




## INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PROPER COMPLETION OF G. R. S. FORM NO. 16-A

Enter information, as noted below, on reverse side of sheet in the *corresponding numbered space*. This form is supplemental to and is to be forwarded with G. R. S. Form 1-a, reporting reburial locations. To be used in answer to Question 26, Form 114, in case no means of identification on body.

1. Show soldier's name, serial number, rank and organization, and by whom disinterred and reburied.
2. Give date and accurate information as to location from which the body was disinterred and the group and unit which made disinterment.
3. Give date and accurate information as to location of reburial and the group and unit which made reburial, and how reburial was made—in casket, wooden box, etc.
4. State to what degree decomposition has progressed, whether recognition is possible, and how the body was originally buried—in a casket, box, burlap, etc. This statement should be as complete as possible.
5. (a) State whether identification tags were found buried with body and on grave marker by reporting "Yes" or "No".  
 (b) State whether or not body appears to have been a hospital case. Were any identifying articles found in or on body or grave? Beginning at the middle line in both upper and lower jaws, the teeth are arranged symmetrically on either side and classed as incisors (cutting teeth), cuspids or canines (tearing teeth), bicuspids (chewing teeth), and molars (principal chewing teeth). An examination should be made and findings charted to cover the following basic conditions: Lost teeth, crowned teeth, bridge work, fillings, caries (cavities of decay), dentures (plates), and any deformity of jaws found.

<b>DENTURES (PLATES)</b>	Draw diagram of relative size and shape of plate block in teeth attached and indicate retaining clasps on natural teeth with the word "clasp".

Sgt. Bloyd was hit with shrapnel on the morning of the 15th of July about 3 o'clock. He went out of the dugout to try to fasten a telephone on to the telegraph wires that had been destroyed when the switch board was blown out. His effort was to establish communication with Headquarters. He died at the Red Cross Field Dressing station later in the day. The dugout was one fourth mile directly east of Crezancy, 20 kilometers from Chateau Thierry on the Marne. I think he was buried near the Red Cross Dressing Station. Fred E. Johnson, 5th Field Signal Battalion (Minneapolis, Minn.) or Andrew C. Hanson, Red Top, Minn of the same company could give full particulars of his death and burial. Sgt. Bloyd had asked for a furlough to go to England to see the girl to whom he was engaged. He was a true hero and died in an awful battle.

We were under heavy shell fire every minute of the time. We were attacking but the Boches were offering us pretty stiff resistance.
