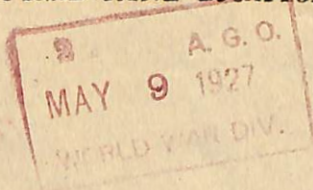

1. Cpl. Bush was severely wounded by a High Explosive shell and his legs were badly mutilated. This happened at about noon on July 21, 1918. while his company was advancing against the enemy, on the edge of a small woods about a kilometer and a half southeast of the town of Berzy-le-Sed and about seven kilometers south of Soissons. I was within ten or fifteen feet of Cpl. Bush when he was wounded and sent him to a dressing station with two Medical Corps men after he had been given first aid.

. On Oct. 15th, 1918 notice was received by this company from the Central Records Office that Cpl. Bush had died at Evacuation Hospital No 5 on July 22nd, 1918. It is not known where he was buried, but it is thought that he is probably buried at the place where Evac. Hosp. No 5 was located at that time.
