Dear Madam:

The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries Of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

In order to assure proper and satisfactory accommodations for the mothers and widows making the journey in 1933, reservations for steamship transportation must be made by this office several months in advance. It is requested that you answer the questions below by writing "Yes" or "No" or "Undecided" in the blank space following the question. When you have answered the question, sign your name and return this sheet in the enclosed addressed envelope which requires no postage. PLEASE DO NOT DELAY, as it is essential that the information be in this office promptly.

Dear Sir:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of February 3rd, requesting information concerning the pilgrimage of mothers and widows to the cemeteries of Europe.

Plans provide that the pilgrimages will be made in groups according to the State from which the mother or widow comes and the cemetery to be visited. Mothers and widows from Missouri who are to visit the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery, where the remains of the late Private first class Hubert Bagby are interred, are scheduled to sail August 17th on the PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT. Accordingly, your mother-in-law, Mrs. Emma Bagby, has been invited to make the journey at that time.

All expenses of the pilgrimage, including meals, tips, transportation by water, rail, taxi and bus, as well as incidental expenses, such as laundry, are borne by the Government. Mothers and widows making the journey will need money only for the purchase of articles of a personal nature, such as souvenirs.

With reference to your desire to have your wife accompany her mother, on the pilgrimage, it is regretted to advise that under the law governing the pilgrimage the Government can bear no part of the expense of relatives or friends accompanying pilgrims, nor can it make any arrangements for them.

It is possible, however, for Mrs. Paynter to arrange to accompany Mrs. Bagby and be with her for the greater part of the pilgrimage, that is, on the trains to and from New York, at the hotels in New York and Paris, on the steamer both going and returning and on the train between Cherbourg and Paris, and Paris and Cherbourg. All of this, of course, at personal expense.

Sightseeing trips in and around Paris, and transportation between Paris and the cemeteries are accomplished by buses which are chartered by the Government for official use only, and this office therefore could not authorize your wife's transportation in these buses.

If Mrs. Paynter desires to accompany Mrs. Bagby at personal expense under the above conditions, she should immediately communicate with the Roosevelt

Steamship Company, #1 Broadway, New York City, for reservation for the ocean voyage between New York and France, advising them the name of the steamship on which Mrs. Bagby is to sail, the date of sailing, and the name of the pilgrim whom she is accompanying. The steamship company will furnish full information as to cost of ocean transportation. On receipt of definite advice from you that Mrs. Paynter is accompanying her mother, this office will advise the Officers in Charge of the Pilgrimage in New York and Paris, and if Mrs. Paynter desires she will be placed in the same room with her mother at the hotels and on the steamers, provided the same class of transportation and hotel accommodations are secured.

The American Express Company, #11 rue Scribe, Paris, France, is in close touch with the pilgrimage office in Paris, and is prepared to arrange itineraries that will parallel those of the pilgrimage and your wife should communicate with them for arrangements as to transportation in Paris and to and from the cemeteries, and for hotel accommodations in the town near the cemetery.

The cost of steamship transportation to and from Europe with the pilgrims will be from \$400 up, and experience has shown that expenses in Europe average \$10 per day per person. The group of mothers and widows sailing August 17th will remain in Europe 16 days, so that funds for Mrs. Paynter should be provided accordingly. Funds should also be provided for a two or three day stay in New York.

It is believed that Mrs. Bagby would experience no difficulty in making the pilgrimage alone, as properly qualified personnel will be provided to care for the comfort and needs of the mothers and widows making the trip, and doctors and nurses will be available from the time of arrival in New York City until return thereto. Arrangements have been made with the railroad companies that special attention be given pilgrims enroute to New York. You are assured that everything possible for Mrs. Bagby's comfort and welfare will be provided.





On receipt of definite advice from you that Mrs. Paynter is accompanying her mother, this office will advise the Officers in Charge of the Pilgrimage in New York and Paris, and if Mrs. Paynter desires she will be placed in the same room with her mother at the hotels and on the steamers, provided the same class of transportation and hotel accommodations are secured.

The American Express Company, #11 rue Scribe, Paris, France, is in close touch with the pilgrimage office in Paris, and is prepared to arrange itineraries that will parallel those of the pilgrimage and your wife should communicate with them for arrangements as to transportation in Paris and to and from the cemeteries, and for hotel accommodations in the town near the cemetery.

The cost of steamship transportation to and from Europe with the pilgrims will be from \$400 up, and experience has shown that expenses in Europe average \$10 per day per person. The group of mothers and widows sailing August 17th will remain in Europe 16 days, so that funds for Mrs. Paynter should be provided accordingly. Funds should also be provided for a two or three day stay in New York.

It is believed that Mrs. Bagby would experience no difficulty in making the pilgrimage alone, as properly qualified personnel will be provided to care for the comfort and needs of the mothers and widows making the trip, and doctors and nurses will be available from the time of arrival in New York City until return thereto. Arrangements have been made with the railroad companies that special attention be given pilgrims enroute to New York. You are assured that everything possible for Mrs. Bagby's comfort and welfare will be provided.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of February 3rd, requesting information concerning the pilgrimage of mothers and widows to the cemeteries of Europe.

Plans provide that the pilgrimages will be made in groups according to the State from which the mother or widow comes and the cemetery to be visited. Mothers and widows from Missouri who are to visit the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery, where the remains of the late Private first class Hubert Bagby are interred, are scheduled to sail August 17th on the PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT. Accordingly, your mother-in-law, Mrs. Emma Bagby, has been invited to make the journey at that time.

All expenses of the pilgrimage, including meals, tips, transportation by water, rail, taxi and bus, as well as incidental expenses, such as laundry, are borne by the Government. Mothers and widows making the journey will need money only for the purchase of articles of a personal nature, such as souvenirs.

With reference to your desire to have your wife accompany her mother, on the pilgrimage, it is regretted to advise that under the law governing the pilgrimage the Government can bear no part of the expense of relatives or friends accompanying pilgrims, nor can it make any arrangements for them.

It is possible, however, for Mrs. Paynter to arrange to accompany Mrs. Bagby and be with her for the greater part of the pilgrimage, that is, on the trains to and from New York, at the hotels in New York and Paris, on the steamer both going and returning and on the train between Cherbourg and Paris, and Paris and Cherbourg. All of this, of course, at personal expense.

Sightseeing trips in and around Paris, and transportation between Paris and the cemeteries are accomplished by buses which are chartered by the Government for official use only, and this office therefore could not authorize your wife's transportation in these buses.

If Mrs. Paynter desires to accompany Mrs. Bagby at personal expense under the above conditions, she should immediately communicate with the Roosevelt





Diagram represents the mouth wide open




