Your passport for the pilgrimage to the American Cemeteries in Europe has not been received in this office.

You must have a passport to enter Europe. Please go at once to the Clerk of the U. S. District Court, Syracuse, N. Y., taking with you:

1. 4 photographs of yourself made on thin paper not more than 3 x 3 inches or less than $2\frac{1}{2}$ x $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches in size.
2. Your invitation and any evidence of citizenship you may have.
3. Someone who has known you for at least two years for the purpose of identification.

The Clerk will help you fill out the application and HE will forward it to the State Department, Washington, D. C. Your passport will be delivered to you aboard the ship. No charge will be made for the application or passport.

Please advise this office at once if you have made application, giving the name given by you on the application. If conditions have arisen which will prevent your making the pilgrimage on May 17th, it is requested that this office be advised in order that the reservations made for you may be cancelled.

Dear Madam:

The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

In order to assure proper and satisfactory accommodations for the mothers and widows making the journey in 1933, reservations for steamship transportation must be made by this office several months in advance. It is requested that you answer the questions below by writing "Yes" or "No" or "Undecided" in the blank space following the question. When you have answered the question, sign your name and return this sheet in the enclosed addressed envelope which requires no postage. PLEASE DO NOT DELAY, as it is essential that the information be in this office promptly.

This letter is being sent to all eligible mothers and widows who did not make the pilgrimage during the years 1930, 1931 or 1932. There is enclosed a circular of information WHICH YOU SHOULD READ VERY CAREFULLY BEFORE MAKING YOUR DECISION.

Receipt is acknowledged of your communication of recent date, advising that you are unable to sail July 6th on the PRESIDENT HARDING to visit the grave of your son, the late Ensign Edmund Burton Barry, *U. S. Navy.*

It is deeply regretted that illness prevents you from accepting the invitation at this time. You will be communicated with again relative to your desire to visit your son's grave when pilgrimages are being arranged for next summer. It is hoped you will be able to take advantage of the offer of the Government at that time, as 1933 is the last year for which pilgrimages are authorized. However, should you later find yourself able to sail July 6th of this year, it is requested you so notify this office by May 6th, in order that arrangements may be made for you.

Properly qualified personnel will be provided to care for the comfort and needs of the mothers and widows making the pilgrimage, and doctors and nurses will be available. During the past two years many mothers in poor health and of advanced age made the trip and appeared to have benefited by the sea air and the excellent care they received. Should you make the journey you are assured that not only will all necessary expenses be borne by the Government, but that everything possible for your comfort and welfare will be provided.
