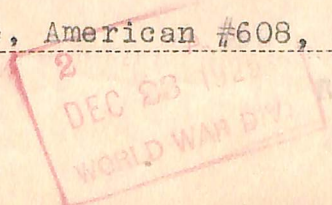

1. Arrived at Le Havre, France, July 2, on the SS American Banker. Debarked and entrained by 10:50 AM and the train arrived at the Gare des Invalides at 2:32 PM. The party went to the Hotel Splendid where they stayed for the night.
2. Monday, July 3, the morning was taken up with conferences with the Conducting Officers. In the afternoon she went to the ceremony at the Arc de Triomphe and to the tea at the Resturant Laurent.
3. Tuesday, July 4, the morning was free, lunched at teh hotel and left Paris in the afternoon for Meaux and Soissons.
4. Wednesday, July 5, lunched at the oemetary and spent the night at Soissons.
5. Thursday, July 6, visitedthe oemetary, lunched at Chateau Thierry, visited the A.M.oemetary and went back to Soissons for the night.
6. Friday, July 7, she lunched at Reims and returned to Soissons for the night.
7. Saturday, July 8, she lunched at Soissons, visited the oemetary and returned to Soissons for the night.
8. Sunday, July 9, the pilgrim visited Pierrefonds, lunched at Compiagne, visited Chantilly, and returned to Paris for the night.
9. Monday, July 10, the morning was free, lunched at the hotel and visited Napoleon's Tomb in the afternoon.
10. Tuesday, July 11, she went shopping in the morning, lunched at the hotel, and went to Versailles in the afternoon.
11. Wednesday, July 12, she went to Cluny in the morning, lunched at the hotel and visited Saore Coeur in the afternoon.
12. Thursday, July 13, she visited the Louvre in the morning, lunched in the Bois, and went on a night sightseeing trip.
13. Friday, July 14, the morning was free, lunch at the hotel, and the pilgrim went to the Lafayette Escadrille in the afternoon.
14. Saturday, July 15, she visited Notre Dame in the morning, lunched at the hotel and entrained for Le Havre that afternoon. She sailed on the SS American Farmer which left Le Havre at 8:00 PM that day.

Upon your arrival in New York City you will be met at the railroad station by an Army Officer who will engage porter service to take care of your baggage and escort you to the hotel. During your sojourn here before sailing for Europe and upon your return from Europe, you will stop at the Y.W.C.A., 175 West 137th Street, New York City.

The two tags and four identification pasters accompanying this communication are intended to protect your baggage while in transit. One tag should be attached to the handle of each piece of your baggage and a paster placed on each end of each piece of your baggage before leaving your home. Your baggage will be safer and also more readily available to you after your arrival in New York if it is placed with you on the train.

All mail intended to reach you between June 23rd, 1933, the day you sail from the United States, and July 15th, 1933, the day you leave Europe, should be addressed to you in care of American Pilgrimage, 20 Rue Molitor, Paris (16), France; for example:

The party you are to travel with will be disbanded in New York City on the day following your return from Europe and all arrangements for your Pullman accommodations will be made with the railroads in advance by this office. This will require you to remain in New York at the hotel over night as a guest of the United States Government.

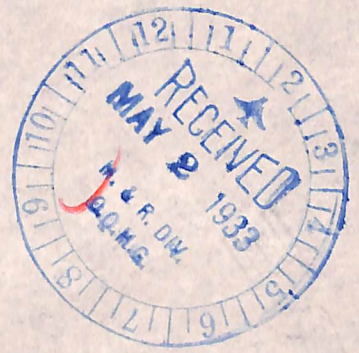

It is noted you state on your application that you desire to visit England, Germany, Italy, Switzerland and France, and intend to return to the United States within twelve months. It is regretted to advise that the Act of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizing the pilgrimage, provides specifically that the Government shall not pay the expenses of any mother or widow for a longer period than two weeks in Europe, nor shall the Government be responsible for the expenses of any woman who leaves her party. This provision makes it necessary that you return to the United States with the party to which you are assigned unless you desire to pay your own expenses thereafter, including your return steamship and railroad fare home.

As the grave of your brother is in the Oise Aisne American Cemetery, you will spend two weeks in France. You will visit Paris for several days during which time you will be given an opportunity to see some of the many points of historical interest in Paris and the vicinity. About six days will be spent on the way to and at the cemetery.

If you desire to visit all of the countries mentioned by you in your application, it will also be necessary for you to make an application for a regular passport the cost of which (\$10.00) must be paid by you.

Please advise immediately whether or not you desire to remain in Europe longer than two weeks, paying all of your expenses after you leave your party.

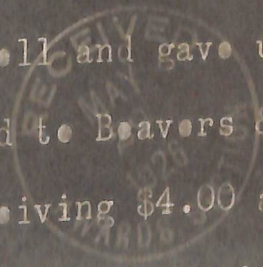

That the same three persons remained on Ben Floyds place until crops were harvested in the Fall, then moved near Big Sandy on Steve Sharps farm where affiant worked for said Steve Sharp by the day receiving Fifty cents a day, also did washing and chores for the white people in the neighborhood, who paid me well and gave us things to eat and wear. Remained there for two years and moved to Beavers & Conleys saw mill where affiant worked at a boarding house receiving \$4.00 a week, also did washing, ironing etc which brought in more pay. Claimant married there and moved within two miles west of Gilmer, where she now lives. During these years affiant took care of and supported these two until Lonnie got large enough to help make a living which he did until



he was inducted into the Military Service in World war on April 2nd 1918  
3rd. That Lonnie Barber helped make a living while at saw mill and after  
wards on the farm, near Gilmer. That said Lonnie Barber remained with  
claimant from two years of age until he went to army continuously and  
as he grew older worked with claimant, and claimant furnished him a

On this the 28th Day of June 1926 personally appeared before me, Lee Hagler, a credible person, who after being by me duly sworn on her oath deposes and say that she is the sister of Lennie Barber deceased A-3,647,219, who was inducted into the military Service of U.S. on the 2nd Day of April 1918 from Gilmer Texas and went to Camp Travis and in about six weeks thereafter the Veteran wrote a letter stating he had made an allotment of part of his wages, which she would receive in due time; but about this time the Government discovered that he had a living wife, Pecolia Barber, who imparted this information to the Government.

On this information the Allotments were not sent to either affiant, or Pecolia Barber, and have not been until this date.

Affiant further says, that when Lennie Barber, her brother was inducted into the Military Service he was living with affiant about two miles West from Gilmer and was working on the farm with her and contributing to her support at that date and for several years before, for he lived with affiant continually since his infancy and never left her until inducted into service, that he only lived with Pecolia Barber about two months in 1914 and then they lived with affiant.

Affiant further says that Pecolia Barber abandoned her husband and went away with a man in Smith County Texas, by name George, all the name affiant knows. That she was a public prostitute after that until she married Lee Mitchell with whom she is supposed to be living.

Affiant further says that during the year 1917 the Veteran made three bales of cotton which brought \$150.00 a bale with seed, = total \$450.00; also raised 175 bushels of corn worth \$1.00 a bushel = \$175.00. Also 150 gallons syrup @ \$1.25 a gallon = \$187.50. making a total of \$812.50 of which amount he gave to affiant \$406.25. this was paid in Fall of 1917. He also made other crops such as potatoes, peas etc, which is not accounted for herein, but most of it was given to affiant.

Affiant further says that her husband Robert Hagler was in very bad health

during the years 1917, 1918, & 1919, being hardly able to work, owing to infection of the bladder, which continued for a long time, during which affiant had to do the best she could to make a living for herself and husband. Affiant further says that Lennie Barber the veteran lived with her and worked with her until grown as her own child would, and during last years before entering the service he lived with her, and made crops giving her one half he made; and at time he went into service was contributing to her support, made an allotment to her after he was inducted into service, which she did not receive as above stated. That she needed his help badly at time of his death on June 7th 1918 (1919) when he died. Affiant further says that she does not know why this allotment was not paid. That above facts are true.

It is regretted to advise that the Act of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizing the pilgrimage, provides specifically that the Government shall not pay the expenses of any mother or widow for a longer period than two weeks in Europe, nor shall the Government be responsible for the expenses of any woman who leaves her party. This provision makes it necessary that you return to the United States with the party to which you are assigned unless you desire to pay your own expenses thereafter, including your return steamship and railroad fare home.

As the grave of your brother is in the Oise Aisne American Cemetery, you will spend two weeks in France. In this letter you were told how to proceed to obtain a passport which you must have before you can visit Europe. Your passport has not yet been received in this office.

If it is your intention to make the pilgrimage, you should go at once to the Clerk of the District Court, Gilmer, Texas, taking with you:

1. Four (4) photographs of yourself on thin paper (unmounted) not more than 3 x 3 inches or less than  $2\frac{1}{2}$  x  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches in size;
2. Your invitation and any evidence of citizenship you may have;
3. Someone who has known you for at least two years to identify you.

The Clerk will help you fill out the application and HE will forward it to the proper office. Your passport will be delivered to you aboard the boat. No charge will be made for the application or the passport.

If you have changed your mind and do not intend to make the pilgrimage, please so inform this office at once. It is necessary to know at this time whether or not you intend to make the pilgrimage in order that reservations and other necessary arrangements may be made for you.

It is requested you advise whether you are making application for your passport or whether you have decided not to make a pilgrimage. A self-addressed envelope which requires no postage is enclosed for your convenience in replying.

The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

In order to assure proper and satisfactory accommodations for the mothers and widows making the journey in 1933, reservations for steamship transportation must be made by this office several months in advance. It is requested that you answer the questions below by writing "Yes" or "No" or "Undecided" in the blank space following the question. When you have answered the question, sign your name and return this sheet in the enclosed addressed envelope which requires no postage. PLEASE DO NOT DELAY as it is essential that the information be in this office promptly.

Under this amendment you may be able to make the pilgrimage. In order to satisfy legal requirements it will be necessary for you to furnish as proof of your relationship, in loco parentis, the affidavits of at least two persons who are not related to you.

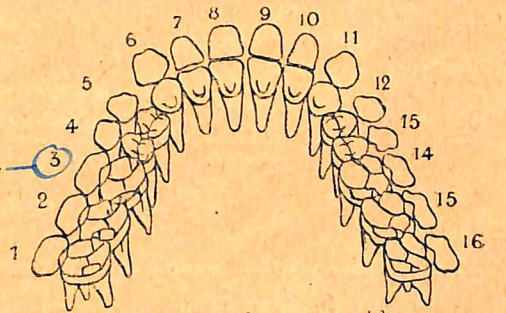
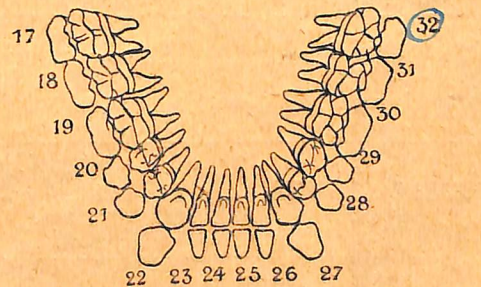


Diagram represents the mouth wide open








## INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PROPER COMPLETION OF G. R. S. FORM NO. 16-A

Enter information, as noted below, on reverse side of sheet in the *corresponding numbered space*. This form is supplemental to and is to be forwarded with G. R. S. Form 1-a, reporting reburial locations. To be used in answer to Question 26, Form 114, in case no means of identification on body.

2. Give date and accurate information as to location from which the body was disinterred and the group and unit which made disinterment.
3. Give date and accurate information as to location of reburial and the group and unit which made reburial, and how reburial was made—in casket, wooden box, etc.
4. State to what degree decomposition has progressed, whether recognition is possible, and how the body was originally buried—in a casket, box, burlap, etc. This statement should be as complete as possible.
5. (a) State whether identification tags were found buried with body and on grave marker by reporting "Yes" or "No".

(b) State whether or not body appears to have been a hospital case. Were any identifying articles found in or on body or grave? List any personal effects, letters, money-order receipts, and the like found on body or in grave. 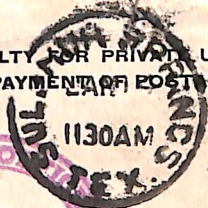
