



Enter information, as noted below, on reverse side of sheet in the *corresponding numbered space*. This form is supplemental to and is to be forwarded with G. R. S. Form 1-a, reporting reburial locations. To be used in answer to Question 26, Form 114, in case no means of identification on body.

1. Show soldier's name, serial number, rank and organization, and by whom disinterred and reburied.
2. Give date and accurate information as to location from which the body was disinterred and the group and unit which made disinterment.
3. Give date and accurate information as to location of reburial and the group and unit which made reburial, and how reburial was made—in casket, wooden box, etc.
4. State to what degree decomposition has progressed, whether recognition is possible, and how the body was originally buried—in a casket, box, burlap, etc. This statement should be as complete as possible.
5. (a) State whether identification tags were found buried with body and on grave marker by reporting "Yes" or "No".
(b) State whether or not body appears to have been a hospital case. Were any identifying articles found in or on body or grave? 



Yet it is probable that most of those who remain in France will be assembled in a National Cemetery or "Field of Honor". A beautiful site for this purpose upon the slope of Mont Valerien, overlooking the Bois de Boulogne, the Valley of the Seine and the town of Suresnes, has already been deded by the French Government. It must be stated, however, that final action depends upon the authority of Congress. Every effort will be made to take care of the graves in a manner satisfactory to the relatives and an honor to our dead.

2. The card sent in by you is herewith returned with the request that you carefully complete same and return it to this office in the enclosed addressed envelope, which requires no postage.

3. It is desired to express to you the deep and sincere sympathy of the Department on account of the great loss sustained in the death of this soldier.
