Dear Madam:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of July 16, 1930, relative to the pilgrimages of mothers and widows to the cemeteries of Europe, authorized by the Act of Congress, approved March 2, 1929.

As stated in the letter of July 1 from this office, the Act authorizes pilgrimages only for mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces, and the only provision of the law under which anyone other than the mothers and widows could be considered for this privilege is contained in Section 4 (a) which was amended May 15, 1930 to read in part as follows: "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces for a period of not less than five years at any time prior to the soldier, sailor, or marine reaching eighteen years of age."

From the information contained in your letter it does not appear that either you or your sister could qualify for the privilege of making the pilgrimage under the provisions of the Act. The desire to visit your brother's grave is understood and appreciated, but you will understand that the War Department has no alternative other than to carry out the law as passed by Congress.

This letter is in connection with the pilgrimage which you desire to make to the grave of your brother, the late William D. Blair, under the provisions of the Act of March 2, 1929.

Under the law, pilgrimages are authorized only for mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces. The only provision of the law under which anyone other than the mothers and widows could be considered for this pilgrimage is contained in Section 4 (a) of the Act as amended, which reads in part, "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces for a period of not less than five years at any time prior to the soldier, sailor, or marine becoming 18 years of age."

However, in order to satisfy legal requirements it will be necessary for you to furnish as proof of your relationship in loco parentis, the affidavits of at least two persons not related to you.

In the event you believe you are eligible under the law to make this pilgrimage, it is requested that the enclosed form be completed and returned to this office in order that your eligibility may be determined. Under paragraphs 1 (c) and 1 (d), sufficient information should be included to permit an intelligible decision as to eligibility.

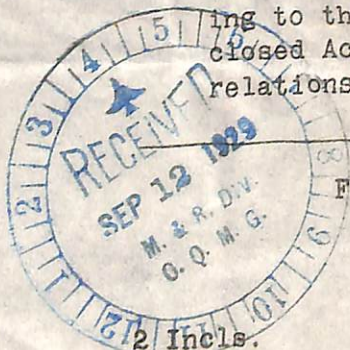

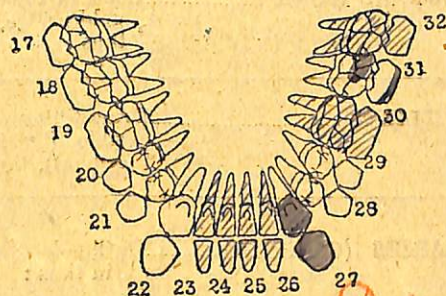
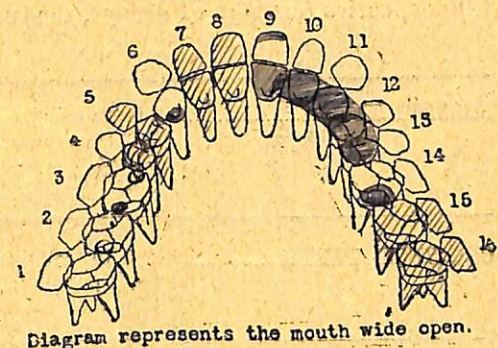
