


Receipt is acknowledged of form letter completed by you relative to the pilgrimage authorized by the Act of March 2, 1929.

The only provision of the law under which anyone other than the mother or widow could be considered for this privilege is contained in section 4 (a) of the Act, which was amended May 15, 1930, to read in part as follows: "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces for a period of not less than five years at any time prior to the soldier, sailor, or marine becoming eighteen years of age."

In order to satisfy the legal requirements, it will be necessary for you to furnish as proof of the relationship, in loco parentis, the affidavits of at least two persons not related to you.

In the event you believe yourself eligible, under this provision of the law, to make the pilgrimage, it is requested that the enclosed forms be completed and returned to this office in order that your eligibility under the Act may be determined. Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of July 5, 1929, relative to the pilgrimage authorized by Congress in the Act of March 2, 1929. The delay in reply is due to the great number of inquiries received in regard to this pilgrimage.

In reply you are advised that the above mentioned Act provides that an invitation for a pilgrimage shall be extended the mothers and widows of the members of the military or naval forces of the United States who are buried in the cemeteries in Europe, provided they have not made a previous visit thereto, but it does not contain any provision which will permit of anyone making the pilgrimage in the place of the mother or widow.

If you can qualify under the provisions of Section 4 (a) of the Act of March 2, 1929, which states, "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces for the year prior to the commencement of his service in such forces," and have not made a previous visit to the grave of your brother, you will be entitled to make this pilgrimage. If this be the case, please advise.






3. Give date and accurate information as to location of reburial and the group and unit which made reburial, and how reburial was made—in casket, wooden box, etc.

4. State to what degree decomposition has progressed, whether recognition is possible, and how the body was originally buried—in a casket, box, burlap, etc. This statement should be as complete as possible.

5. (a) State whether identification tags were found buried with body and on grave marker by reporting "Yes" or "No".

(b) State whether or not body appears to have been a hospital case. Were any identifying articles found in or on body or grave? List any personal effects, letters, money-order receipts, and the like found on body or in grave. Give any and all information which it is thought might be of use in identifying the body, other than that tabulated under Item No 6.

6. Give all information as to body description and dental chart as nearly correctly as the condition of the body will allow. Items (e) and (f) under the body description are very important and should be very complete. The dental chart is also very important and should be filled in with great care. There are 32 teeth to be accounted for, as shown by the numbers on the chart. Beginning at the middle line in both upper and lower jaws, the teeth are arranged symmetrically on either side and classed as incisors (cutting teeth), cuspids or canines (tearing teeth), bicuspids (chewing teeth), and molars (principal chewing teeth). An examination should be made and findings charted to cover the following basic conditions: Lost teeth, crowned teeth, bridge work, fillings, caries (cavities of decay), dentures (plates), and any deformity of jaws found.

All teeth missing through previous extraction (not those fractured or displaced by recent wounds) should be scratched out, thus:

1. In reply to your letter of October 15th, 1921, you are advised that according to your previous request, the Chief of the Graves Registration in Europe has been directed not to return the remains of your son, the late Private James Brady, Company B, 59th Infantry.
2. The progress of the work in France has rendered it necessary to establish a definite policy governing requests relative to the disposition of remains of soldier dead, therefore, the Secretary of War has directed that no change of requests relative to the return of a body will be considered after August 15th, 1921.

In further reply to your communication of May 9th, forwarding shipping inquiry, you are advised that notation has been made of your desire that the remains of your son, the late Private James Brady, Company "B", 89th Infantry, be permanently interred in their present resting place in the American cemetery at Seringes-et-Nesles, Department of Aisne. This is a temporary American cemetery and at the time of concentration of bodies, will be abandoned. The remains of soldiers interred therein whose relatives have requested permanent interment abroad, will, according to present plans, be transferred to the Belleau Wood American Cemetery at Belleau, Department of Aisne, where the graves will be perpetually cared for by the United States Government.

2. Should you prefer, the remains of your son may be transferred to a nearby permanent French cemetery; in which event, it is requested that you execute and return to this office the enclosed release thereby relieving the United States Government of the future care of the grave. 





NOTE.—INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE DISPOSITION OF REMAINS will be issued by this office upon the properly executed authority of the legal next of kin in each case. The widow is the first person having disposition of the remains of her husband. Should there be no widow or children, the father and, in turn (upon his decease), the mother, is the proper authority. The brothers, in order of seniority, and then the sisters in order of seniority, if there are no brothers, rank next in authority to decide. Under an opinion rendered by the Judge Advocate General of the Army, if a widow has remarried she forfeits her right, and the next of kin as given above will make decision.

1. In reply to your letter of October 15th, 1921, you are advised that according to your previous request, the Chief of the Graves Registration in Europe has been directed not to return the remains of your son, the late Private James Brady, Company B, 59th Infantry.

2. The progress of the work in France has rendered it necessary to establish a definite policy governing requests relative to the disposition of remains of soldier dead, therefore, the Secretary of War has directed that no change of requests relative to the return of a body will be considered after August 15th, 1921.

3. In view of the above policy it is too late to issue instructions for the return of these remains. You are further advised that the Secretary of War has designated the American Cemetery at Oise-Aisne as a permanent American Cemetery, and the graves will be marked by a suitable headstone and perpetually maintained by this Government in a most careful and reverent manner.

In further reply to your communication of May 9th, forwarding shipping inquiry, you are advised that notation has been made of your desire that the remains of your son, the late Private James Brady, Company "B", 59th Infantry, be permanently interred in their present resting place in the American cemetery at Seringes-et-Nesles, Department of Aisne. This is a temporary American cemetery and at the time of concentration of bodies, will be abandoned. The remains of soldiers interred therein whose relatives have requested permanent interment abroad, will, according to present plans, be transferred to the Belleau Wood American Cemetery at Belleau, Department of Aisne, where the graves will be perpetually cared for by the United States Government.

2. Should you prefer, the remains of your son may be transferred to a nearby permanent French cemetery; in which event, it is requested that you execute and return to this office the enclosed release thereby relieving the United States Government of the future care of the grave. This release will not become effective until the body has been removed to the permanent French cemetery, at which time, you will be duly advised of the new grave location and of the formal release of the remains.

3. In view of the above information, it is requested that you advise this office whether you desire the remains of your son removed to a permanent French cemetery or interred in the permanent American cemetery in France, or returned to this country either for private burial or interment in a national cemetery. In the event this advice is not received within a reasonable length of time, the body will be removed to the permanent American cemetery in France.




