

The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

Subject: Disposition of remains.

1. In reply to your letter of January 1st, relative to the disposition of the remains of your brother, the late Private First Class Frederick J. Baumgartner, Company "K", 327th Infantry, you are advised that for this office to advise you what disposition to make of the remains of this soldier would be improper and tend to bring some criticism on this office, as this Service is, in a way, merely an agency for carrying out the wishes of the next of kin of our American soldier dead. The return of a body to this country or its retention in one of the permanent American cemeteries in France is purely a matter of sentiment.

2. The Argonne American Cemetery at Romagne-sous-Montfaucon, Department of Meuse, in which the remains of your brother are interred, has been designated as a permanent American Cemetery. This cemetery is the largest American Cemetery in France and will be of great historical interest as outside the fact that the men buried therein were all comrades in the great struggle for democracy, this cemetery is situated in practically the geographical center of the area covered by the operations incident to the Meuse-Argonne offensive. Elaborate plans for beautifying this resting place and for the erection of appropriate headstones have been formulated, and the graves will always receive tender care by this Government.

3. The return of a body to this country for burial in a national Cemetery or for private burial in the family plot in a cemetery of the former home of the soldier is no doubt a great comfort to many relatives and friends as they are thereby permitted to visit the last resting place of their loved one.

4. In leaving the body in France for permanent interment in one of the American cemeteries in that country or in the event that a body is buried in a National Cemetery in this country, it is well to remember that the grave will be under the tender care of this Government for time immemorial. Experience and observation is that burials made in family plots of private cemeteries are for some time the object of finest care but in the course of possibly two generations the graves become neglected.



1. In reply to your letter of November 21, 1920, referred to this office by The Adjutant General of the Army, you are advised that the records of this office show that the remains of your brother, the late Private 1st class Frederick J. Baumgartner, Company K, 327th Infantry, are now interred in Grave 88, Section 24, Plot 2, Argonne American Cemetery, Romagne-sous-Montfaucon, Department of Meuse.
2. Many of the relatives of the American soldier dead have requested this office to permanently inter the remains of their loved ones in France and instructions have been issued to that effect. The remains of our soldier dead which are to be permanently interred in France, will be interred in permanent American Fields of Honor and in this connection your attention is invited to paragraph 9, of the inclosed Cemetery Division Bulletin No.10-F-W.
3. It will be noted that the remains of your brother are now interred in one of the permanent American Fields of Honor. These permanent American Fields of Honor will always be maintained by the Government as National Cemeteries are maintained similar to the care and maintenance given them in the United States.
4. In view of this information, it is requested that you advise this office whether you desire the remains of the deceased interred in a permanent American Field of Honor in France, or returned to this country, either for private interment or burial in a National Cemetery. Upon receipt of this advice from you, instructions will be issued that your wishes be complied with, provided there is no relative whose legal right to direct disposition has priority over yours.
5. The present instructions on file in this office from you, that the remains of the deceased be returned to this country for private interment will remain unchanged awaiting further advice.
