses. It will not provide anything other than the necessary expenses so that you should bring with you such funds as you may desire to use for making small purchases and for other uses distinctand political to the state of the second of ly of a personal nature

Arrangements have been made with the American Railroad
Association which assures us the united support and cooperation of all of
the railroads in the United States in handling the movement to and from
New York City. The local ticket agent will secure your railroad and
sleeper ticket and will make the necessary pullman reservations. Refore
your departure from your home we will mail you a check, sufficient to
pay for your meals and other travelling expenses while enroute to New
York, Your railroad ticket will provide for a round trip from your home
to New York and upon arrival in New York the army officer in charge of
the New York office will collect the return trip stub and hold it until
your return to New York from Europe.

Upon arrival in New York, you will be met by an army officer

and escorted to a first class hotel where reservations have been made. The duration of your stay in New York will be from 24 to 48 hours. At the proper time, you will be escorted to the steamship upon which passage has been engaged for Europe. All of the women making this trip will be provided with cabin class accommodations aboard steamers which means that from two to four will be quartered in the same stateroom. If you have any friend that you would like to be quartered with we will ondeavor to arrange it if you will communicate with this office.

The ocean voyage will last about 8 days and when the ship docks at Cherbourg, France, each party will be met by officers especially detailed for the purpose and taken in a special train to Paris where first class hotel accommodations have been reserved. The first day in Paris will be a day of rest. On the 2d day, the women of each party will place a wreath on the tomb of the French unknown soldier. afternoon there will be a reception in which the French war mothers, government officials, and prominent sivilians will participate. following morning the groups going to the different cometeries will leave Paris, travelling in motor busses, and proceed to the cemeteries where they will remain for about 7 days. Twenty-five women will be assigned to each bus and an army officer will have charge of the bus. itineraries to and from the cometeries and the faily itineraries while at the cemeteries have been varied so as to take in points of historical interest as well as some parts of the battlefields where American troops were engaged. Upon return to Paris, each party will remain for about 5 days and during this time an opportunity will be given to see the points of historical interest in Paris and vicinity. The ontire duration of your stay in Europe will be 14 days, and the itineraries have been so arranged that each day will be provided for. Except in case of illness or other unavoidable cause it will not be possible for any woman making the pilgrimage to remain in Europe for a longer period than 14 days nor to leave the party with which she is travelling unless she is prepared to pay all of her expenses after leaving the party since the Act of Congress authorizing the pilgrimage specifically states that the government shall not pay the expenses of any woman who willfully leaves her party.

Upon return to the United States each ship will be met in New. York City by army officers who will escort the mothers and widows to the trains which will take them home. Before leaving New York each woman will be provided with her return railroad ticket, a sleeping car ticket and funds to cover the cost of meals and other travelling expenses.

Army officers are being used as guides and escorts throughout this entire movement and care has been taken to select officers who will see that proper care is taken of the women who are entrusted to their charge. Arrangements have been made for taking care of women who may be taken sick during the pilgrimage and also to care for the remains of any who may die and provision has been made for returning the remains of any who may die to their homes. It is essential that each woman making the pilgrimage furnish The Quartermaster General with an emergency address of some relative or friend to be notified in the event of an emergency. Medical care will be provided by civilian agencies. If such care is needed in New York City it will be furnished by the hotal physicians or

by local hospitals. Aboard ship, medical care will be provided by the ship's doctors and in Paris arrangements have been made with the American Hospital for the hospitalization and treatment of any women who may need it. In addition to this, six doctors of the regular army will be on duty throughout the pilgrimage.

Baggage will be limited to not to exceed two pieces of hand baggage and the articles taken should be such as will be required for a trip of about one month. Laundry service can be obtained in New York and Paris. Since the climate of Europe is much colder than that of the United States, each woman should provide herself with sufficient warm clothing to stand the motor bus trip and the visit to the cemeteries.

Since it is necessary for this office to make all reservations for your accommodations throughout this pilgrimage, it will be greatly appreciated if you will make prompt reply to any communications received from this office.

The remains of the above mentioned deceased soldier were, this date, recovered from an isolated grave with Unknown U.S.Soldier No.U-4110, 2/3 up the western end of the southern slope of Cote 240, Cmme. deExerment (Ardennes) Map Foret d'Argonne 1/20000 East-300.003 North-281.728.

As shown in attached letter, dated June 12, 1919 - Subject: Burial irregularities—the re-check cross with two identification tags attached was found by the concentration party in 1919, but remains could not be found thereunder. Tags were removed from this cross and forwarded to the Chief, AGRS., AEF. This same cross with a GRS plate attached reading, "GRS John Arnone 3199259 USA" and with First Division insignia painted on the upright was found lying partially covered by debris at the foot of what proved to be the common grave of these deceased soldiers a week ago. Inasmuch as at this exact spot it appeared impossible for a grave to exist and the excavations made struck a hard strata of rock that had never been dislodged since its formation, physical search was advanced and the body of a deceased American soldier was encountered some five meters away whom it was supposed was in reality Pvt. John Arnone on account of collar ornament? 18 crossed rifles E' and the proximity to the cross. An identification card found in pocket, however, identified this body as that of Pvt.1/c Harry T.Keefe, Co. E, 18th Infantry.

Regardless of superficial appearances, laborers were placed at short intervals around the spot the cross was found and the shoes of one of the bodies were struck almost immediately by one of them, but a few feet from former excavations.

The two bodies had been buried on a shelf or level place on this very steep hill side, made, no doubt, from an enlarged individual trench. Bodies were on their right sides with hands clasped over breasts, heads toward the east, and closely

against each other, the body of Pvt. Agnone being the northern or most uphill and therefore in the deepest part of the excavation was covered by about 2 feet of soil, whereas Unknown U.S.Soldier No.U-4110 was covered only to the depth of a foot.

The only possible means of identification found on the remains of Pvt. Armone was a brier pipe with the initials 'J A' carved in the bowl, which under the circumstances would appear to be sufficient.
