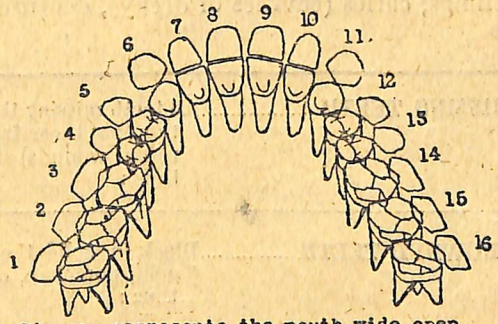
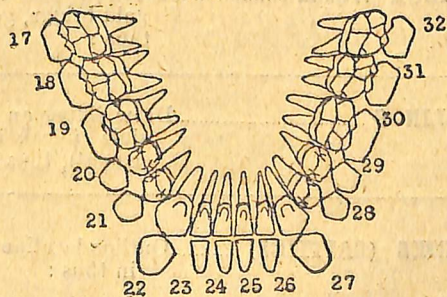


Diagram represents the mouth wide open.

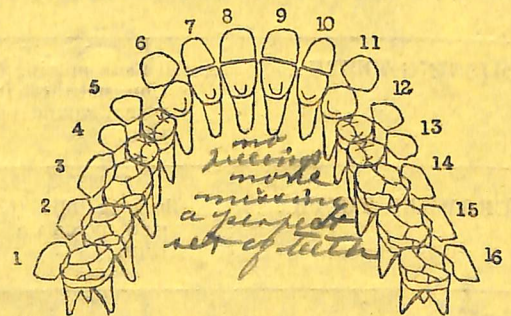
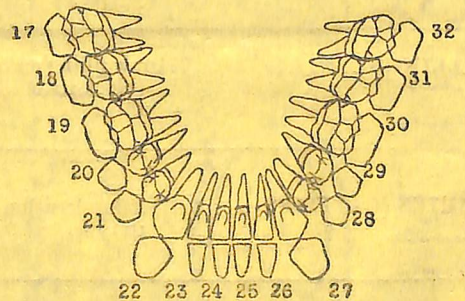


Diagram represents the mouth wide open.



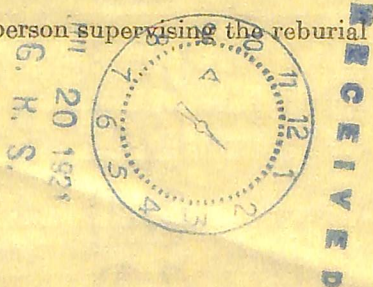
