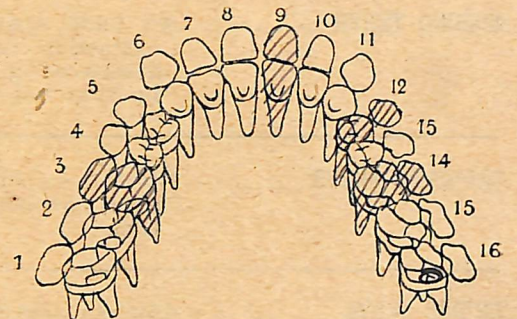
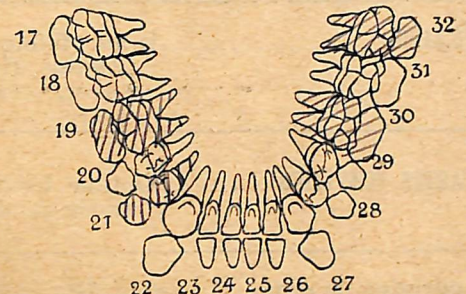


Diagram represents the mouth wide open

Proceedings of the Board of Officers convened at Base Hospital #17, American E.F., France, per order No. 317, Paragraph 7, November 15th 1918, for the purpose of inquiring into the circumstances surrounding the death of Private Joseph Briskle, organization unknown, American E. F.

Detail for the Board:

The Board met at 9:30 A.M., November 16th 1918.
Present: All of the members.

The Board then proceeded to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of the above Private Joseph Briskle, organization unknown, American E. F., and examined all available witnesses, who testified substantially as follows:

Private Antonio Ferrarulo, 543178, Co. M, 7th Infantry, 3d Div., American E.F., being duly sworn, testified as follows:

I was writing upon a train on the L'est Railway, in a northerly direction, from Nevers to Dijon. When about three stations from Dijon, I descended from this train and went to fill my canteen. Upon my return from filling my canteen, and when I was attempting to board said train, I saw deceased attempting to board the same train, three or four cars to the rear of me. I was unable to board my train because a train going in the opposite direction threw me from my train onto the ground, where I remained for about five minutes, or until the train had passed by. When I arose and sought relief, I discovered that deceased had been killed by the same train that knocked me from my train. When I observed deceased had been killed I went to the station and notified the military police who was standing close by of my own accident and asked him where I could locate a physician, and told him at the same time that I had been deceased run over by the same train that injured me.

After talking with the M.P. said M.P. went to where deceased lay, and after a lapse of a few minutes the M.P. returned to where I was standing and said the man was dead. He also stated that a man had been killed similarly two or three days before at the same station.

I do not know the name of the man who was killed. I boarded a train for Dijon about one-half hour after the accident occurred, and went to Base Hospital No. 17, having been brought to the Hospital by railway employees at Dijon (Port Neuve) station. I never saw deceased after he was killed by the train as above stated.

Captain John J. Shipke, Infantry, A.P.M., A.P.O.#721, American E.F., being duly sworn, testified as follows:

I was called to the Dijon Ville Station on the night of the 14th of November about 8 o'clock and was informed that an American soldier had been killed at Brazey by a train. They wanted to know what to do in this case, and not being able to answer off-hand, I called Captain Gruber, Adjutant, Base Hospital No. 17, and he informed me that they took care of such cases at his Hospital, that is, bury the body, etc. He asked where the body was, and I informed him that if he would furnish an ambulance, I would direct the ambulance to the place.

The ambulance reported at my office and I took Private Lozon 2392148, 1st Army Headquarters with me, and we proceeded to Brazey to get the body. This town was about 40 kiln. distance. Upon arrival at Brazey, we found the body in a French house near the station. This Place was supposed to have been the one where this soldier had been boarding for two weeks. We placed the body on a stretcher in the ambulance, and I examined the identification tag which was then off of the body and in possession of the French Gendarme. Also the papers he had in his possession such as a couple of Holy pictures and a small purse containing 18 fcs. and some centimes. I took this property and turned it over to Capt. Gruber, the next day.

I never saw the body after unloading it at the morgue at Base Hospital No. 17. I believe that this body was the body of Joseph Briskle. I am satisfied that Joseph Briskle met his death by being struck by a railroad train at Brazey, France.

I understood from the French Gendarmes that he was a military police boarding at that place. I gained from conversation with the family through my interpreter, that this man was a military police on duty at this place. At the time I saw him he had no marks by which I could certify that he was acting as a military police.

1st Lieut. Frank B. Berry, MC., Central Medical Laboratory, APO 721, being duly sworn, testified as follows:

From examination of the body at the autopsy, I find that the deceased died by being struck on the right side of the head. I find no evidence of alcoholism. I think the man was killed instantly. I have no evidence, other than the identification tag, that this soldier was one Joseph Briskle.

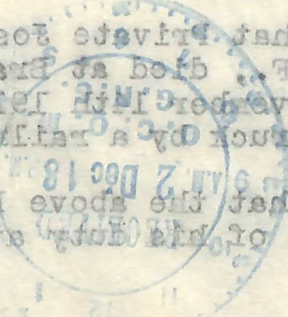

This date, November 16th 1918, at 6 P.M., the undersigned Chatot Blanch Xavier, - Chenut Bliment, having been notified by phone and by the stationmaster that Brazey on Plaine (Cote d'Or) that the body of an American soldier had just been discovered laying at about two hundred meters from the station. we reported promptly to the place and received from McCochey Charles, 28 years old, stationmaster at ~~xxxx~~ Brazey on Plaine, the following statment: Tonight, the 16th around 5 P.M. the M' Je Card, layer, came and notified me he had discovered at about 200 meters from the station towards Dijon the corpse of an American soldier laying between the two tracks, the skull open. Being on duty, I could not report thereat but gave such oders as to have the body watched and notified through the phone my officials and also the R.T.O. at Dijon Ville.

This American Soldier very likely was the victim of an accident, as a train 2650 transporting American troops left the Brazey station proceeding to Dijon at 5.05 P.M. At the same time another train Bo.M 815, which was not to stop at Brazey crossed the tower at the very place where the body was discovered. I am unable to give further information.

Both I and the stationmaster, we reported to the same place we found the body laying between the two tracks, the face on the ground the skull open, and brains scattered over the ballasts. The right rail was dirty with blood, along one meter distance. This American soldier was carrying an American identification tag with the name of Joseph ~~Briskkk~~ Briskle, #3359367, and a purse containing 20 francs and different papers written in American language. Madame Lauble, a housekeeper at Brazey on Plaine, and living near the station, offered a bed and rroom to retain the body which had been taken there. Having made an inquiry, we gathered the following information. 1. Jobard Victor, 50 years old, living at Brazey on Plaine, tonight the 16th around 5:15 P.M. I was proceeding home, walking allng the track when I discovered that about 200 meters from the station, toward Dijon, the body of an American soldier., the skull being open and laying on the rail, the brains being scattered over the ground. After having drawn it a little backward to prevent it from being caught by a train, I notified the station master. I cannot state how the accident occurred but when I left the station that day, I noticed two trains crossing each other at the very place where I discovered the body, which makes me think that the soldier was killed at that time.

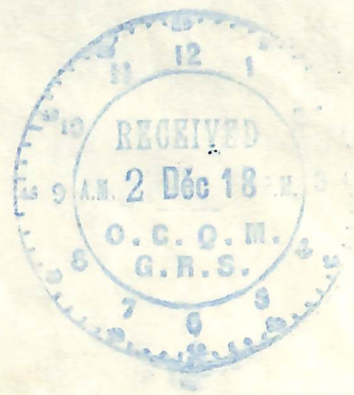

I was called to the Dijonville Station on the night of the 14th of November about 8 o'clock and was informed that an American soldier had been killed at Brazey by a train. They wanted to know what to do in this case, and not being able to answer off-hand I called Captain Gruber, Adjutant, Base Hospital No. 17, and he informed me that they took care of such cases at his Hospital, that is, bury the body, etc. He asked where the body was, and I informed him that if he would furnish an ambulance, I would direct the ambulance to the place.

The ambulance reported at my office and I took Private Lozon 2392148, 1st Army Headquarters with me, and we proceeded to Brazey to get the body. This town was about 40 kilm. distance. Upon arrival at Brazey, we found the body in a French house near the station. This place was supposed to have been the one where this soldier had been boarding for two weeks. We placed the body on a stretcher in the ambulance, and I examined the identification tag which was then off of the body and in possession of the French Gendarme. Also the papers he had in his possession such as a couple of Holy pictures and a small purse containing 18 frs. and some centimes. I took this property and turned it over to Capt. Gruber, the next day.

Statement of Private Antonio Ferrarulo, 543178, Co. M. 7th Infantry, 3d Div.

I was writing upon a train on the West Railway, in a northerly direction, from Nevers to Dijon. When about three stations from Dijon I descended from this train and went to fill my canteen. Upon my return from filling my canteen, and when I was attempting to board said train, I saw deceased attempting to board the same train, three or four cars to the rear of me. I was unable to board my train because a train going in the opposite direction threw me from my train onto the ground, where I remained for about five minutes, or until the train had passed by. When I arose and sought relief, I discovered that deceased had been killed by the same train that knocked me from my train. When I observed deceased had been killed I went to the station and notified the military police who was standing close by of my own accident and asked him where I could locate a physician, and told him at the same time that I had seen deceased run over by the same train that injured me.

After talking with the M.P. said M.P. went to where deceased lay, and after a lapse of a few minutes the M.P. returned to where I was standing and said the man was dead. He also stated that a man had been killed similarly two or three days before at the same station.

I do not know the name of the man who was killed. I boarded a train for Dijon about one-half hour after the accident occurred, and went to Base hospital No. 10, having been brought to the hospital by railway employees at Dijon (Port Neuve) station. I never saw deceased after he was killed by the train as above stated.

GENERAL DATA: Patient was run over by train on evening of November 14, 1918. It is said that in stepping out of the way of one train he stepped in the way of another.

GENERAL APPEARANCE: The body is that of a well developed, exceedingly muscular, well nourished white male, about 30 years of age. Rigor mortis is extremely marked, and can be felt partially broken. Stiffness is slight. There is no edema. The eyeballs are sunken; the color of the eyes is a greenish gray, and the pupils are equal, measuring 0.4 cm. in diameter. There are no lesions of the eyeballs or conjunctivae. Denudation of injuries: - The distal phalanx of the fourth finger of the right hand is cleanly amputated, and the bone protrudes slightly. Over the right iliac crest there is an amputation extending down to the tendon of the muscle, 5 cm. in diameter. Just above this on the lower part of the upper arm, there is a similar but more superficial lesion 6 x 2 cm.; and over the right buttock, about the same, there are two similar lesions of the same dimensions. Over the face there are multiple bluish violet contused areas. A small amount of blood issues from the nostrils and ears. Directly over the descending ramus of the right mandible there is a cut extending down to the muscle, 5 cm. in length, ending at the level of the lobe of the ear. Involving the right upper eyelid, beginning at the junction of its upper and middle thirds, and then running straight up over the frontal bone, there is a laceration 6 cm. in length, extending down to the frontal bone. The teeth are not loosened, are white and regular, and the tongue is intact. The nose and the bones of the left side of the face, together with both jaws are likewise uninjured. The scalp is completely cut through over the coronal suture from ear to ear, the anterior portion having been peeled off the frontal bone down to the supra-orbital ridges and lying down over the face, and the posterior portion stripped back to the occipital protuberance, the lacerations running back on either side in a rather jagged fashion down to half way over the occiput, leaving an apron-like sheet of scalp. In the centre of this, directly over the vertex, is a jagged triangular cut with serrated edges, one arm of which is 1.5 cm. in length and the other 2 cm. The scalp is covered with black hair, which is matted and wet with blood. Very little of the parietal bone remains, except the lowest portions. The occipital bone is fractured, chiefly into three pieces, two of which are adherent to the scalp. The fracture of the skull here has occurred along the lines of the lambdoid suture, and thence down the middle of the occipital bone almost to the foramen magnum, and thence splitting and encircling the foramen magnum, leaving this intact with an irregular surrounding ring of bone about 5 cm. in width. The frontal bone is intact except over its lateral portions, both of which are fractured. The orbits are not disturbed, the sphenoid, temporal, vomer, posterior portion of the ethmoid and palatal bones, the right zygomatic process, and the right zygomatic arch are literally smashed to bits, and the pieces may be picked out with the forceps with but very little dissection. The right middle and inner ear are completely missing, and in their place is the condyle of the mandible with its attached muscles plainly seen. In picking out the pieces of bone with the fingers the fracture is very lateral. On the left the fragments of the temporal bone are somewhat larger, triangular and irregular, and the middle and inner ear are still in place, except for a small fractured portion. There is no brain present. Lying on the anterior face of the skull together with those shown by bits of bone are shreds of the tentorium and dura mater, which formerly covered the base of the skull. The whole appearance and location of the lacerations and other parts are those of the vertebral column.

PERITONEAL CAVITY: The peritoneum is smooth and glistening, and there is a considerable amount of mesenteric and peritoneal fat. The appendix lies free over the brim of the pelvis and is 11 cm. in length. The liver extends down a little below the umbilicus. On the right the diaphragm is at the level of the 4th rib, and on the left is at the 5th.

PLEURAL CAVITIES: Free.

PERICARDIAL CAVITY: Contains about 4 cc. of clear straw colored fluid.

HEART: Estimated weight 300 gms. It is firmly contracted, and shows nothing at all abnormal. The valves are negative.

LUNGS: Scattered over the external surfaces of the lower lobes are a few small sub-pleural hemorrhages. There is considerable anthracotic pigment. On section a fair amount of blood is present, so that the cut surfaces appear somewhat congested.

SPLEEN: Estimated weight 100 gms. It is light violet grey in color, of normal consistency, and on section the pulp is dark brick red, with the lymphoid tissue rather prominent, and may be scraped away to a slight extent.

LIVER: Estimated weight, 2000 gms. It is very light brown in color and on section is extremely greasy. The gall bladder and bile ducts are negative.

GASTRO-INTESTINAL TRACT: Negative, except that the mucosa is extremely pale. No evidence of alcoholism.

PANCREAS: Negative.

ADRENALS: Negative.

KIDNEYS: Estimated weight 225 gms. They appear rather small, the right measures 11 x 6.5 x 2 cm., and the left 11 x 6 x 2.4 cm. On section they are negative, except that the pelvic fat is considerably increased. The cortex measures 0.6 cm. in thickness. The glomeruli are distinct. Both capsules strip readily, leaving smooth surfaces.

BLADDER: Contains about 200 cc. of slightly turbid urine. Its mucosa is negative.

GENITALS: Negative.

AORTA: The aorta is clean, white and of good elasticity. Lying alongside of the thoracic portion the thoracic duct stands out quite prominently, is about 0.5 cm. in diameter, and on section chyle flows freely.

ORGANS OF MOUTH AND NECK: Not examined.

HEAD: As described under external appearances.

HISTOLOGICAL DIAGNOSES:

1. Extensive P.C.C. of all bones of head and right malar bone.
2. Evisceration of brain through forams, with absence of entire cerebrum, and greater portion of cerebellum.
3. Evulsion of scalp, with extensive laceration.
4. Extirpation of right middle and inner ears.
5. Amputation, 4th finger - right.
6. Multiple superficial lacerations, right arm, body and head.
7. Multiple contusions of face.
8. Slight congestion of lungs, with sub-pleural hemorrhages.
9. Anæmia of viscera, from hemorrhage.
10. Fatty liver.
