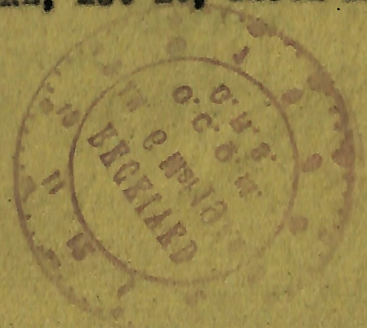

Receipt is acknowledged of the affidavits you submitted to substantiate your claim as having stood in loco parentis to your brother, the late Corporal Edward L. Callahan.

It has been held that in order for a woman to have stood in loco parentis to a deceased member of the American forces, she must have taken the part of a father in providing food, clothing and shelter for a period of not less than five years at any time prior to the soldier, sailor, or marine becoming eighteen years of age.

The records of this office show that the late Corporal Edward L. Callahan was seventeen years of age in 1908, and the information contained in the affidavits indicates that your father's death occurred during that year. Therefore, you could not have stood in loco parentis to your brother from 1904 until 1908, within the meaning of the Act of March 2, 1929, as your father was living during that period.

In view of this fact it is regretted to advise that you are not eligible to make a pilgrimage to your brother's grave at the expense of the Government. Your desire to make this journey is appreciated, but you will realize that the War Department has no alternative other than to carry out the law as passed by Congress.
