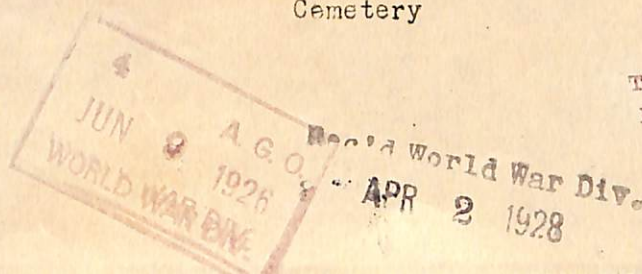

I received your letter of the 29th March, with card and envelope to fill out. I thought best not to fill out in th meantime. If the Government is going to have a National Cemetery in France I would wish my son interred there. I wrote the headnurse of the American Red Cross at Commercy Hospital France, asked many questions about his death, was he conscious when he died did he leave any wishes for us to fulfil, was he buried in the town cemetery

They have never answered my letter. Would take it as a great kindness if you would inquire, and find out, if he is buried in a cemetery. Poor fellow he fought bravely for his country, and never was wounded. He was a nervous lad, over exertion in battle brought heart trouble, then pneumonia.

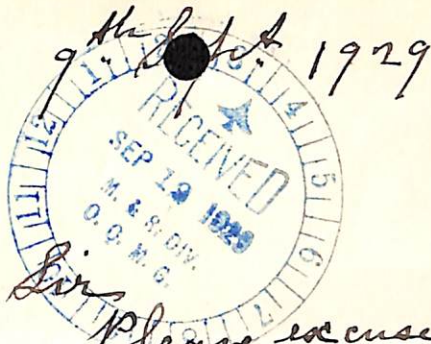

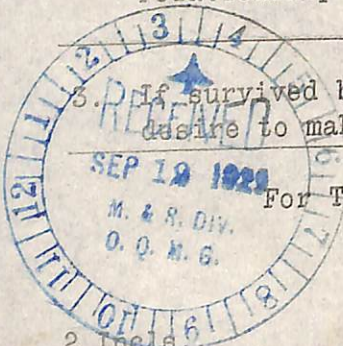

The Quartermaster General desires that you be informed that the permanent grave of the late William J. Blair, Pvt. 1/c, Co. B, 139th Infantry, is Grave 29, Row 16, Block B, Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery, Romagne-sous-Montfaucon, Department of Meuse, France.

This is one of the permanent American military cemeteries to be maintained by this Government in Europe. Each grave will be marked by a headstone of white marble, of suitable design, with name, rank, organization, date of soldier's death and State from which he came. The headstones will be placed at all graves in connection with the improvement work now in progress, as soon as possible and without waiting for special action or request on the part of relatives.

In effecting removal, the utmost care and reverence were exacted and more than willingly accorded by those performing this sacred duty. The grave of the deceased will be perpetually maintained by this Government in a manner befitting the last resting place of our heroes.

Poor fellow he fought cransly for his country, and never was wounded. He was a nervous lad, over exertion in battle brought heart trouble, then pneumonia. I remain,
